### The Mercedes G. Astor Scholarship Winner and Alternate

Since September 1968, Dowling College Benefactor John Astor established the annual Mercedes G. Astor Memorial Scholarship to honor his late wife, Mercedes. The winner is required to attend a four-year college or university in the United States.

Each year since then, the top twenty Sayville Seniors bid for the scholarship, valued at \$4,000 (\$1,000 per college year) by submitting their applications in anonymity. These students must be nominated by a school authority and have had to demonstrate excellence in scholastics, character, leadership qualities, extracurricular participation, social

behavior, exemplary citizenship, and the ability to get along well with others. Additionally, the candidates are asked to write letters explaining what makes them deserving of this award. Their submissions undergo a review process by which the winner is selected. Although again this year, all the submissions were outstanding, congratulations go to Class of 2007 Seniors Matthew Santoro for winning this year's Mercedes G. Astor Memorial Scholarship and to Viral Patel who was named the alternate. In the fall, Matt plans to attend Boston College and Viral has accepted Northeastern.

### Awards & Honors

Four Sayville Middle School students, Katie V., Elizabeth K., and Curran and Garret B., who participate in the Sayville's **Young Science Researchers Club**, were among the 150 Long Island participants (60 at the sixth- and seventh-grade level) to compete in the Ninth Annual Science Fair in the Honors Program at Nassau Community College.




Special thanks go to the Social Studies Department moderators, who in lieu of an official debate club, annually organize these schoolwide debates to give students a feel for the forum.

### SEEDLING LAW STUDENTS

Their legal caseload is challenging. It requires applying all their literary, civic, and math skills to solve problems.



No, this is not your trendy law firm. This is a Classroom, Inc.'s computer simulation program used by Mrs. Jean Galima's seventh-grade SEED students (or SEEDlings, as she calls them). In the West End Law simulation, students take on the law in a "real-life context" program that is modeled on the law profession. In small groups, the students examine the pros and cons of presented facts upon which they make decisions that will affect the operation, reputation, and clientele of the general practice law firm, West End Law. They learn about copyrights, contract language and terms, how jury selection is done and what motions are used in courts.

Student Gabrielle Pacia, who wants to be a lawyer,, feels this program has helped her understand the process. Jessica Rosati and Tiffany Bruno think it's "challenging yet riveting, because you never know how a case will turn out. We learn from our errors."

This ongoing SEED activit, has the students agreeing: law is complicated.

### Sayville Four are Best in Media Arts Show

### AT THE 2007 LONG ISLAND MEDIA ARTS SHOW

Among the thirty-four Sayville students who accompanied Mr. Chad Cross, photography and graphics teacher, to the 2007 Long Island Media Arts Show, hosted by Five Towns College, sixteen submitted their designs and photography in the competition. With thousands of works submitted in this year's show, Mr. Cross' students, who take **Independent Study Photography** or Advanced Computer Graphics courses, expected to learn much from what they viewed and how the professors and professionals would judge the entries.

"We are a small school and with only sixteen students

competing out of four thousand," Mr. Cross said. "It is easy to see how we might fly under the radar. Only sixty of those four thousand students were given the best in show ribbon, including four of Sayville's own: Sarah Paul and Christina Maneri for photography, and Kevin Kwiatkowski and Dan Calise for computer graphics."

Alicia Flinn, who submitted eight landscape pictures, "wasn't really nervous." She found more enjoyment in seeing what her peers were doing, and views the Media Arts Show as helpful to her future photography career. "I love photography for giving me the ability to express myself."

During the judging of his award-winning package-design graphic project, Kevin Kwiatkowski admitted he felt "nervous." After waiting two hours for the final evaluation from college professors and working professionals, Kevin appreciated their criticism, both good and bad, and viewed it as a tool he could use when he returned to the classroom. "Outside praise raises their confidence," Sayville Technology teacher Mr. Bryan Coon conceded and was as pleased as his colleagues Mr. Cross and Mr. Bill Vogel with Sayville's relatively high number of "Best in Show" recipients.

Faces, young and old, were beaming with love and excitement that day.




