According to Newsela, the fastest person currently recorded is the sensational, Jamaican athlete Usain Bolt. In the 2008 Summer Olympics in Beijing, China, he ran a 100 meter run in a whopping 9.58 seconds. And amazingly at one point of the race he managed 40 ft per second, which can also be equivalent to 24.3 mph.

The fastest runners tend to use less energy per step, which creates this lasting endurance and increased speed. And the ability to do this is usually inherited from parents, gender, or genetics, and distribution of muscles.

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


Star Wars Slowdown

Q: Who are the leaders of Drama Club?








Crowell On The National Debt


The Schoolwide Taste Test

Saving Our Oceans from Environmental Ruin?


