Concrete That Absorbs Greenhouse Gases

According to Newsela, there is a type of concrete with bacteria inside of it that takes up greenhouse gases.

"These microbes pull carbon dioxide out of the air and use it to grow. In the process, they make a mineral that helps toughen the new concrete, notes Wil Srubar." Wil is part of the team that



develops the concrete. His team mixed the bacteria called "cyanobacteria" with gelatin, sand, and calcium to create the cement.

Cyanobacteria needs light and carbon dioxide, a greenhouse gas, to survive using a process called



photosynthesis. As the bacteria photosynthesizes, it creates little crystals called calcium carbonate which makes concrete stronger. Unfortunately, the concrete has some problems. "Other microbes

might get into the mix. If those microbes grow faster than the cyanobacteria, they could take over." Also, the bacteria can't live in dry or cold places.

The Return Of Blue Bees

According to usatoday.com, researchers in Florida have rediscovered an "ultra-rare" metallic blue bee that hadn't been spotted in years. Experts weren't sure if the blue bees still existed. Chase Kimmel, a Florida's Museum of Natural History researcher, found a blue calamintha bee on March 9. It was the first time one had been spotted since

2016. Since then, more of the elusive bees have been spotted, but efforts to research the insect have been curtailed by the coronavirus pandemic.



"It's a unique insect for a number of reasons", Kimmel said. The bee collects pollen on its face. It relies on a threatened flowering plant. The bee has been found in four locations. But it was not an easy task. Even though he has found the bee in multiple sites, it actually took hours and sometimes days to find one.

for it had come to save them they were oh so sure but when it dove down they knew it was the end for the world


an apocalypse unleashed the bird was lured to the people's torches for they were insecure
