Renovation work at Brideweser Stadium is progressing well. Within the next few weeks, the stadium grandstand work will be complete. Wood has been replaced with aluminum, aiseways added, access bridge widened, handicapped accessible seating added, and a new ADA approved entrance ramp installed. Visitors to Brideweser will also note that we have installed assistive listening technology which will allow those with hearing impairments to hear stadium announcements through their bluetooth enabled hearing aids or provided devices. In early May, work will start to improve drainage in the stadium and then the area connecting the grandstands to the concession stand will be paved. Our overall goal with this work was to improve the experience of our guests through enhancements of safety and accessibility, while honoring the gift that the Athletic Complex Team volunteers built for our community. In the fall, we will rededicate the stadium and hope to have the Athletic Complex Team members and their families present to celebrate.

Work at the new high school is nearly complete. The construction crews have been largely off-site since early February, but will be back for punch list items in June. The main work remaining, involves corrections to site work where we have seen some issues with drainage, and areas that need reseeded. We are getting close to this project being complete - thank you for all the patience shown as we work to improve our campus!

Our mission to "Educate and Empower Fairless to Soar to Excellence" has been at the forefront of everything we do. From the classroom to the athletic field, from the arts to academics, our students have demonstrated a commitment to excellence that is truly inspiring. They have embraced new opportunities for learning, shown resilience in the face of adversity, and consistently exceeded expectations.

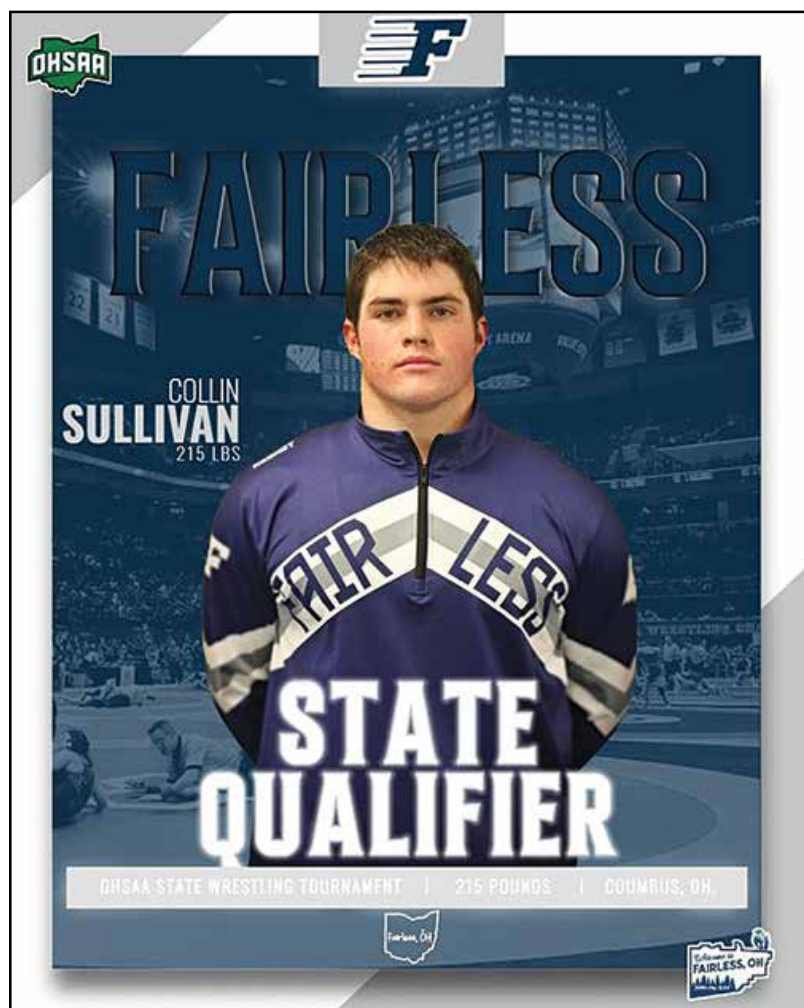

Sixth Grade

In December, Mrs. Fritz’s third-period reading class read the novel, *Children of the Great Depression* by Russell Freedman. This story brings to life the hardships faced by American families, especially their children, during the Great Depression of the 1930’s. Over Christmas break, sixth-graders were given the challenge to think about a toy they could create, with a child of the Great Depression in mind, using only materials that they could find, and been given permission to use, to create their masterpiece. Nothing used was to be purchased by their parents or family members. They created the toys in January, and presented them to their class in February. Mrs. Fritz said, “I’m proud to say that a plethora of creativity and ingenuity was shown by these students.”



In March, Mrs. Fritz’s third-period reading class were given classic novels to choose from to read. The girls chose to read *Black Beauty*, by Anna Sewell, and the boys decided on *Call of the Wild* by Jack London. They were given the challenge to create a group project that depicts their favorite events of the plot in each story, and be prepared to present their projects to their classmates after the OST ELA testing days this month. They have had class time, time at home, and the girls have even come to the classroom during lunch, to work on this assignment. The girls’ group decided to create a diorama, a poster, and even include a stick horse. The boys divided up into three groups, creating a doghouse, an informative/explanatory essay, and a Google Slideshow to depict their favorite plot events. Both the girls’ group, and the boys’ groups described, in detail, how they determined the events from their novels to identify, without being a spoiler. The objective of their project was to pique the interest of other classmates, which in turn, would hopefully encourage them to read their novel.

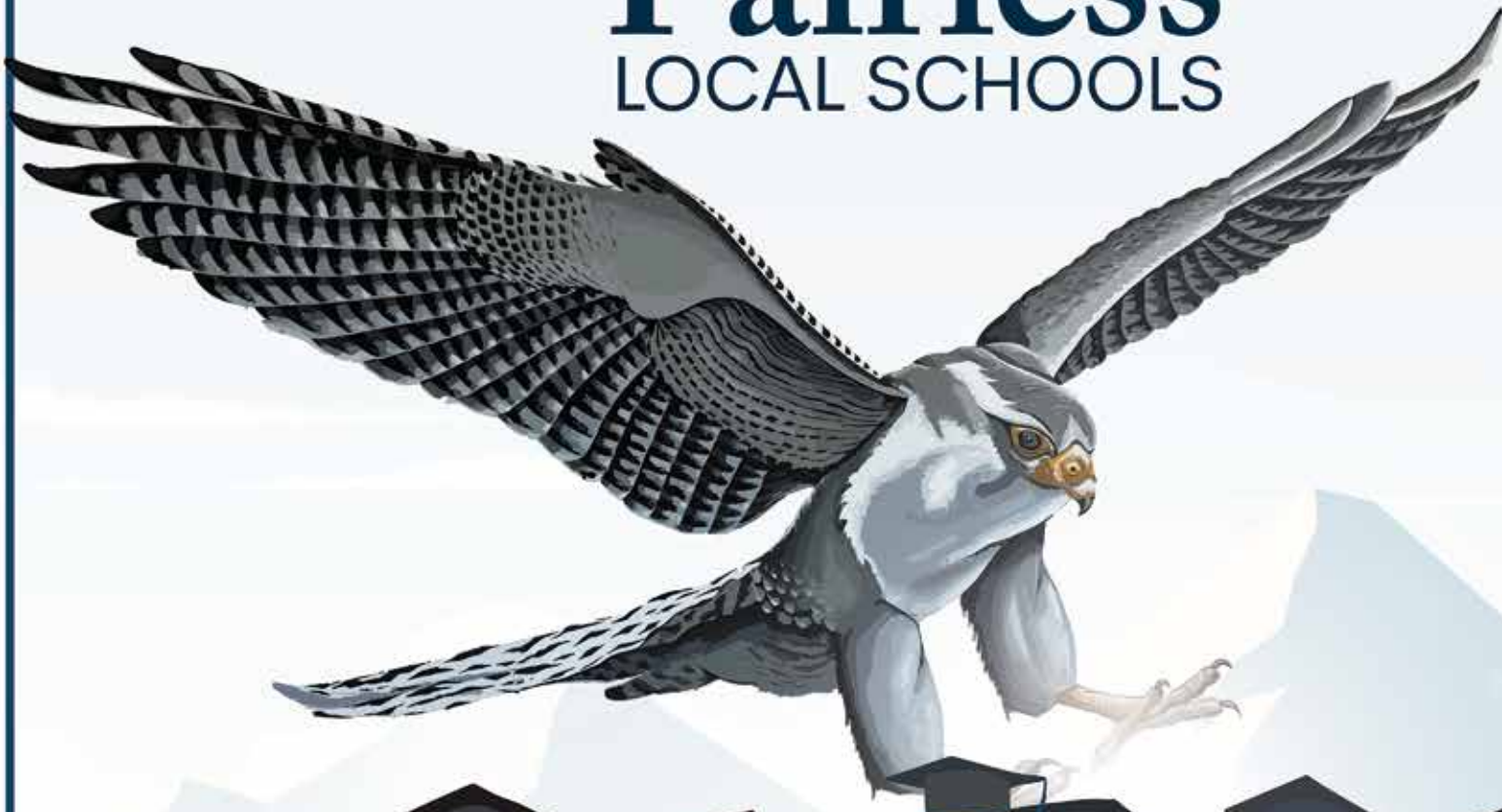


Music
