He received the Outstanding Lifter award for the 181 pound to super heavyweight weight classes for the Division II boys meet. He went on to attend a national powerlifting meet. He competed very well. He had 912.5 kilograms (2011.7 pounds) as a total between the three lifts: squat, bench, and deadlift. His dedication and hard work this year has gotten him to an impressive place. He is a National Champion and now we are waiting to see if he will be invited to compete in the world powerlifting championship.

Autism Awareness

Happy Autism Awareness Month! Not many people know much about autism, and it only recently has begun to show up in our media in a more accurate and healthy depiction(Heartbreak High being one I recommend). Autism Spectrum Disorder or ASD is a developmental condition that affects how one interacts, communicates, learns, and behaves.

When we typically think of a spectrum, we think of a linear spectrum even though autism is more of a radial spectrum in a few main potential traits which is not limited to but can include: need for routine, difficulty with eye contact, special interest, stimming, sensory issues, and trouble regulating/understanding emotions. Someone might not have every single trait in the book, but they might have some and they might be more prevalent than others such as someone having little

to no difficulty with eye contact but become very overwhelmed and uncomfortable when they encounter a very uncomfortable sensation like carpet on their bare feet.

When overwhelmed they may resort to stimming or self-soothing techniques, this can include playing loud music, seeking certain sensations via the five senses, or going non-verbal(also known as shutting down). The best thing to do as a friend or family member if you wish to comfort them is to just be there. Many people, autistic or not, enjoy "parallel play", the act of people doing things separately but together.



Not all stimming is for comfort! While it can be used for that, some will also have stims

based on other emotions such as joy, anger, and sadness. They can also vary in types such as vocal, repetitive, sensor, and visual. Some examples include, parroting, watching videos, touching different fabrics, and dancing.

During this month you may learn of an organization called Autism Speaks that wishes to cure Autism. Autism, just like ADHD and other disorders cannot be cured, it is not a disease or something to be ashamed of. There are ways to make it more manageable to live with and that is what people seek out occasionally, but, if you have loved ones, friends or family, who have autism, make sure to make them feel comfortable and listen to them. Someone who listens to and cares about you truly is the best gift there is.

Weather

Welcome back once again, Spartans, to the weather corner! This time around we're doing a little weather sendoff for the end of the school year by doing both April AND May's weather in one place and what happened during April and what could happen with May's weather. So without further ado, let's dive right into the nitty gritty details!

Firstly, let's go over April. It was a pretty crazy month for us all so i'll run through a quick recap of the events that occurred: At the beginning, it was a

normal month with warmer temperatures. Then, on August 8th, there was a solar eclipse. Which if you didn't get the chance to see, won't happen for nearly exactly 21



years in 2045 on August 12th. Following this rare event, a tornado tore

through Slidell and cut out the power for many people in the area. The tornado was ranked an EF 2, with an EF 1 being the calmest, having 86-110 mph winds, to an EF 5 having winds up to 262-317 mph. So with that said (and April being pretty much over) its been a wild ride for everyone, but will run through the averages for the month for those curious. The average temperatures were anywhere from a high of 74°F to 80°F, rarely exceeding 85°F. And with low temperatures anywhere from 56°F to 62°F, rarely exceeding 72°F.

Now, let's move on to May's weather and what that might look like. The average highs for May range from 81°F to 87°F, rarely falling below 75°F so make sure to drink plenty of water and stay cool whenever you can. The low temperatures can be anywhere from 62°F to 70°F, rarely exceeding 75°F so while the nighttime

temperatures are getting warmer, it's still better than the daytime heat! The rain chances for May at the beginning of the month sit around 4.4 inches of rain, and the end of the month with a potential 4.7 inches, which means there is a good chance for some rain here and there all



month so make sure to check the weather and bring an umbrella if it might rain.

Finally, before we end our final weather talk for the 2023-2024 school year, don't fret, for I have more fun weather facts for you all! Did you know that total solar eclipses cannot be seen from the North and South

Poles? Also, depending on the geometry of the Sun, Moon, and Earth, there can be a total of about 2 to 5 solar eclipses each year! And here's a little tornado fact: Debris Balls are a real thing that happens as a tornado spins through an area and picks up dirt, tree limbs and leaves along with debris from all sorts of human-made items. These get spun into balls known as debris balls, which the wind can throw into buildings and cars, causing further damage.

And with that, it's time to bid you all farewell for it is time to close out the school year and our weather corner for now. I hope you all finish the year out strong and do amazingly on your exams! 
Program Spotlight - Carpentry

Adopt a Shelter Pet Day - April 30th

Did you know that over 2 million pets are wishing that they have homes just like us? Not all dogs and cats have homes to go to, many of them live on streets, garbage cans, and are even being tortured by people.

National Adopt a Shelter Pet, a national holiday that occurs on April 30th and is meant to raise awareness of animals in shelters, brief history; The American Humane Society, founded in 1877 as the first U.S. humane organization focused on the good treatment and care of



living things, particularly animals. Originally the organization set up Adopt a dog month in October in 1981 which was meant to raise awareness of dogs in shelters and of course give them a home. Eventually they realized there were more than

dogs as pets so they added "adopt a shelter pet day".

All over the world there are an estimated 143 million dogs living on the street and 12 million dogs in shelters, 203 million cats living on the street and 4 million cats in shelters. Many of the female dogs are often kept in inhumane conditions and are forced to have litter after litter of puppies. The puppies then are taken away from their mothers at an early age and shipped to dealers or sold to customers. Because of unethical practices, society should not support puppy mills or the vendors they work with.

Mrs. Yates has adopted both of her puppies from rescue

organizations. She most recently adopted her puppy Dutch (formerly known as "Mochi") from a rescue called Once Upon a Tail Rescue, which hosts adoption days almost every Saturday in Covington. She chose to adopt them because there are so many pets without homes, and she wanted them to have a nice, safe, happy life. She feels sad she can't adopt more pets, she feels like if she can make a difference in one or two dogs lives it's worth it.



Mrs. Rodrigue has rescued two dogs and two cats that she has kept throughout her life, and Mrs. Rodrigue also picks up stray dogs until



she finds them a nice home. What made Ms. Rodrigue adopt her pets as she loves animals, and her favorite animals are dogs. Mrs. Rodrigue says "If I could keep all of them, I would. I'd love to open a no kill shelter one day or foster". And lastly Mrs. Rodrigue thinks that rescuing sheltered dogs and cats are important because animals have feelings and

they want to be loved just like any human or creature.


"2024 Scholarship Winner Spotlight" Yasmine Armstrong


