

HIGH STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT


2022 SAT SCORES

ACHIEVEMENT

Susquehannock High School's Advanced Placement (AP) program continued to provide students with excellent opportunities in 2021-22. We are proud to report that 247 high school students participated in AP Testing in 2022. Students may be eligible for college and university credits in one or more subjects for qualifying AP scores.



FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

The Southern York County School District Board of Education and Administration understand that the resources for the community's schools are funded by our community. Since the Free School Act of 1834, a large share of public education has been paid by local communities and that continues today. As shown in the graph below, 67 percent of the cost of education for 2021-22 was funded from local dollars, 31 percent from state, and only 2 percent from federal and other revenue.




Revenue Sources by Percent

The district is proud of its sustained record of good stewardship of the community's funds as evidenced with the following:

- The 2021-22 Audit included an unmodified opinion (the best opinion an auditor can give), and there were no findings in the audit.
- The General Fund Unreserved Fund Balance exceeded five percent of budget target Necessary for cash flow in uncertain times.
- Fund balance is reserved for future building renovations allowing slow phase-in of millage for projects and reduced borrowing.
- High quality educational program is offered at a reasonable cost per student.



2022-23 Millage Rates

A mill levy is the number of dollars a taxpayer pays for every \$1,000 of assessed value. The current 2022-23 real estate tax rate of 19.91 mills results in a tax bill of \$1,991 for a home assessed at \$100,000. The table below shows the real estate tax mills of the District in comparison to other York County districts in the Lincoln Intermediate Unit.

susquehannock high school BUILDING PROJECT

After years of planning, Southern York County School District began the physical construction and renovations at Susquehannock High School in early 2022. Although the high school, which was built in 1952, had major building alterations in 1988 and 2001, the previous projects were not complete building renovations. The current project will modernize the building and create a space designed to prepare students with the necessary technical and social skills to be career, college and life-ready.

DESIGNED TO ADDRESS STUDENT NEEDS

Once renovations are complete, the high school will include:

- Flexible and adaptable spaces capable of supporting short- and long-term instructional needs.
- Larger spaces to support music practice rooms, group lab rooms, and open student work areas.
- Classrooms designed as studentcentered environments that support both the academic and career readiness needs of all students.
- Classrooms modeling a 21st century work environment and enabling student collaboration on all production phases (i.e. design, prototyping, construction, and finishing).
- Updated mechanical, heating, electrical and air conditioning systems and increased ventilation.



The district has a long-term plan in place for financing the building project, and the majority of the millage needed for the project has been phased into the budget over the last several years. The project is expected to be completed in the fall of 2024.

DIGITAL ACADEMY





COST FOR CYBER CHARTER SCHOOLS

Despite the District's success with the Southern York Digital Academy, cyber charter school costs continue to rise both in the amount and as a percentage of the overall budget. While the District pays approximately two percent of the budget to outside cyber charter schools, the York County and Pennsylvania district averages are approximately five percent. These are funds, mostly tax dollars, that are leaving the district to fund cyber charter schools. The District will continue its efforts to provide alternatives to cyber charter schools to provide a quality education to all students and keep the money at the district.



Total Charter School Expense - Fiscal Years 2017-2021




SYCSD FOUNDATION

The Southern York County School District Foundation, an organization led by a group of dedicated community volunteers, has a unique partnership with the district that has been very beneficial for students. The Foundation is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization that provides giving opportunities for scholarships, projects, equipment, supplies, and other purposes for the benefit of our students.

Other projects that the Foundation has partnered with the district on include providing students with school supplies, clothes, lunches, and eyeglasses through the welfare program. The Foundation also sponsored the Thank-You Card Contest which provided students with an authentic learning experience.

The Foundation's goal is to continue to add programs to help meet the needs of the community's students. The Innovative Grant Program provides teachers with funds to sponsor projects that extend learning beyond written academic standards and develop additional opportunities for students in the district.
