BLENDED LEARNING


Southern York County School District recognizes that some students learn better in environments outside of the traditional school setting. We support blended learning environments and offer students choices to fit their educational needs including our online Digital Academy and Dual Enrollment programs.

DIGITAL ACADEMY

Our Southern York Digital Academy was created in 2011 to implement a quality, personalized online learning environment that challenges students to achieve their potential. The Academy provides students with an educational choice where they are able to enjoy a flexible schedule with access to learning 24/7, participate in any co-curricular or extracurricular school activities and are taught by Southern's staff of highly qualified teachers.


In addition to taking classes online, Digital Academy students have the option to attend classes on campus. Graduates of the Southern York Digital Academy receive a Susquehannock High School Diploma.

The Academy is an option for students who may learn better in an online environment outside of the school setting. It has been extremely competitive with outside cyber schools and has enabled us to keep resources within our District. When SYCSD students choose to enroll in cyber charter schools outside of the District, we are required to pay the student's tuition to the outside school.



BLENDED LEARNING

Despite the District's success with the Southern York Digital Academy, cyber charter school costs continue to rise both in the amount and as a percentage of the overall budget. While the District pays approximately 1.7% of the budget to outside cyber charter schools, the Pennsylvania district average is close to 6%. These are funds, mostly local tax dollars, that are leaving the district to fund cyber charter schools. The District will continue its efforts to provide alternatives to cyber charter schools to provide a quality education to all students and keep the money in the district.

DUAL ENROLLMENT

The District has partnered with colleges to offer juniors and seniors the opportunity to earn college credit while completing their high school requirements.

Finalized agreements with Penn State York, York College, and Harrisburg Area Community College permit eligible students to enroll in on-campus courses for a fraction of the normal cost. Students receive college credits as well as high school credit for these courses.

College classes may be taken during or after school. During the 2018-19 school year, 25 Susquehannock students were enrolled in this program.


HIGH STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

SAT SCORES

The SAT assessment is utilized by many colleges and universities in the admissions process. SHS students performed well beyond the state and national averages on the SAT, and these assessment results reflect the efforts







HIGH STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

SYCSD FOUNDATION

The Southern York County School District Foundation, an organization led by a group of dedicated community volunteers, has a unique partnership with the District, that has been very beneficial for students. The Foundation is a 501(c)(3) charitable organization that provides giving opportunities for scholarships, projects, equipment, supplies, and other purposes for the benefit of our students.

Other projects that the Foundation has partnered with the District on include providing students with school supplies, clothes, lunches, and eyeglasses through the welfare program. The Foundation also sponsored both the Thank You Card contest and Flower Project which provided students with authentic learning.

The Foundation's goal is to continue to add programs to help meet the needs of the community's students. The Innovative Grant Program provides teachers with funds to sponsor projects that extend learning beyond written academic standards and develop additional opportunities for District students.



FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

The Southern York County School District Board of Education and Administration understand that the resources for the community's schools are funded by our community. Since the Free School Act of 1834, a larger share of public education has been paid by local communities and that continues today. As shown in the graph below, 67% of the cost of education for 2018-19 was funded from local dollars, 32% from state, and only 1% from federal and other revenue.



REVENUE SOURCES BY PERCENT

The District is proud of its sustained record of good stewardship of the community's funds as evidenced with the following:

- 2018-2019 audit had an unmodified opinion, which is the best opinion an auditor can give. Additionally, there were no findings in the financial statement audit, single audit, and the most recent auditor general audit.
- General Fund Unreserved Fund Balance exceeds 5% of budget target, which is necessary at the local level because the state does not always provide timely funding.
- Fund Balance has been reserved for future building renovations. Reserving fund balance enables the district to slowly phase in millage necessary for capital projects and also to save on interest by reducing borrowing.
- Financial condition of the District supports a high quality educational program at a reasonable cost per student.

FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY

COST TO EDUCATE A STUDENT

A question that many community members often ask is: "How much does it cost to educate a student?" The chart below shows the most recent information from the Pennsylvania Department of Education. As shown, Southern is ranked at 258 out of 500 districts for overall cost per student and 229 overall for average instructional expense. Southern prides itself on putting as many of our resources into the classroom as possible. Southern's overall cost per student is less than the median and slightly above the median for instructional expenses. As shown previously in this report, the District's student achievement is well above the state and national averages.

Also reflected in the chart is that Southern is in the top third of Pennsylvania School Districts for size, which plays a role in the cost to educate a student.




2019-20 BUDGET

Southern York County School District works hard to provide a rigorous, high-quality education for each and every student while adhering to fiscally responsible ideals. When budgeting, the District looks at the impact of decisions on the current year, but also the impact to the community for the future.

The Southern York County School District adopted a \$57.9 million budget for the 2019-20 fiscal year. The budget includes an assumption of no increased state funding, \$1.5 million use of fund balance, and we are pleased to report no real estate tax increase. The budget is based upon the priorities of providing an excellent educational program to prepare our students to be career or college and life ready while maintaining our outstanding facilities at a level our community supports. To meet these priorities, the budget includes restoration of several teaching positions, curriculum additions, long-range planning for technology device replacement, and a phase-in of debt service for building renovations.

As noted in the actual cost to educate a student, the priority in budgeting is to operate as efficiently as possible to drive dollars to areas that impact student achievement. This is balanced with also making sure that there is safe and efficient transportation, well-maintained, secure facilities for students to learn and thrive, technology for students and staff, and support services in place to meet the needs of every student.



2019-2020 EXPENDITURES

The Board and administration seriously consider the impact an increase in taxes has on its community members and were able to balance this budget without any additional increase. The 2019-20 budgeted expenditures are \$740,000 or 1.29% higher than 2018-19.

Based upon the budget priorities, changes were made to the budget including restoring two professional staff positions, restoration of a full-time custodial position, and the addition of two personal assistants to meet individual student needs. With the addition of the professional staff positions, there are 227 professional staff for 2019-20, which compares to 248 in 2009-10.

Other budget additions included lease costs for elementary technology devices, the implementation of a math program at Southern Middle School, a reading diagnostic and intervention program, increases to building and department budgets, and increases for cyber charter school costs.

The budget also includes 0.20 mill for future debt service payments to be used to fund long-term facility needs and updates. This will allow the district to continue to maintain our beautiful facilities for the use of generations to come.

2019-20 MILLAGE RATES

A mill levy is the number of dollars a taxpayer pays for every \$1,000 of assessed value. The current 2019-20 real estate tax rate of 19.39 mills results in a tax bill of \$1,939 for a home assessed at \$100,000. The table below shows the real estate tax mills of the District in comparison to other York County districts in the Lincoln Intermediate Unit.
