The Intel¹ Science Talent Search selects Semifinalists based upon the students' individual research ability, scientific originality, and creative thinking. Capurso and Hahn were among the 82 Long Island high school semifinalists, out of 300 nationwide, chosen from among 1,558 entrants nationally in the 65th Annual Intel Science Competition. As a semifinalist, each student wins \$1,000, and the school receives an equal amount for each student winner. Additional awards will be presented to those who continue to finalist status, and in March, the winner will receive a top prize of \$100,000 during ceremonies in Washington, D.C.

¹ There are two separate competitions. The California-based computer-chip company Intel currently sponsors the competition that had formerly been sponsored by and known as the Westinghouse Competition. Another competition, the Siemens-Westinghouse Science Competition, announced its winners last month. This contest is sponsored by the German-based electronics firm Siemens Corp.

A Gift of Readings

In contrast to the weather outside—which was painfully frigid—inside the warmth of the holiday season welcomed the Middle School

Perhaps it is no surprise that the two Dans—who worked on distinctly separate science projects—have gained acclaim as Intel Science Talent Search Semifinalists. Known

affectionately by
the High School community as Dan² (Dan
Squared), both Seniors Daniel Capurso and
Daniel Hahn have usually garnered the
highest accolades for their many, albeit
parallel, achievements in various disciplines
throughout their high school careers. Their
authentic science research, conducted
through ongoing independent research and
mentoring sessions with Sayville Science
Research Advisor and Honors Science
Teacher Mrs. Adriana Adler, have been
consistently of the highest caliber.

Even before High School, Dan Capurso had wanted to conduct authentic research. As a Freshman, he worked with Mrs. Adler on various projects that gave him opportunity and experience. Among his early projects, he correlated avian, equine, and human cases of West Nile Virus with bird migratory patterns. During the summer, he participated in the Pine Barrens Research Camp and began a truly labor-intensive project: "Vegetative Analysis of a Glacial River Valley." In the fall of his Sophomore year, Capurso realized he needed to train and organize fellow Honors Science students to help him successfully complete his data collection before the leaves (and his information) died in Autumn. The success of this project was to Capurso's credit and became the basis for subsequent authentic scientific research for which Capurso placed or won in every competition he entered. After extensive fieldwork and statistical analysis of specie interaction between

blueberry and huckleberry in the Long Island Pine Barrens of Westhampton, Capurso made significant discoveries in both research methods as well as vegetation analysis, and submitted this project to the Intel Competition, earning him the semifinalist designation.

An independent thinker, Dan Hahn has proven to be an extraordinary and highly focused student. The goal, to submit authentic research to national and international science and mathematics competition, predates his High School years and was possibly ignited by the success of his older sister Katherine in such competitions.2 Once in High School and on his own volition, Hahn sought the mentorship of principal scientists at Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory to guide him on authentic and challenging research projects. Hahn's critical-thinking skills have given him an edge in both science and math, and have allowed him to pursue simultaneous research projects that spanned mathematics, genetics, and behavioral science. Applying mathematical concepts to his research, Hahn created novel correlations between Fibonacci and Lucas numbers. In addition, he completed his behavioral science project investigating sensitization of Drosophila, which he entered into the Intel Science Talent Search for which he earned the semifinalist status.

Maybe having both Capurso and Hahn named Intel Semifinalist is no surprise, but it's every bit rewarding!

² This is the second time Sayville has secured a semifinalist slot. In 2002, Dan Hahn's sister, Katherine, who also worked with Mrs. Adriana Adler, had been Sayville's first Intel Semifinalist.

ENGLISH & SPECIAL ED DEPARTMENTS PRESENT AT BOE MEETING

English Department Report by Chairperson Ann Duncan

Mrs. Duncan noted the Department's more recent accomplishments in aligning with NYS Learning Standards, ELA, SAT, and Regents testing requirements, and cited the department's plans, with the support of the curriculum office, to expand curriculum offerings in the electives programs. A greater menu of electives would include Creative Writing, Mythology, Humanities, Play Production, Film Studies, SAT Prep course, and a full-year course in journalism. (Already in the works, the special event "A Poet's Voice," involved Mrs. Sinishtaj's Creative Writing class. This class prepared its final project by organizing and encouraging students to meet at the Common Grounds for a poetry reading that included original student works.)

Mrs. Duncan concluded her report, acknowledging the assistance of the District and Building Administrators as well as her staff. "I thank them for their continued belief in the power and integrity of the written and spoken word, their dedication to helping all students succeed, and their willingness to work long and hard in support of both of these ideals."

Special Education Annual Report by Coordinator Mary Bohleber and Assistant Coordinator Christina Pulaski

Mrs. Bohleber and Mrs. Pulaski outlined the District's Special Education Programs, gave statistics and data about Students With Disabilities (SWD), disclosed the status of the State Education Department's Reviews of Sayville Special Education programs, and outlined the impact included a changed of the new changes in the Individuals with Disabilities Education

Reporting that Savville's Special Education K-12 program offers a full range of services designed to meet the students' needs in the Least Restrictive Environment, Mrs. Bohleber and Mrs.

Pulaski added that Savville's Special education program was commended by the State Education Department for keeping a high percentage of SWDs in general education settings. Also, the Coordinators highlighted aspects of the new IDEA that timeline of 60 calendar days for completed evaluations, expanded Improvement Act (IDEA). obligations for SWDs in parentally placed private schools, and eliminated the short-term objectives only in the CSE IEPs. Looking ahead, the Coordinators will implement the Continuous Improvement Plan as per the State review.

ey Days Kevisited

he annual visit to Frost Valley Environmental Education Center in upstate New York challenged the current Eighth-grade class with hands-on activities designed to complement a scholastic curriculum. From morning to night, under the guidance of Frost Valley personnel and Sayville faculty, students gained respect for the natural world by learning orienteering (using a compass), forest ecology, astronomy, geology, meteorology, night awareness, resources management (harvesting and managing woodlands), stream studies, and soil exploration. Meals were wholesome and nutritious, and after, students were entertained by Snakeman and Birdman, enjoyed square dancing, Karaoke, and games. Safety and trust challenges that taught the students social responsibility also helped to foster class camaraderie. Just as in years past, this year's students returned with memories of a meaningful experience.

Because some Eighth-graders were unable to take the Frost Valley Trip, Middle School Teacher Mrs. Joan Barkauskas, assisted by a team of faculty members, organized an alternative Environmental Studies program on Middle School grounds.

"The topic was Vermiculture, and the week revolved around 300 squirmy earthworms," Mrs. Barkauskas explained. Students researched the worms, learning that worms preferred a more basic, nonacidic soil to produce 'castings' of waste that are rich in nitrates. During Ms. Klepacki's food and nutrition lessons, the students learn how these nitrates are essential in growing healthy vegetables. The students also baked brownies, combined them with mousse, and created a tasty "worm cake."

With Miss Lloyd, the students focused on responsible choices in difficult life situations that may lie ahead as they enter High School. They culminated this session in a game of BINGO that challenged their skills in good decision-making.

Under the direction of Art Teacher Ms. Ainslie, the students created posters to advertise the upcoming school musical and accrued some community service time displaying them in town.

For physical fitness, Dr. Morgo had the students kicking and punching to the Billy Blanks Boot Camp workout tapes or line dancing with Ms. Barkauskas, who added, "Even the most reluctant students found themselves having fun as they became proficient."

In a closing ceremony, the students loosened the ground in the AIDS Garden and released the 300 worms after bidding them farewell. Learning how "these modest creatures perform an important job in our environment," the students afterwards showcased a display in the Commons as a tribute to Worm Week 2005.



MOON, MARS, and BEYOND

It was the year 2080, and NASA had a serious mission that involved research bases on both the Moon and Mars, and a lost spaceship containing two astronauts. NASA was preparing a rescue mission from the lunar base that would stop on Mars for supplies before locating and rescuing the astronauts in the spaceship.

What made this operation even more amazing was that Sayville's Lincoln Avenue Fifth-grade students had been recruited as "scientists" to work with Mission Control. Through the intervention of Teacher Integration Specialist Molly Licalzi from Model Schools, Mr. Bombara's class was selected to participate in the NASAsponsored Classroom of the Future, recently held at Stony Brook University.

The students took their responsibilities seriously. They were divided into teams to handle different aspects of the twofold mission: to locate the ship and to ascertain the number of crates of food, water, and oxygen needed to take the two rescued astronauts aboard. As the students downloaded data, made cargo calculations,

The Lincoln Avenue students' determination paid off. They successfully located the spaceship and properly prepared the rescue ship. With great anticipation, they watched a video that showed the rescue ship launch from Mars, travel and then dock with the disabled ship. When the astronauts opened the hatch to join the rescue ship, the students all cheered. The mission was a complete success. Commander Frank congratulated the students on their wonderful work.

In retrospect, the students liked the virtual reality of the situation, "...talking to Commander Frank" (Marissa)," ...plotting coordinates" (Britney), "...decoding the signs" (Kiki),

"...connecting the dots" (Alex), and





"...finding the lost spaceship" (Harry). While they may have differed about their favorite parts of the whole experience, they all agreed it was tremendous fun. To some degree, this exercise was just science fiction, but the innovative e-mission program of the Challenger Learning Center, provided by Wheeling Jesuit University, engaged the Lincoln Avenue students in simulations that employed the practical applications of scientific facts.
