SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear Members of the Southern York County Community:

It was an honor for me to serve as the Superintendent of Schools for Southern York County District in 2022-23, and I look forward to our future together and continued partnership as we strive to help our students reach their greatest potential. Today, I am pleased to share the 2022-23 Southern York County School District Annual Report. This report highlights many of our student's accomplishments. Southern York County School District publishes this report each year to communicate information about the district's performance and highlight student achievement inside and outside the classroom.

Our theme for the 2022-23 school year was "Southern York County School District...Making Dreams a Reality," and I am proud to say that as a district, we more than lived up to that theme. Once again, our students and schools consistently achieved excellence in education, athletics, and the arts. A few of many indicators of success include:

- Our students earned multiple honors: Two students were named National Merit Semifinalists, more than 90 students earned a score of "3" or higher on an Advanced Placement exam, the marching band won first place in the Cavalcade of Bands, and six Susquehannock sports teams won division championships.
- Our staff received recognition: A Susquehannock High School counselor was named Pennsylvania School Counselor of the Year by the Pennsylvania School Counselors Association, the district's athletic director was named York-Adams Interscholastic Athletic Association's Athletic Director of the Year, and two teachers received Shippensburg University's Outstanding Educator Award.
- Susquehannock High School was named one of the nation's best public high schools in U.S. News and World Report's annual 'Best High Schools in America' report and the 2023 AP School Honor Roll for student academic performance for the 2022-2023 school year.
- Friendship Elementary School became the first school in Pennsylvania to be certified as a High Reliability School - a designation that a school has achieved a safe, supportive, and collaborative culture. Our other schools are progressing toward this certification as well!

The 2022-23 school year also marked a year of physical growth with the construction of the new addition at Susquehannock High School. The addition is the result of four years of intensive planning, and it, along with the entire high school renovation project, will help us to prepare students to become college, career, and life-ready.

As you read through this report, you will see many of the outstanding achievements from the 2022-23 year. I am proud to share the accomplishments of our students and district, and I am excited for the future as we continue to build on our success as a district. Thank you for your unwavering support of our students and schools. The support and dedication that we receive from you – our staff, students, families, school board, and community – are what enable us to provide such exceptional educational and extracurricular opportunities for our students. It is by working together that we are able to help our students to meet the global challenges of the future. Together, we are Warrior Strong.

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



We do not believe test scores in isolation quantify our students' success. Our goal is to ensure that students are passionate about learning, have opportunity to create and develop meaningful student-inspired projects and are immersed in solving authentic and complex problems while collaborating together. We encourage students to take risks, and find their strengths, in order to reach their greatest potential. These lifelong skills prepare our students to be career, college, and life ready.

ACHIEVEMENT

Susquehannock High School's Advanced Placement (AP) program continues to provide students with excellent opportunities. In 2023, 210 Susquehannock students participated in AP testing, taking 391 total exams. Students may be eligible for college and university credits in one or more subjects for qualifying AP scores.



FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

The Southern York County School District Board of Education and Administration understand that the resources for the community's schools are funded by our community. Since the Free School Act of 1834, a large share of public education has been paid by local communities, and that continues today. As shown in the graph below, 67 percent of the cost of education for 2022-23 was funded from local dollars, 31 percent from state, and only 2 percent from federal and other revenue.




The district is proud of its sustained record of good stewardship of the community's funds as evidenced with the following:

- The 2022-23 Audit included an unmodified opinion (the best opinion an auditor can give), and there were no findings in the audit.
- The General Fund Unreserved Fund Balance exceeds 5 percent of budget target Necessary for cash flow in uncertain times.
- A fund balance reserved for future building renovations allowing slow phase-in of millage for projects and reduced borrowing.
- The high quality educational program offered at a reasonable cost per student.



A mill levy is the number of dollars a taxpayer pays for every \$1,000 of assessed value. The current 2023-24 real estate tax rate of 19.91 mills results in a tax bill of \$1,991 for a home assessed at \$100,000. SUSQUEHANNOCK CONSTRUCTION PROJECT

After years of intensive planning, Southern York County School District began the physical construction and renovations at Susquehannock High School in early 2022. During the 2022-23 school year, significant progress was made on the construction of the high school's new addition.

The addition, along with the entire high school renovation project, is designed to help prepare students to become college, career, and life-ready.

Once renovations are complete, the high school will include:

- Flexible and adaptable spaces capable of supporting short- and long-term instructional needs.
- Larger spaces to support music practice rooms, group lab rooms, and open student work areas.
- Classrooms designed as student-centered environments that support both the academic and career readiness needs of all students.
- Classrooms modeling a 21st century work environment and enabling student collaboration on all production phases (i.e. design, prototyping, construction, and finishing).
- Updated mechanical, heating, electrical and air conditioning systems and increased ventilation.

The district has a long-term plan in place for financing the building project, and the millage needed for the project has been phased into the budget over the last several years. The entire project is expected to be completed in the late fall of 2024.



LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES

In Southern York County School District, we understand the importance of providing a variety of learning opportunities and experiences. We support blended learning environments and offer students choices, such as our online Digital Academy and Dual Enrollment Programs, to help meet students' individual educational needs. We also recognize that many students learn best by experiencing real-world lessons that emphasize 21st-century skills such as communication, collaboration, creativity, and critical thinking. Our schools offer a diverse and challenging curriculum designed to prepare students for postsecondary education and the changing workforce.

Dual Enrollment

Dual enrollment is available to Susquehannock High School students through partnerships with Penn State York, York College of Pennsylvania, Towson University, Millersville University, and Harrisburg Area Community College. Fifty-five students participated in dual enrollment in 2022-23, and the Class of 2023 included 41 students who earned at least three college credits through Dual Enrollment courses.

Digital Academy

We recognize that some students learn better in environments outside of the traditional school setting. Our Southern York Digital Academy implements a quality, personalized online learning environment that challenges students to achieve their potential. Students have an educational choice where they are able to enjoy a flexible schedule with access to learning 24/7 and opportunities for classes taught by Southern York County School District's teaching staff. Our Digital Academy students may also participate in co-curricular or extracurricular school activities in the district.







COST FOR CYBER CHARTER SCHOOLS

In 2022-23, cyber charter school costs continued to escalate both in the amount and as a percentage of the district's overall budget. These are funds, mostly tax dollars, that are leaving the district to fund cyber charter schools. Southern York County School District will continue efforts to provide alternatives to cyber charter schools in order to provide a quality education to all students and keep the money at the district.
