2023 Summer Reading W.A. Perry Middle School

Summer reading is critical for students to retain knowledge and skills learned in the previous school year. Students who don't read are at risk of falling behind their classmates. Summer reading for students at both the middle and high school levels assists with developing the life-long habit of reading. Summer reading encourages the enjoyment of reading and develops students' abilities to choose books for themselves. By allowing students to practice choosing books, self-regulating when and where they read, and sustaining reading over the summer months, our hope is that students' identities as readers will continue to grow. The students' choice of reading will also foster a vibrant and diverse community of readers upon their return to school. Their summer reading experience will stimulate exciting conversations about books both with their peers, parents/guardians, and with their teachers, as well as expand their perspectives and stimulate their understanding of the world around them.

Summer reading will begin Monday, May 29th and will end Friday, September 29th with a culminating project in their upcoming ELA class.

Students will:

- read at least **three** books, one for each month starting with June;
- complete an in-class project on their grade level's selected book (see last pg.);
- begin project on August 28th and submit it by September 29th.

Teachers will:

- give students project options;
- give students a scoring rubric to guide successful completion of project;
- score projects and return to students for final grade or redo opportunity.

Parents will:

- discuss the book your child is reading before, during, and after;
- set reading times of 25 to 30 minutes each day in a special and quiet place;
- reward your child when each book is completed.

How To Access Books via eBook

If students have access to a computer, they may use the free electronic services to find e-books from Richland County's Public Library, through the Discus program, or from W.A. Perry's Media Center (Destiny Discover).

Visit the school's web page; Select the eLearning tab; Scroll down and select Library Media Center; Click on the appropriate link for more information.

- The public library is open for circulation during the summer months. Students may physically borrow books on their last prescribed reading level from the library.
- Books from Richland One's summer reading book bundle may be used for reading.
- Books from student's personal home library that mirror the student's current reading level are acceptable.
- Books may be purchased from outlets such as Barnes and Noble, Books-A-Million, Amazon, etc.
- If students have an iPhone or any iDevice, the **Books** app may be used to download free books.


