

Web Development

Seventh grade students are in the middle of theri Websites for a Cause Project. Students are working in a group for this final project. After deciding what problem they would like to address, students have been using their collaboration skills to make decisions about the information and images to be included as well as how they want the individual pages to look and function. We plan to begin coding the week of 4/15.

Computer Science Discoveries 3

The eighth grade students have been learning how to build apps that can interact with our circuit playground devices. After deciding on the type of device they wanted to create, groups then built physical prototypes that were controlled by the app that they had created. Mr. Souder's STEM students were kind enough to visit our class and let us demonstrate how our devices would work in real life. This was a challenging project and the students did a great job with their devices.



Students had fun playing this interactive tic tac toe game.





This week, we have been busy investigators, looking into the mystery of the Roanoke Colony, testing theories, and coming up with our own resolution.

Soon, we will complete a poetry PBL in which we take on the role of a variety of characters to create a book of poetry that we will then share with the community during the PBL evening.



<u>7th Grade Science</u> students have had a busy March. While in our Life Science unit we have been participating in March Mammal Madness sponsored by Arizona State University. Students read and researched the combatants that would be going against each other in fictitious battles. They then filled out their brackets and waited for the battles to begin. Students viewed the battles via the YouTube channel, Rodent Roundtable. In true March Madness fashion there were upsets, brackets busted, and champions in each class period. 6th Grade Math -

In 6th grade Math, students are continuing our unit on Geometry. Students have learned to find perimeter and area of 2-D shapes. Later this week, we will move to volume and surface area of 3-D shapes.

Nurse Notes

Did you hear someone say "bedbugs"? Is that possible...at school? Yes! Schools are public places just like movie theaters, restaurants, libraries, hospitals, and hotels. In fact, you may have heard that Ohio is one of leading states in the nation with reports of bedbugs. Schools all over Ohio are dealing with this issue. We know Urbana is no different. And we know bedbugs (and other insects) may occasionally hitchhike to school or other public places on a student or a student's belongings. Individual bug sightings are considered to be an *occurrence*. This does not indicate the school is infested. Many people assume if there are 1 or 2 bedbugs found, there must be thousands more. This is not true.

Here is what school personnel can do:

1. Collect the bug and send for positive identification. 2. Carefully inspect a student & the student's belongings if a suspected bedbug is found on or around them, or if they have suspected bedbug bites. 3. Place personal items in carefully sealed bags if insects are found. 4. Notify the child's parents & provide information about bedbug identification & treatment, if necessary. 5. Continue to monitor the classroom & affected student for additional bedbug occurrences. If there are

multiple occurrences or multiple bedbugs are found, an inspection will be made by a licensed exterminator.

Parents of students in the affected classroom(s) will be notified if a bedbug infestation is found.

Here is what parents can do:

1. Be informed! There are volumes of bedbug information available at centralohiobedbugs.org, & the Ohio Department of Health at http://www.odh.ohio.gov (search B for bedbugs).

Learn how to inspect your home for evidence of bedbugs, especially if you have traveled & stayed at hotels, or have purchased used furniture or mattresses. Don't assume bedbugs are not there if you are not itching. Many people do not have a reaction to bedbug bites and will not itch.
If you find bedbugs, call a licensed pest exterminator. If you can't afford professional treatment, a helpful commercial website is bedbugsupply.com. You will find step-by-step instructions to help get rid of the pests.

MANAGING HEAD LICE-Letter from the School Nurse

Another subject that comes up often with parents of young children is head lice. What does the school do if there is a child found to have head lice? What do I do if MY child gets it? How do I prevent my child from getting it?

Head lice are small parasites that live on nice, warm heads. They require blood from the host in order to survive. They do not carry or cause diseases, so having head lice is not considered a medical or public health problem. It is definitely a NUISANCE condition. Ask any parent who has to deal with getting rid of them.

Head lice are acquired from other infested people. It requires head-to-head contact or sharing of hats, pillows, or personal grooming items like hairbrushes and combs. Lice do not jump, hop, or fly, but they do crawl fast! They are hard to find unless there are a whole lot of them.

For this reason, we do not routinely screen entire classrooms for head lice. It is very likely some kids with head lice will pass the screening just because they were not detected in the short amount of time available to look through each student's hair. This gives parents the false idea that there are no children with head lice. Instead, we ask all parents of young children to inspect their own child's head once a week. Parent can spend more time looking for live lice and their nits (eggs).

If you find crawling lice, we recommend using an overthe-counter product that will kill them, or contact your child's medical provider for treatment recommendations. Other family members' heads should also be checked for lice and treated at the same time if infested. Following the treatment, comb hair thoroughly with a louse comb to remove nits. Continue combing daily for about one and a half weeks until no more live lice or nits are discovered.

When a school staff member suspects a child has head lice, they will ask one of the nurses to check their head. If live lice are discovered, the child will be sent home at the end of the day, and then excluded from school until treated with an effective product. Once live lice are no longer there, the child may return to school. Parents are strongly encouraged to continue combing with the louse comb to remove nits, which may lead to a recurrence of live lice.

Teach your young child to avoid head-to head contact with their friends and to avoid sharing personal items like combs, brushes, hats headbands, and hooded coats. Keep in mind that treatment is a lot easier when there are just a few lice rather than a whole head full.

In conclusion anyone can get head lice. People who have head lice are not dirty. Head lice cannot fly or jump. They can only crawl onto your head or if your head touches the head of a person who already has head lice. Lice do not live on objects: desks or chairs. Head lice can be treated with special combs and treatment gels. If you have any questions concerning the type of treatment to use please consult your medical provider or pharmacist.
