

Clubs and Organizations

Clubs and organizations exist to meet the co-curricular needs of students, to enhance self-esteem, and to provide student involvement.

This section gives a general outline for organizing clubs and providing information on clubs which may already exist or which need to be formed.

Organizational Issues

Advisors: Each club or organization MUST have an advisor who is familiar with the established procedures for working with A.S.B.

Student Responsibilities: Club programs are established by and for students.

Students should:

- A. Conduct their own meeting with the advisor present.
- B. Plan their yearly program which is coordinated with the master calendar.
- C. Establish a budget under the guidelines set by A.S.B.
- D. Make arrangements for their own functions coordinated with master calendar.
- E. Use the club advisor as a resource.

Privileges: Clubs that have A.S.B. sponsorship are eligible for privileges such as: conducting fundraising activities on campus, use of campus advertising facilities, use of the school name and logo.

Eligibility: Each club must meet the standard requirements to be eligible for the rights and privileges of an A.S.B. sponsored club. These requirements usually- include:

- A. Having a faculty or staff advisor.
- B. Having an up-to-date constitution on file in the A.S.B. office.
- C. Completing an application for club charter with a statement of purpose.
- D. Maintaining individual Grade Point Averages and other requirements set by the school board for extra-curricular activities.
- E. Abiding by the A.S.B. Constitution, the club constitution, and state and local school codes.
- F. Submitting all completed forms to the individual in charge of clubs for consideration and approval.
- G. Receiving an official charter and the school's club handbook or other information upon the club's approval.

H. Clubs that do not adhere to established guidelines lose the rights and privileges of A.S.B. sponsorship.

Membership: Restriction and obligations for membership must meet with A.S.B. approval.

Finances: Procedures for raising, handling, and spending funds must be clearly defined in a standard format for all clubs to follow, as specified by A.S.B.

Types of Clubs and Organizations will vary based on area, needs, culture, and interests. Some examples of established clubs and organizations are:

School Spirit: Pep Squad, Pep Club, Cheerleaders, Songleaders, Mascot, Flag Team, and Drill Team

Academic: (subject related) CSF, Academic Club, Mock Trial, FBLA, FHA, FFA, Music, Drama, Choir, Science, Math, Languages.

Service: Interact, FNL/SADD
