2. School-Counseling Department Mission Statement

It is the mission of the Northern York County School District's School Counseling Department to provide services through a comprehensive curriculum in the areas of academic, personal/social, and career guidance to all students Kindergarten through twelfth grades, serving students' unique needs and abilities. Keeping leadership, advocacy, collaboration, and change in mind, we strive to help students become effective, successful, and productive now and when they become members of the workforce.

3. Program Goals

Describe your yearly program goals/objectives connected to the mission of the school district in all three domains:

Academic; Career; Personal/Social

Elementary School:

<u>Academic -</u> During the 2021-2022 school year, 100% of 4th and 5th grade students will complete the Youth Truth Survey.

<u>Career -</u> During the 2021-2022 school year, 100% of 2nd grade students will complete one Smart Futures lesson.

<u>Personal/Social</u> - During the 2021-2022 school year, 100% of 5th grade students will able to identify three coping skills that they can use when faced with a challenge.

Middle School:

<u>Academic-</u> During the 2021-2022 school year, 100% of 6th grade students will receive a lesson on the 5th to 6th grade academic transition.

<u>Career</u>- In the 2021-2022 school year, 100% of 8th graders will develop an academic career plan.

<u>Personal/Social</u>- In the 2021-2022 school year, 100% of 7th graders will participate in a minimum of three social emotional learning activities.

High School:

<u>Academic -</u> During the 2021-2022 school year, 100% of high school students will meet with the school counselor to develop an educational plan.

<u>Career -</u> During the 2021-2022 school year, 100% of 11th grade students will have 8 career artifacts for their portfolio.

<u>Personal/Social</u> - During the 2021-2022 school year, each student will have the opportunity to meet individually with a school counselor to address social/emotional wellbeing.

4. Stakeholders:

Students

- O The students of Northern York County School District will receive curriculum focused on academic, career, and personal/social skills in order to make educated and reasonable decisions that will lead to their successful future. Students will also participate in individual student planning to develop goals related to their interests and abilities.
- O Students will serve roles in mentoring other students in areas of career choices and opportunities. Students may present their experiences in the school counseling program to other stakeholders. The three student representatives on the advisory council will initially come from grades fifth, eighth, and twelve.

Parents

O Parents have a pivotal role in helping their children as they move forward through career exploration to career/college choices. Parents will be informed of opportunities, standards, and options for their children so they can communicate these opportunities and help plan the future with their children, as well as be advocates for their children in the choices they make. Parents will be made aware of ongoing school counseling services throughout the student's school years.

O Parents are stakeholders in their children's academic lives through participating in student decision making choices regarding course selections, career and college exploration, and school efforts to make students aware of opportunities for their futures. Parents will provide input to the school counseling program through their participation in school career programming, as well as serving on the advisory council.

Educators

- Teachers, administrators, and school board members will be asked to promote the beliefs and mission of the school counseling program. Educators will accomplish this through classroom instruction, meetings with parents, students, and community members as well as attending and participating in programs developed by the school counseling department. Educators will also be asked to serve on the advisory council.
- Educators will be made aware of the mission and goals through their participation on the advisory council as well as through informational sessions during professional development days, department/team/grade level meetings, the school counseling website, and counselor driven presentations.

Business/Community

- O Both business/community and student stakeholders will benefit by having interaction between current and future employees. Students will gain an understanding of the value of positive social interactions, teamwork, goal setting, communication, and the academic skills needed in the workforce. Businesses will, in turn, benefit by having potential employees with a stronger skill set.
- O As partners, members of the business community will provide opportunities to students to job shadow, provide support of the school counseling curriculum in the areas of workplace expectations and serve on the advisory council.

Post-Secondary

- O Post-secondary partners will assist the Northern York County School District school counseling program by increasing awareness of post-secondary options, as well as preparing the students for post-secondary success.
- O Post-secondary representatives will serve on the advisory council. They also will provide opportunities through classroom presentations, informative sessions, and invitations to visit post-secondary locations.

5. Role of the School Counselor:

School counselors design and deliver school counseling programs that improve student outcomes. They lead, advocate, and collaborate to promote equity and access for all students by connecting their school counseling program to the school's academic mission and school improvement plan. They uphold the ethical and professional standards of ASCA and promote the development of the school counseling program (see attached ASCA Role of School Counselor Document).

6. Advisory Council:

The Northern York County School District has an active Advisory Council with members from each stakeholder. The Advisory Council meets twice a year, once in November and once in April of each school year.

The School Counselor's Role

School counselors design and deliver school counseling programs that improve student outcomes. They lead, advocate and collaborate to promote equity and access for all students by connecting their school counseling program to the school's academic mission and school improvement plan. They uphold the ethical and professional standards of ASCA and promote the development of the school counseling program based on the following areas of the ASCA National Model: define, deliver, manage and assess.

DELIVER

School counselors deliver developmentally appropriate activities and services directly to students or indirectly for students as a result of the school counselor's interaction with others.

These activities and services help students develop the ASCA Mindsets & Behaviors for Student Success and improve their achievement, attendance and discipline. Through the school counseling program, school counselors ensure equitable academic, career and social/emotional development opportunities for all students.

Direct Services with Students

Direct services are in-person interactions between school counselors and students and include the following:

- Instruction
- Appraisal and Advisement
- Counseling

Indirect Services for Students

Indirect services are provided on behalf of students as a result of the school counselors' interactions with others including:

- Consultation
- Collaboration
- Referrals

ASSESS

To achieve the best results for students, school counselors regularly assess their program to:

- determine its effectiveness in helping all students succeed
- inform improvements to their school counseling program design and delivery
- show how students are different as a result of the school counseling program
