Ms. Peggy's Classroom

As spring blossoms around us, we're excited to share all the wonderful activities happening in room 102. We're buzzing with excitement as we delve into the wonders of spring.

This month, our little artists have been busy exploring different textures, colors, and shapes to create beautiful flower masterpieces. From finger painting to tissue paper collages, each child has had the opportunity to express their creativity in unique ways.



Through hands-on activities, our preschoolers have been able to engage their senses and discover the joy of nature. Sensory bins filled with scented playdough and tactile flower puzzles have provided endless opportunities for exploration and learning.

We have also embarked on a fascinating journey as our preschoolers learn about the lifecycle of butterflies through our caterpillar project. We have a cup of five baby caterpillars, and everyday we watch the caterpillars eat and grow. Soon, they will hang upside down and form chrysalides, and in

a few weeks beautiful butterflies will emerge! Our preschoolers are witnessing firsthand how caterpillars transform into beautiful butterflies.

As we approach the end of the school year, we're taking time to review and reinforce the readiness skills we have learned. From letter recognition and counting to fine motor development and daily living skills, we celebrate their individual achievements.

This April, Room 104 has been focusing on their independence. We've been practicing completing work by ourselves as well as playing with toys and bathrooming on our own. We work in the ADL room every week on our daily living skills too, like making the bed, setting the table, hanging up clothes etc. Right now, our boys are being encouraged to clearly state what they want and need. We practice this daily to help our students understand advocating for themselves.



On the April 8th, we enjoyed learning about the Solar Eclipse and had fun creating a craft to replicate it. We also celebrated our friends' birthdays and enjoyed the sun coming out with warm weather. Room 104 loves playing outside and seeing the flowers bloom again!









April is National Occupational Therapy month. We decided to include some OT information in our newsletter article:

How Can an Occupational Therapist Help a Child?

Occupational Therapists are highly-trained healthcare professionals that evaluate and assist children that are having difficulty participating in meaningful activities or "occupations" that are needed to conduct their daily routines and live their life to the fullest.

For a child, this may include the development of life skills such as learning at school, playing, completing self-care tasks, relating to others, and fulfilling their role as a family member. In the schools, Occupational Therapists address the needs of students experiencing delays, disabilities, or health challenges through therapeutic intervention to promote skill advancement, the use of compensatory strategies, adaptations to the child's educational environment, and/ or modifying the curriculum or activity.

Occupational Therapists also collaborate with teachers, parents and others to identify and modify barriers that restrict a child's success and model strategies for others to use that will extend the benefits of direct intervention.

Occupational Therapy Skill Areas:

Fine Motor: Holding crayons, pencils and other small objects, stringing beads, using clothing

fasteners, manipulating toys

Eye-hand Coordination: Scissor use, puzzles, ball skills

Visual Motor: Printing, drawing, forming shapes, coloring

Visual Perceptual: Sorting, matching, figure ground, scanning, letter reversals

Self-Care: Dressing, feeding, using utensils, tying, bathing & shampooing, grooming **Sensory Processing:** Delays in adaptive responses to sights, sounds, movement,

taste, touch

Strength: Manipulating resistive materials, moving against gravity, sustaining body

positions

Social: Interacting with others, following routines, play skills

The Crossroads therapists started the celebration with some new gear, proudly displaying "OT Squad" t-shirts. OT month signs were hung up on the bulletin boards and doors throughout the school and the students completed an OT month color, cut and paste activity working on scissor skills, fine motor coordination, writing/pre-writing skills and bilateral hand skills. The project entitled: "Occupational Therapy gives me the Tools To Grow" encouraged the students to identify what they do in OT and color, cut and paste the coordinating petal on the flower. The students' flowers were displayed in the OT room and classrooms.

With the break in the weather, the therapy sessions are beginning to focus on sensory motor outdoor play. The students all love bubbles, sidewalk chalk, digging in the dirt and the new addition of 3 kick scooters.


Celebrating Autism Acceptance Month in April

Hello everyone, we are Marianny Amezquita and Karly Barreto, the Crossroads Board Certified Behavior Analysts (BCBAs).

In April, we celebrated Autism Acceptance Month, a time to promote understanding, acceptance, and support for individuals on the autism spectrum. Throughout the month, our school community engaged in various activities and initiatives to raise awareness and foster acceptance. We also hosted informational sessions and workshops to educate families and staff about autism spectrum disorder (ASD). These sessions focused on promoting acceptance and providing strategies for supporting individuals with ASD in educational and social settings.

Fun Fact: There are about 3,000 BCBAs in the state of New Jersey and our school has 2 Full-time BCBAs, plus our administration team are BCBAs! That means we have 5 total BCBAs in one school, that's awesome! Our team also includes 5 full-time Registered Behavior Technicians (RBTs) who support the staff and students in the school setting.

As we wrap up Autism Acceptance Month, let us continue to embrace and celebrate the differences that make each of us unique. By promoting acceptance and understanding, we can create a more inclusive and supportive community for individuals with autism and their families.

mentally present in the classroom. The main objective is to promote equality and justice. The general idea is to provide a safe learning environment so that all students are academically successful and socially adjusted.








Ms Schulhafer - Guidance Councilor


Arab-American Heritage Month


Healthy Relationships Assembly

What's in a Name?

As many of you are well aware that Autism Awareness month has been the recognized month to celebrate individuals with Autism and the Autistic community. However, a recent movement throughout special education, community leaders and the

Westlake School community is embracing the concept change and mindset from Autism "AWARENESS" to Autism "ACCEPTANCE".

The distinction between autism acceptance and autism awareness is significant in understanding how society perceives and supports individuals with autism spectrum disorder (ASD). Autism awareness focuses on educating the public on signs and symptoms of autism, while autism acceptance breaks down barriers and negative stigma by advocating for inclusive environments where individuals with ASD feel valued, respected, and included. It emphasizes creating communities where everyone belongs and has the opportunity to thrive and feel comfortable and be proud of who they are. Acceptance acknowledges the importance of listening to and respecting the perspectives of autistic individuals themselves and recognizes that they themselves are the experts on their own experiences and preferences and advocates for their voices to be heard, respected and valued.

Recently, this month President Biden hammered this idea home when he spoke about the name/concept change from "awareness" to "acceptance", "I call upon all Americans to learn more about autism to improve early diagnosis, to learn more about the experiences of autistic people from autistic people, and to build more welcoming and inclusive communities to support people with autism."

While autism awareness is an important first step in increasing understanding and educating the masses, autism acceptance takes that understanding to the next level by promoting respect, inclusion, empowerment and advocacy of individuals with autism.

We at Westlake applaud those who have embraced this shift and will continue to educate, advance and advocate for our students, their families and a society that accommodates and includes individuals with autism in all aspects of life.

Here's why autism acceptance is often considered more meaningful than mere awareness:


- Embracing Neurodiversity: Autism acceptance goes beyond awareness by embracing the
 concept of neurodiversity. It recognizes that autism is a natural variation of the human
 experience and values the unique strengths and abilities of individuals with ASD. Instead of
 focusing solely on deficits or challenges, autism acceptance promotes respect, inclusion, and
 celebration of neurodiversity.
- Promoting Inclusion and Belonging: Awareness campaigns often focus on educating the
 public about the signs and symptoms of autism, which is important for increasing
 understanding and reducing stigma. However, Respecting Autistic Perspectives: Autism It in
 discussions about autism-related policies, programs, and services.

- Empowering Autistic Advocacy: Awareness campaigns often portray autism as a problem to be solved or a tragedy to be overcome, which can perpetuate negative stereotypes and attitudes towards autism. In contrast, autism acceptance empowers autistic individuals to advocate for their rights, needs, and preferences. It encourages them to challenge stereotypes, demand equality, and participate in decision-making processes that affect their lives.
- Fostering Positive Change: While awareness campaigns have helped raise visibility and
 understanding of autism, they may not always lead to meaningful change in attitudes,
 policies, or practices. Autism acceptance, on the other hand, aims to drive systemic change
 by challenging ableism, promoting accessibility, and advocating for policies and practices
 that support the full inclusion and participation of autistic individuals in society.

In summary, while autism awareness is an important first step in increasing understanding and reducing stigma, autism acceptance takes that understanding to the next level by promoting respect, inclusion, and empowerment of autistic individuals. It recognizes their inherent value and contributions to society and advocates for a world where everyone, regardless of neurotype, is accepted, valued, and celebrated.












Spotlight on the Behavior Department!


Everyone enjoyed a restful break and came back ready to work!














Earth day is a celebration of the Earth. So many fascinating things are on our planet. We should protect it. So we explored ways to help our planet. We learned that we can repurpose items.

Supervisor's Corner






In recognition of Passover, the students in the Can Do Food Services Program learned how to make their own Matzah Ball Soup and homemade Matzah!


























What's Happening at Project SEARCH?




Welcome Madam President!




Furniture Restoration Elective

Union County Blue Envelope Program

In 2023, the Union County Board of County Commissioners announced the full rollout of the Blue Envelope Program. The Union County's Blue Envelope Program is geared towards fostering inclusivity and promoting safe interactions between law enforcement officers and individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD). It introduces a simple yet effective tool that contains essential information for drivers with Autism Spectrum Disorder. This includes a copy of their driver's license, vehicle registration, insurance details, and an emergency contact card. Additionally, the envelope provides clear instructions to drivers on how to navigate a traffic stop and interact with law enforcement officers in a manner that promotes clarity and safety.

The Blue Envelope Program is accessible to all Union County residents on the Autism Spectrum. Residents can obtain a Blue Envelope at their local police departments throughout the county. Similarly, the Union County Sheriff's Office is participating in Union County's Blue Envelope Program. Blue Envelopes are available in the Union County Administration Building, 10 Elizabethtown Plaza, located at the 1st floor Security Desk. Understanding Supported Employment Options Available AFTER Graduation

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT IN NEW JERSEY

Supported Employment helps individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) secure and maintain **competitive employment**, or work in a setting to prepare for competitive employment. An individual's interests, likes, and dislikes are important factors when considering a job or career path.



KEY TERMS

Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA)

Federal legislation signed in 2014 to help individuals access education, training, and support services to succeed in the workplace.

Competitive Employment

Work performed on a full-time or part-time basis in an integrated setting that is compensated at or above minimum wage.

<u>Division of Vocational</u> <u>Rehabilitation Services</u> (DVRS)

The state agency which provides vocational services for individuals with IDD or other barriers to employment.

"Employment First" State

An initiative that outlines that competitive employment is the preferred post-education activity. It presumes that all individuals, including people with IDD, are capable of integrated employment.

EXAMPLES OF SERVICES

Pre-Employment Transition Services

 Offered to high school students to plan and prepare for entering the workforce.

Job Development

 Assists individuals with a job search, interview skills, and resume development.

Job Sampling

 Gives the individual the opportunity to explore different types of employment and identify areas of interest and ability.

Job Coaching

 Provides assistance with learning essential job tasks, transportation training, social skills, and can act as a liaison between the employer and employee.

Long-Term Follow Along

 Ongoing support through worksite visits designed to help individuals maintain skills built during job coaching.

Trial Work Experience

 A workplace readiness assessment administered by a Supported Employment provider agency, such as Project HIRE.

*This is not a fully inclusive list. Services may vary between agencies, school districts, and funding sources.

NJ WORKABILITY

NJ WorkAbility offers people with disabilities who are working, and whose income would otherwise make them ineligible for Medicaid, the opportunity to receive full Medicaid coverage.

REQUIREMENTS OF COMPETITIVE EMPLOYMENT

<u>Wages</u>

Individuals are compensated at or above minimum wage, and at a comparable rate to coworkers without IDD performing similar duties with similar experience and education.

Benefits

Individuals receive the same benefits as other employees in a similar position with a similar level of service.

Scheduling

The schedule is determined by the needs of the employer, not the availability of the individual.

<u>Integration</u>

Employment takes place in a setting where individuals with and without disabilities have the opportunity to interact and work alongside each other.

Advancement

The same opportunities for promotion and advancement are available for employees with and without disabilities in similar positions with similar experience.

Through NJ WorkAbility, individuals can earn up to \$65,196 of gross annual income and maintain less than \$20,000 in assets without threatening their Medicaid status. A couple cannot exceed \$87,900 in gross income and \$30,000 in assets. Learn more about NJ WorkAbility and eligibility requirements at: bit.ly/njworkability

At 18 years old all individuals, including those with intellectual and developmental disabilities, reach the legal age of majority. This means that parents can no longer make decisions legally on behalf of their children. ABLE Accounts

ABLE Accounts provide eligible individuals with disabilities a better way to save money for today's needs or invest for tomorrow. ABLE accounts:

- Do not jeopardize eligibility for most benefit programs, such as Medicaid and SSI.
- Are tax-advantaged, so earnings grow tax free.
- Can accept contributions from anyone: the account owner, family and friends.
- Include online account management tools and a top-rated mobile app.

About the Work Readiness Academy

The Work Readiness Academy serves students ages 18-21 with disabilities and provides a comprehensive employment training experience that incorporates both classroom-based instruction and community-based work-learning experiences. While in the

training classroom, students work cooperatively with similar aged peers to learn critical skills related to employment and socialization. Students also work on career exploration and planning, including the development of a person-centered, post-secondary vision and plan with clear goals and action steps. Program staff remain on-site during the internships to provide and fade support and assistance as needed. Students also participate in field trips focused on career discovery, independent living skills, recreation and independent travel training.
