#### Talk Sup Week 31 Review and Preview

April 22, 2024

Good morning Sayreville! I hope you had a relaxing and enjoyable holiday weekend. Welcome to another edition of Talk Sup, my weekly newsletter. Please remember that we will dismiss students <u>early</u> today, Monday, April 22<sup>nd</sup> so that our staff can participate in professional development. Likewise, please note that our schools will be <u>closed</u> tomorrow, Tuesday, April 23<sup>rd</sup> in observance of Passover.

If you did not have a chance to attend the Board of Education (BOE) Business Meeting held on Tuesday,



April 16, 2024, here is what you missed. Sean Burns from Sayreville War Memorial High School (SWMHS), and Ashten Poandl from the Sayreville Middle School (SMS) began the meeting by providing their respective Student Council Representative to the Board of Education Reports. Next, Mrs. Bloom expressed her opening remarks, as did Mrs. Napolitano, who also shared some district highlights.

The Board then moved the action items from the Superintendent's Report onto the Board Agenda and approved them all. To see the Agenda, click <a href="here">here</a>. Among other motions, on the Vision 2030 Finance and Infrastructure portion of the agenda, the BOE approved the purchase of technology subscription/licensing items for the 2023-2024 school year in the total amount of \$96,180, and security hardware items in the amount of \$94,332.03 from CDW Government Inc. through the ESCNJ Cooperative Purchasing Pricing System Contract Technology Supplies and Services. Additionally, it awarded the bid for Mechanical Upgrades at the Dwight D. Eisenhower Elementary School and Woodrow Wilson Elementary School to Unitemp Mechanical Degrees, LLC as the lowest responsible bidder for bids opened on April 12, 2024, in the amount \$9,378,000, to be paid for using funds from the Bond Referendum

On the Student Achievement portion of the agenda, the Board approved the long-term suspension of several students. On the Governance portion of the agenda, among other motions, the BOE approved revisions to Board of Education Policy 5570 Sportsmanship and Policy and Regulation 8660 Student Transportation for a second reading and adoption. To read them click on each. It also approved revisions to the 2023-24 School District Calendar, which makes the last day of school for both students and staff Monday, June 24, 2024. Likewise, the Board approved revisions to the 2024-25 School District Calendar, which changes the Juneteenth school holiday from June 20, 2025 to June 19, 2025. To review each calendar, click on them. Lastly, the BOE approved the 2024 Summer Hours for Administrators, Secretaries, Technicians, and Technology Engineers.

On the Personnel portion of the agenda, as well as other motions, the Board of Education graciously accepted the retirements of Sheila Berman, Special Education Teacher at the high school, Lisa Greene, 2<sup>nd</sup> Grade Teacher at the Truman School, Maria Basile, Cafeteria Manager/Cook at the middle school, effective July 1, 2024, and Donna Midgely, Administrative Secretary in Central Office, effective May 1, 2024. The



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BOE also appointed new certificated and non-certificated staff for the 2023-24 school year. Likewise, the Board approved the transfer of non-certificated staff for the 2023-24 school year. In addition, the BOE appointed staff to perform science tutoring at the middle school. Likewise, it appointed staff to work in the Advanced Placement Summer Boot Camp from July 1, 2024, and August 1, 2024, on an as-needed basis dependent on student enrollment. Lastly, it appointed staff to perform Summer IEP Work.

During the Open Public Comment portion of the meeting, one parent and several non-residents of Sayreville continued to express concern about BOE Policy 5756 Transgender Students. In addition, a high school student commented about the 2023-24 School District Calendar and suggested revisions to it. She also expressed her support for Policy 5756 Transgender Students. During the Board Discussion portion of the meeting, Ms. Hill reviewed what was discussed during the last Finance and Infrastructure Committee Meeting, as did Mrs. Pieloch for the last Personnel Committee Meeting. Mrs. Bloom also shared news from the Middlesex County School Boards Association.

The next meeting will take place at 7:30 pm on Tuesday, May 7<sup>th</sup> in the SUES Board Room. During this meeting, the district will hold the mandatory public hearing for the 2024-25 School District Budget before the Board of Education votes on it and potentially adopts it. The agenda for this meeting will be posted on the district website on May 3<sup>rd</sup>. A complete copy of the April 16<sup>th</sup> Business Meeting Minutes will be posted on the BOE Meeting Minutes page of the website once they are approved by the BOE during the next BOE Meeting on May 7, 2024.
