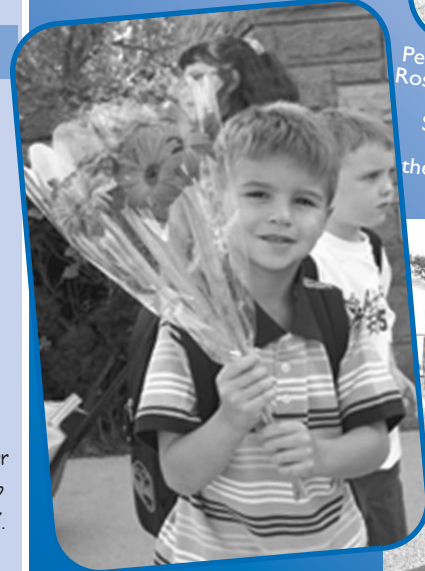

NY State Ed Initiates **QUALITY ASSURANCE REVIEW** on Special Education Students' Achievement in Sayville

The New York State Education Department's (NYSED) Office of Vocational and Educational Services for Individuals with Disabilities (VESID) has initiated a Special Education Quality Assurance Review in Sayville School District during the 2005-2006 school year. The purpose of the review is to assess the District's compliance with selected Federal and State laws and regulations governing the education of students with disabilities as well as its ability to meet key performance indicators identified by the State Education Department.

The review will be conducted by VESID's Special Education Quality Assurance office and will include representatives from the School District, community, and parents. The

focus of the review will be "*Achievement*" and will involve a review of school records of [randomly] selected students with disabilities, classroom visitations, and interviews with selected students with disabilities, administrators, teachers, related-service providers, and parents. Several meetings of the Committee on Special Education will be observed, and parents selected by VESID will be invited to participate in a Parent Forum, as well as being asked to complete a Parent Survey. A summary of the findings will appear in forthcoming District publications at the conclusion of the review. Further information may be obtained by contacting VESID's Special Education Quality assurance office in your region and/or your local School District.

REQUIRED NOTICE AS PER NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND (NCLB) LEGISLATION

President Bush signed NCLB legislation into law on January 8, 2002. It will remain in effect for six years. At that time it will be reviewed and reauthorized. The primary focus of Title I is improving the academic achievement of disadvantaged students. For school districts receiving Title I funds, there are a number of notices which must be shared with the public. These notices are noted and described below.

MILITARY RECRUITING

Parents of high school students: Districts receiving federal education funds under the **No Child Left Behind Act**, upon request, provide military recruiters and institutions of higher learning the names, addresses, and telephone numbers of high school students. This is unless students and their parents exercise their right to prohibit release of the information without prior written parental consent. In addition, districts must provide military recruiters with the same access to high school students generally provided to college and universities or prospective employers.

EQUAL ACCESS

School districts that allow outside groups to use public facilities may not deny access to, or discriminate against, the Boy Scouts of America or other youth groups listed as a patriotic society in Title 36 of the U.S. Code, based on the group's membership or leadership criteria or oath of allegiance to God and country. Patriotic society youth groups other than the Boy Scouts

include, for example, the Girls Scouts and the Boys and Girls Clubs of America.

SUPPLEMENTAL EDUCATION SERVICES

When schools receiving Title I funds fail to make adequate yearly progress for at least three consecutive years, those schools must make supplemental education services available to eligible students from low-income families who attend those schools. In addition, schools that continue to fail in subsequent years and are consequently identified for corrective action and/or restructuring, must continue to offer supplemental services to eligible students. School districts required to arrange for the provision of supplemental education services must meet annually, give parents of eligible students notice of the availability of the services, the identity of such providers, and a brief description of the services, qualifications, and demonstrated effectiveness of each provider. Supplemental education services must be provided outside of the

regular school day. A school district is not required to provide transportation to students receiving supplemental educational services.

PLACEMENT IN A LANGUAGE INSTRUCTION EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM

BILINGUAL OR ENGLISH AS A SECOND LANGUAGE PROGRAM
Parent Notification: Pursuant to No Child Left Behind and Commissioner's Regulations, parents or guardians must be notified of their child's placement in a manner and/or language that they can understand, be it a language instruction educational program, instructional bilingual, or freestanding English-as-a-second-language program. Parents must be informed of their options regarding their child's placement in any such program. Parent notification is required by the district within 30 days after the start of the school year, or within two weeks of placement in a program when the student was not identified as limited English proficient before the start of the year.

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Giving Chase in the Corporate Challenge

Participating in the 20th Annual J. P. Morgan Chase Corporate Challenge on Long Island, held on July 26th, Sayville School District personnel ran or walked a 3.5-mile stretch along Jones Beach with 7,252 contenders from 241 companies. Guest athlete Olympic Gold medalist Sarah Hughes offered encouragement during the Long Island celebration. In one of the hottest summers on record, the Sayville team accepted the challenge of high humidity, eased ever so slightly by ocean breezes. Despite the weather, the Sayville team of Heidenreich, Mattimore, Morgo, and Richter finished fifth overall out of 84 Womens Teams, and for a second year received Tiffany trophies for their achievement. They are now eligible to compete with top corporate teams in future competitions. SAYVILLE RECEIVES **Blue Ribbon** FROM **BUSINESS MAGAZINE**

Providing a service to its 45,000 corporate subscribers, *Expansion Management*, a monthly business magazine for executives, evaluates and reports on communities nationwide that hold promise for relocation or potential for a well-educated work force. As part of this assessment, the magazine has been producing the *Education Quotient*™, which rates secondary school districts throughout the United States with a district enrollment of at least 3,300 students. In its most recent edition of *Education Quotient*™, published December 2004, Sayville School District ranked in the top third nationally and was recognized as a Blue Ribbon school.

According to Chief Editor of *Expansion Management*, Bill King, the *EQ* makes this determination by focusing on results in three categories, based upon a weighted scale: "Graduate Outcome (how well students learn and how many stay to graduation); Resource Index (which measures a community's financial commitment to education; "Community Index (which measures the community's adult education and income levels)...By far the most important factors are the test scores and the graduation rates. That's the bottom line for potential employers," according to King. "They want to know if their

potential workers are smart enough to do the job, and if they will show up for work every day."

Superintendent Dr. Rosemary Jones was awarded the Blue Ribbon Certificate for Sayville School District as *Expansion Management's* way of saying thank-you for a job well done.

Katrina Relief Ongoing Efforts

Fitness Fridays

Addressing Epidemic Proportions

During the past academic year, Middle School Health Education teacher Jodi Maurici organized *Fitness Fridays* in response to the growing epidemic of childhood obesity.

This topic of obesity in children has been the subject "in countless articles," Mrs. Maurici explained. "The newest stats are indicating that 1 in 3 children of this generation will become obese due to a lack of exercise, an overabundance of convenience foods (fast food, prepackaged foods, and vending machines), and a failure to follow serving-size requirements. Childhood obesity is one of the largest causes of diabetes and heart disease," Mrs. Maurici added, "and a recent article stated that this generation may be the first to predecease their parents because of this trend."

While it is recommended that children and teens get 60-90 minutes of physical activity per day in addition to any sport they play, most children do not even come close to the requirement because of the inert distractions of video games and home media. "Couple this with the over abundance of sugar-filled soft drinks," Mrs. Maurici remarked,

"and we have an enormous problem on our hands. Just an FYI: a bottle of **Fruitworks** has more sugar content than is recommended per day for human consumption. This is why I've started *Fitness Fridays*."

Every Friday during the semester, Mrs. Maurici and students exercised to a video or did a routine and the children rated what they felt about the instructor, the music, the level of difficulty, and their enjoyment. Well, the kids LOVED IT! Doing a combination of cardio, strength, and yoga/flexibility, *Fitness Fridays* have enabled many students to begin making life changes.

This new school year, Mrs. Maurici is confident she can enlist more kids on board. The only impediment? A limited supply of exercise videos, hand weights, stability balls, medicine balls, etc. Donations to help this program grow would be greatly appreciated. Making a Fundraising Difference at Sunrise

Touching the lives of many in need, Sunrise Drive students were quite productive last year in various Physical Education fundraising efforts.

Under the guidance of Sunrise Physical education teachers Miss Hamilton and Mr. Cox, the students helped hurricane victims last fall through the American Red Cross. For only a quarter a piece, the students could purchase red, white, or blue paper sneakers and hang them on the wall. After the colorful sneakers filled the hall outside the gym, the students had contributed a total of \$165.

During February's successful *Jump Rope for Heart* program, students in Grades 3, 4, and 5 raised \$10,915 to help the American Heart Association in their research, educational, and community service programs.

In May, the student responded to *Island Harvest's 2005 Hunger Awareness Coin Harvest Campaign* by bringing their pennies from home to fill huge buckets in the gym. They raised \$848.94.

(Even the teachers at Sunrise, Lincoln and the High School joined forces to fundraise for *Go Red For Women*, the American Heart Association program geared to raising awareness about women's heart health, and raised \$505.)

"We wanted to help our students experience the great feeling of helping others with these community-service activities," Miss Hamilton said. "We especially would like to thank all the students and their families for their continued support. When you give to others, your return is always greater than what you give."
