



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This is a map of the museum. The map tells us where the shows are and what is in them. We use the map to decide what we want to see.




The museum is having a special show.

We can even make art ourselves. The museum has special benches used for drawing. We use pencils and paper to draw the flowers. A picture of flowers is called a still life.




The museum has too many paintings to show at once.


Some paintings are stored away. You can see the stored paintings on the computer.

Science Resource

Animal Homes

Animals build safe places to sleep, eat, and raise their young. Some animals build homes that have different rooms, tunnels, and much more! Read on to learn about some awesome animal builders and their homes.

Mounds

Termites are insects that live in large groups called colonies. Some termites build mounds as their homes. Termite mounds are made with dirt and saliva. Termites build tunnels inside the mound. Termites travel through the tunnels.

The tunnels help keep the termite mound cool. Some mounds can be more than 20 feet tall!



National Park Service Beaver some beavers build lodges in rivers or ponds as their homes.

Nests

Cliff swallows are birds that live in large groups called colonies. Cliff swallows build nests with thousands of tiny balls of mud. They build their nests on the steep sides of cliffs or under bridges. It is hard for other animals to reach the nests in those places. So the nests are safe places to lay eggs and to raise young.

Burrows

Prairie dogs are rodents that live in big groups called towns. Prairie dogs dig burrows as their homes. Burrows are underground tunnels. Prairie dogs sleep and raise their young in small rooms inside the burrows. Some prairie dog towns are many miles wide and are home to millions of prairie dogs!

Lodges

Beavers are rodents that live in small groups called families. Some beavers build lodges in rivers or ponds as their homes. They use logs, tree branches, and mud to build a lodge. A beaver lodge has one room that is above water. Beavers have to swim underwater to get inside their lodge.

Have you ever swapped sandwiches with a friend at lunchtime? "Trade" is the name we give to any exchange of one thing for something else. Trading can take place between people, companies, and countries.

Trade involves services, money, and goods. Maybe you mowed your neighbor's lawn, and she paid you. That was trading a service for money. Or maybe you traded your scooter for a friend's video game. That was trading goods.

People and countries may trade because they have too much of one thing and need something else. For example, in some countries, people grow a lot of rice. They produce more than they need for themselves. That allows them to sell their rice to other countries. The buyers of the rice send money to the sellers. The sellers might use that money to buy goods or services.

Trade allows people to sell, buy, or exchange goods and services to get what they need.
