### SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

As we transition into spring, we intensify preparations for the last few weeks of the 2023-24 school year. Please stay tuned for multiple end of the year activities that occur on campus during May and June. Event details will be displayed on the school calendar, the school website and shared via ParentSquare. The end of the school year also includes final exams and projects, and we wish all students a strong finish and hope that their efforts will yield a very successful ending.

Spring is also a time of increased preparations for the 2024-25 school year. As May progresses, it is time for the District's annual Board elections and budget vote. We began the formal budget development process in January, and the Board adopted the budget in April to place before voters on Tuesday, May 21. There will be a budget hearing on Tuesday, May 14 in the high school auditorium which will involve a review of the budget being proposed to the voters. Your support is critical, and we urge you to join us to provide input and to ensure that the decisions we make are reflective of the community's wishes.

Since the Governor's state budget release in January, the District has been meeting at 6:00 p.m. prior to each Board meeting to discuss and develop the budget. Without an adopted, detailed state budget at the time of this writing, we find ourselves facing uncertainty with our anticipated reduction in Foundation Aid. Additionally, the federal pandemic relief grant funding from the past three years is now ending. These grant monies fund reading and math teachers, as well as a school counselor who supports the elementary and middle school students. These positions have been paramount in allowing us to address needs that were magnified during the pandemic and continue to be present in many of our most vulnerable populations. Maintaining these essential positions and the support for our students will be a challenge moving forward, as we will need to absorb these expenditures in our normal operating budget.

The anticipated reduction in the state budget and the end of pandemic funding have led our District to seek additional funding through an increase in local taxes. In an effort to minimize the impact on taxpayers, the District has made significant efforts to reduce costs. This includes reduction in staffing as well as lowering costs in student supports, contractual expenditures and equipment expenditures. Additionally, the District has initiated efforts to secure revenue. One source will include the hosting of the Oneida-Herkimer-Madison (OHM) BOCES Regional Summer School program in our middle school this July-August. The District will also generate supplemental revenue through the rental of several classrooms for the OHM BOCES programming in the 2024-2025 school year.

The following information is a summary of the proposed 2024-25 budget and Board elections for the voters to consider on May 21:

- The proposed budget for 2024-25 is \$26,602,037 (6.67% above last year's budget).
- The proposed tax levy for the 2024-25 budget is 5.5%.
- The purchase of two diesel school buses (not electric) not to exceed \$350,000. We appreciate the community's continued support of our initiative to maintain a bus replacement program to minimize the potential costly repairs our buses endure as they approach the end of their useful life.
- The budget includes funding for a Capital Outlay Project. The scope of the project would address the replacement of doors at the elementary school to provide a more secure environment for the staff and students.
- The election of three open Board of Education seats currently held by Ron Critelli, Judy Kentile and Mike Sacco. Each open seat will be for a three-year term.

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## MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT CONT.

Further detailed information regarding the budget will be shared later in this issue and through the budget postcard you will receive before the May 21 vote.

While the 2024-25 budget maintains adequate staffing levels, it still includes reductions in staffing, programming and athletics to help minimize the impact on taxpayers. We are also appropriating more than \$1 million of our fund balance to support our students due to the upcoming reductions in state funding.

In summary, we will be putting forth a school budget for 2024-25 at an amount of \$26,602,037 with a tax levy of 5.5%. The annual budget vote will take place on May 21 from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. in the auditorium lobby. Additionally, the community will vote on the purchase of two diesel school buses not to exceed \$350,000, and to fill three open Board of Education seats for three-year terms each.

Thank you for your continued support of the District. Together, we will continue to find ways to support our mission and provide the most enriching learning experiences for our students in preparing them for their future.

## WHAT THE VOTERS WILL DECIDE

There will be three matters to be voted upon on May 21, 2024.

1. Proposed budget for the 2024-2025 school year.
2. The purchase of two (2) 60 passenger school buses.
3. The election of three (3) members of the Board of Education. Three members for a three (3) year term commencing on July 1, 2024 and expiring on June 30, 2027.

Registered voters can apply for absentee ballots as follows:

- After confirmation of the applicant's registration status, a ballot will be issued.
- Completed ballots must be received by 5:00 p.m. on May 21, 2024.

- A citizen of the United States.
- Eighteen (18) or more years of age.
- A resident within the District for a period of 30 days or more preceding the May 21, 2024 Annual Budget Vote.





# TEDDY BEAR CLINIC

On November 1 and 3, kindergarten classes participated in a Teddy Bear Clinic sponsored by the Psychology-Child Life program at Utica University. A Teddy Bear Clinic involves university students and professors trained to work with children in healthcare settings. They came to school and demonstrated through play, a fun way for children to become more comfortable with medical procedures and equipment. Each child brought a teddy bear, or a similar stuffed animal, for a "medical check-up." The kindergartners took the "patients" to different stations to explore and play with actual medical equipment in a fun and non-threatening setting. Research has shown that Teddy Bear Clinics help children to feel more comfortable with medical equipment while reducing their fear of doctors and the hospital environment. This year marks the 20th anniversary of the Teddy Bear Clinic at Sauquoit Elementary School. We are very grateful for the continuing partnership with Utica University that benefits both their students and ours!

## PACK THE PANTRY



In February, our elementary students participated in our second annual Pack the Pantry Food Drive Challenge, during which a friendly competition helps bring in items for our local food pantry. Each grade level is assigned two items; one worth positive points, and another worth negative points. For example, third graders bring in pasta for positive points and sauce for negative points. Students can then strategize to put items in specific boxes, labeled with teacher's names. Positive points help to boost their totals, while negative points could bring down the total of another class in the lead. This friendly competition helps us bring in a remarkable amount of non-perishable items that are kept right here in our own community.







## SCHOLASTIC BOOK FAIR
