

- Apply!




Self-Reflect

- Do you want to be close to home or farther away?
- Would you prefer to be in a big city, middle of nowhere, or somewhere in between?
- Do you learn best in small classes or are you comfortable in a larger environment?
- Do you know what you plan to study? (If not, that's absolutely fine!)
- Are there particular elements of a university that are important to you (i.e. athletic team, religious affiliation, affinity group)?

- Consider additional follow up, if appropriate


Refine and Find your "Match"

Finding your ideal university is a two way street: You need to understand the university, and they need to understand you.

- Are you a good match for the institution?
 - Academic preparedness
 - Personal qualities & extracurricular involvement
 - Ability to grow
- Is the institution a good match for you?
 - Location, size, population, cost
 - Programs & activities of interest



A balanced college list to apply to...



Academic Fit

- Do they have the major(s)/program(s) you're interested in
- Where does your profile place you in terms of admissibility?
 - "Likely" schools student's academic profile is significantly stronger than the middle 50% of students typically admitted
 - "Target" schools student's academic profile is similar to the middle 50%
 - "Reach" schools student's academic profile is not as strong as the middle 50%

Personal/Social Fit

- Size, type, location
- Campus culture
- Activities, athletics, Greek life, residential experience, etc.
- Use social media channels to learn about campus life/student experiences

Financial Fit

- Published cost of attendance is <u>not</u> the whole story
- Availability of need-based aid and/or merit-based scholarships
- Use net price calculators (<u>collegecost.ed.gov/net-price</u> or on university websites)
- Applying for need-based aid FAFSA/CSS Profile
 - Be mindful of deadlines!

How colleges evaluate applicants

A holistic review can be thought of as a three-part equation:



Reading the whole application: We will look at transcripts and test scores, but we will also read the extracurricular section, letters of recommendation, and essays.

Understanding the applicant as a whole: Through the letters, extracurriculars, and essays, we will understand how the student will contribute to our community.

It's all about context: We review your application within the context of your school and experiences. We consider the circumstances and/or educational opportunities that have been available to you.

A holistic process allows us to see the best parts of who you are.

- An applicant's candidacy is evaluated on the basis of all the information provided in the application and within the context of that year's applicant pool.
 - High school transcript quantitative and qualitative elements
 - Extracurricular activities quality over quantity
 - Essay(s) authentic voice
 - ▶ Letters of recommendation context, context, context
 - Test scores? Test optional? Test blind?
 - Context of the pool look at previous year's admitted student profile
