When you receive your ballot the biggest question is how much will your taxes go up? Here is an example what your additional cost would look like approximately:

\$100,000 piece of property, taxes on your property will increase \$20.14 \$200,000 piece of property, taxes on your property will increase \$40.28 \$300,000 piece of property, taxes on your property will increase \$60.43 \$400,000 piece of property, taxes on your property will increase \$80.56 \$500,000 piece of property, taxes on your property will increase \$100.71 \$600,000 piece of property, taxes on your property will increase \$120.85

I urge you to take the time to vote and return your ballot by May 7th. It can be dropped off at Fromberg Schools or it can be mailed but you have to make sure the ballot is received by the date of the election. 
Classroom News


Our class continues to read many different stories in class. We have been really using our word attack skills to sound out unknown words in stories. The students are practicing reading with expression and observing punctuation in the text.

Clarks Fork Valley Migrant School Fromberg School District Fromberg, Montana

Who qualifies?

Children of Migrant Farm Workers involved in agricultural activities on a seasonal or temporary basis.

- You must travel across a school district, county, or state line to seek or obtain seasonal or temporary agricultural employment.
- 2. This move must involve establishing temporary residency for at least 48 hours.
- 3. This employment must provide an important part of your annual income.

What qualifies as an agricultural activity?

- feeding, raising, moving, and processing livestock
- prepping, growing, harvesting and selling produce
- fencing field used for agriculture or livestock
- irrigating farm or ranch land
- Hoeing or hauling sugar beets (hauling must be from the field)
- sorting sugar beets at the sugar factory
- clearing, prepping, or planting fields used for agriculture
- working as a farm or ranch hand on a seasonal or temporary basis
- planting, cutting and hauling grains (hauling must be from the field)

Summer School Program

- provided free at NO COST to qualified families
- program starts early June and ends mid July
- the curriculum emphasizes math, reading and STEM for elementary and secondary students as well as arts and crafts and outdoor activities
- breakfast, lunch and snack are provided at no charge to all qualified participants


