




Student Ethnicity



Personalized Learning

Personalized Learning in Clear Creek ISD artfully combines targeted instruction, collaboration and creativity, reflection and goal setting, and flexible learning paths and pace so that each student is empowered and inspired to achieve

at high levels.

CCISD has created a learning ecosystem based on four key principles which allows instruction to be targeted based on what a student needs, when they need it. <u>Click</u> <u>here to watch a series of videos on</u> <u>Personalized Learning in CCISD.</u>



Measuring the success of personalized learning in CCISD is achieved through classroom visits utilizing a standard rubric. The rubric includes four categories to show the progression toward complete implementation. The rubric moves from emerging (1), developing (2), advancing (3) and sustaining (4). On a scale of 1-4, the overall average for all component at all elementary campuses was 1.97

The averages are listed below:

- Reflection & Goal Setting: 1.72
- Targeted Instruction: 1.85
- Flexible Path & Pace: 1.66
- Collaboration & Creativity: 1.62

In the initial evaluation stages, we saw student reflection and goal setting at 43% emerging and 43% developing, advancing and sustaining, combined. By the end of the year, there were significantly visits in the emerging range (13%), while all other visits were observed at the developing, advancing or sustaining (79%).

Elementary Education


Reading and mathematics are foundational subjects for students in elementary school. Clear Creek ISD utilizes an array of assessments, both formal and informal, to monitor student progression towards mastery of the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS).



Mathematics: Dreambox

The data below show grade-level growth of elementary students in math based on their use of the DreamBox program. DreamBox is a supplemental computer platform that aids teachers in helping the students set learning goals related to their math instruction. Students can access content that will address areas of opportunity or provide accelerated instruction for student growth. DreamBox begins each school year with a pre-assessment which places students at their appropriate level of math skills comprehension and allows students to move forward and backward in their progress across all strands of math. DreamBox allows students to practice mathematical concepts in new, engaging ways that leads to greater levels of mastery. Teachers can set goals with students, review them, and immediately see where achievement, focus, support, or encouragement is needed to help students succeed. Teachers can monitor student progress throughout the year to develop student growth concept-by-concept.

DreamBox is used in the community-based accountability report as another data set that illustrates the work CCISD is doing to help elementary students personalize their math journey.

Reading: Amplify

During the 2022-2023 school year, K-2 teachers administered Amplify in the fall and spring.

Amplify is a digital platform that uses quick, one-minute, assessments to measure the student's reading ability in the areas of phonological awareness, reading fluency, reading accuracy, and reading comprehension over the school year. Amplify is used to help teachers monitor student progress on their reading skills from Kindergarten through the Second grade. The students are assessed three times a year. Progress and growth are calculated from the beginning of the year baseline assessment to the end of the year progress assessment. Teachers use the data, with other classroom tools and information, to help support students in their reading success.

Amplify is used in the community-based accountability report as another data set that illustrates the work CCISD is doing to help early elementary students acquire reading skills.

Career & Technical Education

Clear Creek ISD offers robust Career & Technical Education (CTE) programming for students in ninth through twelfth grade and several courses for career exploration for students in seventh and eighth grade. While reinforcing state and national academic standards, CTE courses provide exposure to and training in career areas of direct interest to the student.

Programs of study are course sequences that prepare students with the knowledge and skills necessary for success in their chosen career. While students are not required to follow these exact sequences, they are highly recommended if a student is confident about their chosen career path.

College Readiness Exams

According to CollegeBoard, the SAT and PSAT are assessments that measure how students demonstrate knowledge and skills that can be used as a predictor of a student's college readiness and success. We use data from the SAT and PSAT in the community-based accountability report to illustrate where our students are performing compared to state and national levels as a predictor of college readiness. We also use the data to compare our performance within CCISD for trends over time.

Starting next year, in the Spring of 2024, the SAT will be a full digital version. Students will have two sections on the assessment, Reading and Math, and will be scored on a 400-1600 point scale. According to CollegeBoard, the SAT will be shorter so student will have more time on each question, thus measuring the students' skills and knowledge and not their test-taking abilities (SAT Student guide or testing, 2024). The 2024 SAT uses multistage adaptive testing for both the reading and math sections. Each section is divided into 2 equal length modules, and there is a 10-minute break between the Reading and Writing section and the Math section. The first module of each section contains a broad mix of easy, medium, and hard questions. Based on how students perform on the first module, the second module of questions will either be more difficult or less difficult.

SAT


The SAT is a college readiness exam offered through The CollegeBoard® that measures students' abilities in Evidencedbased Reading and Writing (EBRW) and mathematics. The highest score possible on the SAT is an 800 in EBRW and an 800 in Math for a total score of 1600.

Post-Secondary Plans, Class of 2023

More than two thirds of Clear Creek ISD's Class of 2023 graduated with the intent to pursue post-secondary education, working toward at least a bachelor's degree. CCISD offers the PSAT to all ninth and tenth graders, as well as a school-day SAT at least once to each eleventh or twelfth grader. Additionally, the District offers a robust selection of both Advanced Placement (AP) and dual credit courses to prepare all learners for post-secondary education.

PSAT

The PSAT/NMSQT is designed for use by tenth and eleventh graders and includes the content and skills they most likely have had the opportunity to learn by those grade levels. Additionally, the PSAT/NMSQT is used as a qualifying assessment for National Merit honors and recognitions when taken by students in the fall of their second to last year of high school.




Advanced Placement (AP)

Advanced Placement (AP) courses engage students in a rigorous curriculum across a variety of self-selected subjects and courses. At the end of the school year, students have the opportunity to take an AP exam that may result in the student earning college credit for that subject if their exam score meets preset criteria. CollegeBoard[®] considers a score of 3, 4, or 5 to be passing.

CCISD students experienced an increase in the percentage of exams scored at 3 or higher with most of that growth at the highest possible score of 5.

Dual Credit Earned



Robotics

CCISD boasts a thriving culture of robotics participation and competition for students. This is exemplified by its dedicated Robotics Event Center. This state-of-the-art facility serves as a hub for schools from across Texas and even around the world. Situated within the backdrop of NASA, the District has witnessed a remarkable surge in student engagement with robotics. The stand-alone competition center provides a unique platform for students.

Clear Creek ISD had 20 teams qualify to compete at the 2023 VEX Robotics World Championships.

Future Farmers of America

Clear Creek ISD's Future Farmers of America (FFA) program has been a longstanding pillar of success with continuous growth each year throughout the District. The FFA program serves approximately 375 students from Clear Brook High School, Clear Creek High School, Clear Falls High School, Clear Lake High School and Clear Springs High School. These high school students commit to months of hard work raising animals or creating a non-livestock project to then show across the state in hopes of being named Grand Champion in their respective categories.

For 41 years, the District has hosted the annual Livestock Show and Auction, which had a recordbreaking year in 2023 by raising \$312,000 for students through community support. The proceeds go directly to the student to help them further their commitment to excel in agriculture and leadership education.

Certified Nursing Assistant Program

Clear Creek ISD's partnership with HCA Houston Healthcare resulted in 38 students earning job placement with HCA Healthcare in the 2022-2023 school year. The 38 students formally accept their new positions at the event. They accept StarTech roles at HCA Houston Healthcare Clear Lake in Webster, HCA Houston Healthcare Mainland in Texas City or HCA Houston Healthcare Southeast in Pasadena. Many students started college or other career-related training while simultaneously working at HCA Houston Healthcare.


2023 All-State Musicians




