SOMERSET AND MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS AT KEAN UNIVERSITY

THE 2024 ELEMENTARY & MIDDLE SCHOOL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

was hosted by the Diversity Council on Global Education and Citizenship at Kean University. The program featured a keynote speaker and cross-district collaboration on matters of acceptance, countering hate, and honoring diversity. Students from Kittatinny Regional High School presented on their Holocaust Resource Center, memorials dedicated to survivors, and their "Wall Of Hope". They introduced genocide information about The Holocaust and the Rwandan Genocide, Cambodian Genocide with maps, timelines, commemorative events, and artwork. Their presentation inspired change-makers to improve their own communities. .

North Plainfield Middle and Somerset School students teamed up with peers from districts across New Jersey to tackle challenges they experience at their own schools. They began the process of creating action plans and were encouraged to think big about the issues identified at their schools. Students were encouraged to find ways to:

- Become stronger leaders
- Get involved with the Diversity Council
- End bullying
- Promote peace and end war
- Remember survivors of war and other experiences
- Represent and respect diverse cultures in the classroom
- Advocate for disability awareness
