Looking Ahead in ELA (Standard 6.1)

MAIN IDEA VS. THEME

The **main idea** is what the book is mostly about. The **theme** is the message, lesson, or moral of a book. By asking crucial questions before you read, while you read, and after you read a book, you can determine the main idea and theme of any book you are reading!

Questions to Determine Main Idea

- Before Reading:
 - Read the title.
 - What is the book about?
 - What is the topic?
- While Reading:
 - Look for and carefully read text features.
 - Is the book fiction or nonfiction?
 - Look for information, words, and pictures that are repeated.
- After Reading:
 - Think about the most important part of this topic.
 - What details or examples back up and support the main idea? Cite evidence.



Questions to Determine Theme **BLAST**

- **Before Reading:**
 - Look back at the common theme topics.
 - Keep these in mind as you begin to read the book.
- While Reading:
 - Think: the theme may be stated or implied (suggested).
- After Reading:
 - Explain how the characters reacted to obstacles. Cite evidence.
 - What important decisions did the characters make?
 - How did the characters grow or change, and what did they learn? Cite evidence.



An understanding of word stems also allows us to see connections across words and word families, not only supporting vocabulary learning, but vocabulary teaching across any subject.
