for State-aid Shortfalls from the 2% Property Tax Levy Cap

As Sayville School District begins the budget process for the 2012-2013 School Year, we are faced with the fiscal challenge introduced by New York State's new 2% property tax <u>levy</u> cap (not a tax <u>rate</u> cap—there is a difference; see excerpt below*).

To help explain this distinction, a comprehensive article entitled "Understanding New York's Property Tax Levy Cap as it Relates to Public Schools" has been uploaded to our Sayville School District Website under the Business Office link, so residents can read it in its entirety. This publication also provides some initial information that will dispel certain myths, misinformation, and misconceptions surrounding a 2% property tax levy cap. (Please note: NYS Comptroller's Office, State Education

Department, and NYS Department of

Taxation and Finance must still finalize the details and provisions.)

The extent to which the new tax levy law results in the loss of educational and support programs will depend on the levels of State Education funding and whether State leaders offer any meaningful mandate-relief measures to help control rising costs.

Since the District is faced with a rather complex formula that is not necessarily limited to a 2% property tax cap, we have begun discussions earlier about the budget development process and the effect the tax cap will have on that process. Please check the Business Office website link often for updates and information, such as the schedule for Budget discussions, as well as links to the Rollover Budget Presentation and further developments.

* DOES THE NEW TAX CAP LAW MEAN SCHOOL TAX LEVIES CAN'T INCREASE BY MORE THAN

2 PERCENT? No, the law does NOT PROHIBIT tax levy increases greater than 2 percent. Despite how it's been described by some politicians and the media, the legislation signed into law in June requires every district to calculate its own "tax levy limit." Two percent (or the rate of inflation, if less) is just one of eight factors in this calculation. The law also establishes a higher threshold of voter approval for a budget to pass if a district's proposed tax levy increase (before exemptions outlined in the law) exceeds its individual "tax levy limit."

(RIGHT) Implications of the 2% Property Tax Levy Cap on the 2012-2013 Rollover Budget

While the budget discussion is still in its early stages, the District must explore different options in planning next year's budget. This excerpt from the first of the Business Office's online reports examines the "rollover" budget. Total Adjusted Tax Levy Limit Cap: \$56,118,496 (2.37%) (See Tax Levy Cap Worksheet)

Tax Levy for 2012-13 Pro-forma Budget: - \$56,915,767

Under/(Excess) Levy Over Cap Formula: (\$797,271)

The excess amount of \$797,271 over the 'Total Adjusted Tax Levy Cap' would need to be reduced from the Budget or additional revenues received to meet the requirements of the Tax Cap Legislation.

Alternatively, if NO adjustments were made, the Budget would be required to pass by 60% of the voters.



Lowering THE Tax-Rate Increase to 6.65%

gain this year, the Sayville School District and the Board of Education were able to lower the homestead tax-rate increase from the original voter-approved 7.39 percent that was passed during the May 2011 Budget Vote.

The 2011

After the Town of Islip makes it annual determination regarding the "Assessed Valuation" and "Base Allocation" of all properties in Sayville, the District and the Board of Education set the final tax levy.

- I. ASSESSED VALUATION This is the 4th consecutive year that we have seen a total decrease in our assessed valuation. The assessed valuation is reflective of all taxable properties throughout the Sayville community. Unfortunately, as this number decreases, every resident picks up a little bigger piece of the pie.
- 2. Base Allocations (between homestead and nonhomestead properties). Again, there has been a 1% shift from homestead (residential) to nonhomestead (commercial) property values.

It is to the Board's credit that again, as in the previous years, the projected tax rate increase has been reduced to rates lower than originally proposed at Budget time. We would like to assure the community that we are working hard on your behalf. We also wish to thank you for your continued support of the educational opportunities for our students.

It was My Favorite Year

FOR THE MIDDLE SCHOOL MUSICAL

MY FAVORITE YEAR, the musical presented by Sayville Middle School, had such demanding comic timing, intricate staging, and challenging musical score that it could have fallen short of being anyone's favorite anything. Yet, the talented performers and stage crew, under the remarkable guidance of their directors, worked great magic (as they to do every year), resulting in a show with comic characters that charmed, singing that more than satisfied, sets that transformed magnificently, and acting that was so believable, it was only "unbelievable" when one realized the performers were Middle School students!

The year,1954, was "not my best year, not the year I had the most success, but my favorite year," says junior Comedy Show writer Benjy Stone (defily portrayed with genuine likeability by Sean McNally) because it was the year he finally would meet his favorite swashbuckler movie idol Alan Swann.

Once smashingly famous, now mostly smashed Alan Swann (played with a proper balance of dash and poignancy by Sean Velazquez) must fill an otherwise empty guest spot on the popular "live" TV variety hour, the King Kaiser Comedy Show. Benjy's important mission is to keep Swann sober and out of trouble before his guest appearance in The Musketteer Sketch. This is an especially challenging task since "funnyman" and show star King Kaiser (amusingly blended with bluster and blister by Raymond Ebarb) is renowned for his absurd tantrums and superstitions that intimidate his entire staff.

Relying on Benjy's success are his professional cohorts: head writer Sy Benson (puffed to generous proportions by Jamie Baio), co-writers Leo Silver and Herb Lee (played humorously by comic duo Mark Ambrosini and Dylan Finder), as well as Alice Miller (brought to life by the fabulous Rowen Mahoney), who is the beleaguered comedienne and perpetual "second banana" to the spotlight-hogging King Kaiser. Yet, it would be all work and no play for Benjy if it were not for his love interest—the only person employed at the show missing a funnybone—K.C. Downing (comically delivered by the lovely voiced Mary Nichols).

Of course, what junior comedy writer in the 50s doesn't have a Jewish mother? Benjy's mother, Belle May Steinberg Carroca (performed with both convincing accent and splendid voice by Jillian Brudi), is a well-intentioned meddler who has

finally found her own happiness with the goodhearted exfighter Rookie Carroca (played as the strong, silent type by Tyler Powers) and Belle wants Benjy to have the same chance at happiness.

Yet, as the story unfolds through the song and dance numbers, Benjy discovers that "happiness" can be elusive even for the famous. Mending broken hearts, broken lives, and broken dreams may be an enormous undertaking for one junior writer, but the lessons Benjy learned about life and love remained as fond memories in his favorite year.

My Favorite Year deserves applause for every performer, from the leads to the supporting cast, including those amusing Brooklyn relatives Uncle Morty, Aunt Sadie, city dwellers, Maxford House Girls, and COMEDY SHOW crew. Bravos also go to the Middle School musical's experts: Director Jeff Hoffman, Musical Director Fred Diekmann, Producer Kristi Woerner, Sound Andrew Giammalvo, Lighting Steve Hailey, Set Construction Ken VanEssendelft, and Artwork Cora Sparwasser, as well as the smooth operators among the production crew, high school volunteers, and parent volunteers. Also a special mention should be given to Sean Mac Production (Sean McNally) for providing the entertaining "movie sequence" within the play.
