JUNIOR EVAN SCRUGGS STARTS PIRATE PANTRY FOR PIPER FAMILIES IN NEED

A year ago in February of 2022 Evan Scruggs, a junior now, realized a problem within the Piper community. He noticed the nurse asking the community for food donations to help students in need. That is when he decided to make a change and create a food pantry for Piper families.

Even though the process started only a year ago it didn't get pushed off the ground until August. Evan had worked diligently with Ms. Bartlow and the administration team to get this started.

"The hardest part of getting started was planning everything and getting it approved by the administration. I worked a lot to plan where we would store stuff, how we would reach out to the community, and all of those logistics," shared Evan.

The Pirate Pantry is a place where families can get food free of charge without any worries. Ms. Bartlow reaches out to those families that need the support and then schedules a time for them to come and pick up items.

The Pantry has been able to reduce the financial burden of many families within our community especially around

the holidays. For instance during Thanksgiving is when the pantry did its largest project.

"My proudest moment of what we've accomplished so far was our Thanksgiving meals," Evan explained. "We helped over 30 families and provided a nice Thanksgiving meal by collaborating with Vineyard Church and got all of them taken care of for the holiday."

Not only has the pantry as a whole been a lot of work but Evan Scruggs and Ms. Bartlow have devoted countless hours to this operation to help provide families with the support they need.

Evan said, "I spent probably 30 plus hours working with Ms. Bartlow setting up everything for our Thanksgiving event. Throughout the week it kind of varies depending on where we're at with things, and what we're planning on. Though I would say I devote about two to three hours, maybe minimum a week to the pantry."

The Pirate Pantry has truly helped strengthen our community and support one another even further. Evan Scruggs plans to continue the pantry and hopes to make it a lasting place in Piper even after his graduation. He wants to help as many people in whichever way he can.

"I wish people knew that we're open to donations all the time throughout the year. We're working on a list to send out soon. I also wish people knew that if you want to help just email me and let us know what you can do. Right now we're working with limited space, so there's not really a lot anybody can do but help is always appreciated."



Piper USD 203 partnered with the Build Up Kansas program to implement the National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) curriculum and certifications in our Design and Construction CTE Pathway in the Design, Production, and Aviation Academy. This year, Randy Robertson has been implementing this curriculum and teaching students real skills that can be used now and in the future. In March, at the NCCER and AGCKS Conference, Robertson was awarded the NCCER New Instructor of the Year. In addition to this award, he was given a \$750 financial award to use towards this program.

The Kansas Department of Education was pleased to share that the Kansas State Board of Education approved Kansas Preschool Pilot grant funding for the 2024-25 school year, and of that funding, Piper Early Childhood Center was awarded \$45,000. The funding enables the district to add an additional 3-year old, full day pre-school class, which means expanded capacity for our growing community. "Based on survey results from the community, we understood that we needed to increase our capacity in our highly sought out pre-school program," said ECC Principal Stasi Willmon. "You asked and we listened. Along with greater capacity and ability to serve our community, we understand the importance of early intervention. Adding another 3-year old classroom enables us to meet the needs of our rapidly growing community."

Piper is proud to have educators throughout our district currently working through LETRS training. LETRS is a two-year long, professional development course focused on helping educators learn the essentials of research-based literacy instruction grounded in the Science of Reading. It is an extremely rigorous course of study that involves course readings, engagement with online content, assessments, classroom application, and eight full days of professional development spread out over the course of two years. We also have teachers completing LETRS Early Childhood, which is a rigorous one-year program, specifically focused on preschool aged students.





As a part of Goal 4 in the district's Strategic Plan – recruiting a diverse and premier workforce – Community Outreach & Inclusion Coordinator Amber Buck traveled to Langston University's career fair in Oklahoma. Langston University is a historically Black college / university (HBCU).

In partnership with Piper's Early Childhood Center, Piper's Parents as Teachers hosted its first ever BlockFest in February. BlockFest is a one-hour interactive building extravaganza, focusing on how block play helps children develop early math, science and literacy skills. Thirty families and 54 children from across the community attended the event. One parent said, "I plan to encourage more open play with blocks to help with creativity and problem solving."
