CSD Federal Program Funding Sources

Title I, A: Improving the Academic Achievement of the Disadvantaged

Title II, A: Preparing, Training and Recruiting High Quality Teachers and Principals

Title III, A: Language Instruction for English Learners (EL) and Immigrant Students (IMM)

Title IV, A: Student Support and Academic Enrichment (SSAE)

Title I, Part A (Title I) of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, as amended by the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESEA) provides financial assistance to Local Educational Agencies (LEAs) and schools with high numbers or high percentages of children from low-income families to help ensure that all children meet challenging state academic standards.



Schools in which children from low-income families make up at least 40 percent of enrollment are eligible to use Title I funds to operate schoolwide programs that serve all children in the school in order to raise the achievement of the lowest-achieving students. CSD also must use Title I funds to provide Title I services to eligible children enrolled in private schools.



Title I, A Schoolwide Programs (SWP)



SWP Program Goal

A schoolwide program is a comprehensive reform strategy designed to **upgrade the entire educational program** in a Title I school

The primary goal is to ensure that **all students**, *particularly those who are low-achieving*, demonstrate proficient and advanced levels of achievement of the state academic standards



SWP Basic Requirements

- 1. Coordinate federal, state and local resources and services to upgrade the entire educational program in the school
- 2. Ensure all children meet core standards, especially those who have demonstrated low performance
- 3. Approved School (Schoolwide) Plan



SWP Poverty Requirement

- A school may operate a schoolwide program if at least
 40% of the children are from low income families.
- Schools must explain how a Schoolwide Program would best serve the needs of students in the school and how it will improve academic achievement and/or other factors.



SWP Allowable Use of Funds

- Schoolwide tiered model to prevent and address problem behavior, early intervening services (IDEA coordination)
- Upgrading the curriculum
- Teacher support activities
- Formative or interim assessments and/or screening
- Expanded learning opportunities
- Counseling and mental health programs

- Mentoring programs
- Access to advanced coursework
- Student behavior supports
 - Credit recovery
 - Incorporate the concept of
 - well-rounded education
 - Increasing family and community engagement
- School climate interventions



SWP Allowable Use of Funds

 The plan and its implementation shall be regularly reviewed and revised at least annually based on student needs to ensure that all students are provided opportunities to meet the challenging State academic standards.



Supplement, not supplant (SNS)

Title I-A funds can only be used to supplement the funds that would, in the absence of such federal funds, be made available from state and local sources and not to supplant those funds.



SWP Plan Evaluation

Plan must be annually evaluated by the school with the assistance of the LEA;

- using data; and
- to determine if the program is effective in increasing the achievement of students to meet the State's academic standards, particularly for those students who are not achieving the standards.



Parent and Family Engagement (PFE)

The U.S. Dept of Education defines parent and family engagement as "the participation of parents in regular, two-way and meaningful communication involving student academic learning and other school activities."

Parent and Family Engagement is one of the key pillars of Title I, emphasizing the importance of involving parents and families in their children's education.

The idea is that when parents are actively engaged in their children's education, students are more likely to:

- Succeed academically
- Have better attendance rates
- Display positive behavior in school




Parent and Family Engagement (PFE)

LEAs receiving \$500,000 or more in Title I funds must set aside 1% for Parent Engagement

- 90% of the 1% must be spent at the building level
- Funds at LEA level must be include one of the following:
 - Professional development for school and LEA personnel on parent and family engagement strategies;
 - Supporting programs that reach parents and family members at home, in the community, and at school;
 - Disseminating information on best practices;
 - Collaborating, or providing schools with subgrants to collaborate, with community-based or other organizations to improve parent and family engagement; and/or



Title II, Part A, is a 100% Federally funded supplemental educational program that provides financial assistance to improve the skills of teachers and the quality of instruction in core academic subjects in public and private elementary and secondary schools.

- Professional Development (PD)
- •Must meet the teacher's identified teaching needs related to improving student academic achievement
- •PD program for NP school teachers does not have to be the same as the PD for public school teachers.


•Non-public student counts for both English Learner (EL) and Immigrant (IMM) are required
