Welcome to AP U.S. History! APUSH is a challenging course that is designed to be the equivalent of a freshman college course in a high school setting. It is a survey of American history from exploration to the present. To succeed in this class, you will need solid reading and writing skills, along with a willingness to devote considerable time to homework and study. We will emphasize critical and evaluative thinking skills, essay writing, and interpretation of original source documents and scholarly research. The good news is that the historical thinking skills you will learn are highly transferable; the ability to reason chronologically, to compare and contextualize events, to interpret and synthesize, and to craft and substantiate an argument are applicable to many other academic and practical disciplines, and they will serve you well in your college, career, and civic life.

<u>Course Objectives</u>

- Master a broad body of historical knowledge
- Demonstrate an understanding of historical chronology
- Use historical data to support an argument or position
- Interpret and apply data from original documents, including cartoons, graphs, letters, etc.
- Effectively use historical thinking skills of chronological reasoning, historical interpretation and synthesis, comparison and contextualization, and crafting a historical argument.
- Work effectively with others to solve problems
- Prepare for the Advanced Placement Exam on May 5th, 2017
