Region 10 Schools Recognized by the State of Connecticut for High Achievement

he State of Connecticut Next Generation Accountability System has spotlighted the outstanding performance of schools in Region 10. This holistic accountability system, which goes beyond mere test scores and graduation rates, provides a multifaceted perspective on district and school success. Each year, the State of Connecticut compiles an accountability report for every school and district. This report reflect scores for a wide range of standards including academic achievement, academic growth, career and college readiness, access to the arts and many more. This year both Lake Garda Elementary School and Harwinton Consolidated Elementary School were recognized as State Schools of Distinction. This recognition distinguishes these schools as among the very best in the state. The Next Generation Accountability Standards and Report provides scores for all of

The Next Generation Accountability Standards and Report provides scores for all of the next generation accountability standards and also aggregates those scores into a cumulative performance index for every school and the district as a whole. Regional School District 10's District Performance Index for the 2022-2023 school year was 80.4 which places it among many of the top performing school districts in the state. These Next Generation Accountability Reports are used along with other important evidence of student growth and achievement as part of the Region 10 Annual Continuous Improvement Process.

Lewis Mills High School has secured a spot among the Top 10 High Schools with the highest percentage increase in enrollment for the UConn Early College Experience (ECE) program. From the academic year 2022-2023 to 2023-2024, Lewis Mills witnessed an impressive 115% surge in the total number of students enrolled in UConn courses through ECE, earning it the eighth position on the list.

One of the primary draws of the Lewis Mills ECE courses for students, is their guarantee of receiving UConn college credit upon achieving a grade of "C" or higher with the successful completion of the class. This unique feature has significantly contributed to the popularity of these courses among students, leading to the substantial increase in enrollment.

Lewis Mills began offering ECE classes over five years ago, in World Languages and continue to offer ECE sections in French, Spanish and Mandarin. They've continued to broaden their ECE course portfolio by including Human Rights, Popular Music and Mythology. Looking ahead, Lewis Mills remains committed to further expanding its ECE course offerings, aiming to provide students with even more opportunities for advanced learning and college credit attainment.

REGION 10 SECURITY

Keeping Our Schools Safe

Region 10 Schools are served by a team of resolute School Security Officers (SSO) and one School Resource Officer (SRO). The School Resource Officer, SRO Matt Funchion, serves as the Region 10 Director of Security and handles all law enforcement functions for the school. SRO Funchion is a sworn Burlington Police Officer, and retired Connecticut State Trooper. He assesses school security measures to ensure they are adequate and applied correctly and effectively. With technology constantly evolving, the SRO regularly searches for new security options to further enhance our schools' safety. It is also SRO Funchion's duty to investigate any crimes, threats, motor vehicle concerns, or suspicious activity in or around the schools. SRO Funchion closely collaborates with

each of the SSO's to facilitate all of this. Each Region 10 school has one SSO assigned to it during the day, and Lewis Mills also has an evening shift SSO that covers after-school activities. All of these security personnel are retired police officers. Connecticut State Statute requires that an armed SSO must be retired from a local, State, or Federal Law Enforcement agency. Additionally, Region 10 requires SSO candidates have a minimum of 15 years of police service.

Annual training consists of numerous school security concepts including student environment, firearms qualifications, medical training, and response to active aggressors. Most notably, these officers are "outward facing," meaning they are not part of school discipline. They do not enforce



school rules or address minor student behavioral issues. Their job is to maintain a safe perimeter for the school, keep strangers or intruders out, sign in visitors, and to address threats of violence.

Together, Region 10's security team's primary mandate is to project a sense of safety and security so teachers can teach, and students can learn. They are all dedicated to that mandate and to do whatever it takes to keep these schools safe. Region 10 is fortunate to have such a committed team of professionals serving our community and safeguarding our students and staff.

See Something, Say Something: School Security & Safety Starts at Home

SRO Matt Funchion, Principal Rau and Principal Masi recently held assemblies for the students of Lewis Mills High School and Har-Bur Middle School on the topic of See Something, Say Something. Region 10 has dedicated and well-trained School Security Officers but they cannot do their jobs in a vacuum. They need school security to be a topic that starts at home. Our greatest assets in school safety are the many eyes and ears of our students. Many students will tell parents, trusted adults, or relatives about things they have seen or heard, or suspicious or alarming activity. Kids are great judges of what is and is not normal at our schools. If your student comes to you with something that is suspicious, alarming, does not make sense, or seems threatening, don't dismiss it. Encourage them to report it IMMEDIATELY to a school administrator, teacher, or other appropriate adult. If it seems like a criminal act or threat, contact law enforcement IMMEDIATELY. You can call 911 for something that you genuinely think could be a safety issue. The sooner they know about it, the sooner they can rule it out as an innocent misunderstanding, or prevent a problem before it happens. Teach your kids that part of being a community is looking out for one another. School security and safety starts at home. Please teach your kids, if you see something, say something.

A Message From the Board

reetings! The Board of Education is excited to share more about the work we do in subcommittees each month. In our last article we shared with you the sub-committees we have. This month we would like to highlight the outcomes of our technology sub-committee, which was formed 9 years ago to elevate the use of technology throughout Region 10. Initially the focus was on improving our infrastructure and platforms. Over time we moved all our servers to the cloud, completely upgraded our wireless capabilities and greatly improved our networks, security, backups, and redundancy. We also decided to provide laptop/ tablet Windows computers with Microsoft Office 365 to each student with a five-year refresh plan. Other school

The Technology Committee currently consists of several members of the Board of Education as well as Joseph Sousa (Director of Technology), Chris Weaver (Director of Information Know? Systems), and Vonetta Romeo-Rivers (Director of Teaching & Learning)

systems were using Chrome Workbooks and Google Docs, but we thought the combination of Windows laptops and Microsoft Office 365 was a better choice.

Once the infrastructure and platforms were in place, we shifted our attention to technology use in the classroom and professional development. Ideally, we would like to integrate our technology use with curriculum for all grades K-12 following educational best practices. This is what we are working on now and we have established a five-year strategic plan that is continuously updated and improved.

The Technology Committee, over the years, has been focused on three major components to enhance Region 10's use of technology and adoption in our schools.

- **1** Infrastructure platforms which and include our wireless network, security, laptops, software such as Microsoft
- 2 Establishing technology integration goals and measures at grade level for K-12 which includes technology educational incorporating national standards and best practices into our curriculum.
- 3 Providing the technical support and professional development needed to achieve our grade level goals in a consistent and effective manner.

We currently feel we have a strong infrastructure and platforms component, with a five-year replacement cycle on laptops that each student receives. We also believe that using laptops and Microsoft Office 365 is helpful for students by providing experience with products that are heavily used in business and industry.

Our Director of Technology Joseph Sousa along with Chris Weaver, Director of Information Systems and Vonetta Romeo-Rivers, Director of Teaching & Learning maintain and constantly revise a five-year strategic plan that presently is heavily focused on our integration goals, curriculum, and professional development.

To that end, we are now in the Discovery Phase of our understanding of AI and its implications for teaching and learning. This is a very exciting and important endeavor, and we will be making decisions with many considerations at a logical pace which are going to positively impact the learning lives of students and educators both in the short- and long-term. In the Teacher-of-the-Year Program, we are not attempting to single out any individual as the best teacher in Region 10, but to honor one teacher who is representative of all the excellent teachers in our district who embody excellence.

The rules are few and they are simple:

- ♦ Nominations should be made without regard to race, age, sex, or national origin.
- Nominees should be exceptionally skillful and dedicated, working in grades pre-kindergarten through 12, who have been employed for a minimum of three years with the Region 10 Board of Education.
- All certified school personnel are eligible. The major purpose of the program is to recognize the multitude and diversity of contributions of our teachers.
- ♦ Nominees should have the respect and admiration of students, parents, and co-workers who are all valuable stakeholders within our teaching and learning community.
- The most important qualification is that the teacher has a superior ability inspire love of learning in students of

all backgrounds and abilities.

The daily life of a member the Regional School District Facilities Department -Groundskeeping Team is one of feast or famine. Whether in the 90-degree heat or the 30-degree cold, they brave the outside weather conditions to fulfill their responsibilities of maintaining a professional appearance for our school grounds and playing fields.
