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The Pursuit for Glory: PR Wrestler Finally Reaches the Top

"I finally did it," said junior Vaughn Spencer after winning gold at the PIAA state championship for wrestling in the 172 weight class. However, the journey was nothing

short of a challenge.

This was the first season that Spencer was able to compete for the state championship. Freshman year he blew out his knee in the quarterfinals, and during his sophomore year, he was sidelined due to shoulder surgery. He battled with the decision of whether he should even continue wrestling, and with his parents' support, he chose to return.

"I see how much they [my parents] sacrifice for me to be the best that I can be. I know how much they support me so it makes me want to practice to be prepared to win," said Spencer.

To be the best, for himself and his parents, Spencer follows a strict schedule that includes morning

practices, after school practices, and late-night lifts. On top of that, he is constantly watching what he eats to build, maintain, or cut weight for upcoming matches.

"Having a strict schedule helps keep me on task and helps keep me motivated," said Spencer.

From sunrise to sundown, Spencer is constantly thinking about wrestling whether it is watching a film with breakfast, practicing twice a day, or simply just thinking about it; it is constant.

"To be great it's just something you have to do all the time," said Spencer.

Growing up in a family with an older brother who

wrestled, Spencer was thrown right into the sport. However, at a young age, Spencer hated wrestling. He even resented it.

"The only way I would go to my brother's wrestling

tournaments was if there was a pool in the hotel or a Krispy Kreme in town," said Spencer.

But he kept with it, and by 5th grade he had his sights set on winning a state championship, and for the first time since 1994, a PR wrestler took home the gold in 2024. Along with being the first state champ from PR in 42 years, Spencer also beat his older brother Cole's, single-season record going 43-2.

To make history, Spencer kept himself motivated over the past many, many months. To encourage himself to get out of bed each morning, Spencer has pictures of his toughest opponents hanging on his walls because he wants to work harder than them. There is nothing Spencer won't do to let someone

"I fell in love with doing everything I could to go out there and get my hand raised," said Spencer.

After high school, Spencer will attend Lehigh University in Bethlehem, PA on a full wrestling scholarship.

"I want to be the best I can and I want to win, but it's going to set up my future," said Spencer.

There will now be two collegiate wrestlers in the Spencer family, Vaughn at Lehigh and Cole at Penn.

Looking back at his various battles with injuries and negative thoughts about continuing wrestling, Spencer had one thing to say: "The love of wrestling and pursuit for glory got me coming back, and I'm so glad I didn't quit."



Sophie has a super cute and stylish outfit at the beginning of the





Ranking All My School Dance Dresses


