Dear Families,

This year is flying by and I can't believe that we are in our final stretch! We will kick off the month by recognizing and appreciating all of the hard work and dedication of our teachers and staff members. I couldn't have hoped for a better or more committed group of professionals to work with. Our school would not run as smoothly if not for the hard work of each one of our staff members! Thank you to our PTO for coordinating a number of thoughtful events to recognize staff throughout the week.

We are fortunate at Burr to have an outstanding group of educators on our team. In that sense, this makes it easier to make up class lists. However, the creation of a class is a very critical enterprise. Those 18-20 students will spend over 1,000 hours together next year. The group needs to be well balanced in many ways with careful attention made to the personalities that will be entering that class.

Generally, the current year's teacher will begin by making notes about how students have performed academically, how they have gotten along with others in the classroom, how they interact with the teacher, and many other relevant factors. The teachers in each grade level meet to divide students into classes for the following year. They work to balance the classes by gender and ability while also considering peer friendships. This balancing act is critical because students learn as much from their teacher as they do from working with their peers.

This work is extremely complex and I am reluctant to interfere in the process. You may have a particular preference for a teacher, but I ask that you refrain from making a specific teacher request as it could limit our ability to create a good mix of students. That being said, you know your child very well. If you know your child tends to fool around too much when paired with a particular friend or learns best with a particular style of teaching, I certainly welcome that information. I cannot make any commitments or guarantees that requests about peers or teaching styles can be honored but will take the information into consideration.

Please remember that the most important aspect of the relationship that your child will have with the teacher is not the compatibility of personality, but how well you and the teacher are able to work together to help your child achieve success.

We can't wait to see you at the Art Show, Field Day and the third grade concert later this

month!

Kindergarten News

We continue to work on short vowel words with consonant digraphs and consonant blends. In addition, we will work on mastering all 54 kindergarten sight words. In Wit and Wisdom, we are wrapping up Module 3. Then we will begin the Module 4 which will allow students to explore the continents! Students are working on writing sentences with spaces, lower case letters throughout (except at the beginning or a sentence and for the word I) and a period at the end. In math, we are working on teen numbers. We will move into a unit on measurement and weight. We have been learning about spring weather in science.

First Grade News

We hope you are looking forward to the warm, sunny days ahead! The month starts out with our Fun Run and ends with our annual Field Day! In math, we are exploring 2D and 3D shapes and will work on partitioning shapes into equal parts. Next, we will be moving on to telling time to the hour and half hour. In Fundations, we will be working on vowel-consonant-e and will next work with 2 syllable words. In Wit and Wisdom, we continue to explore the powerful force of the wind and will learn how people react to it. This leads nicely into a study of feelings and what can cause or change our feelings. We will be writing a narrative piece at the end of the module where a character has a problem because of the wind.

Second Grade News

We are in the home stretch, and things have been very busy in second grade. We have seen some fabulous growth during Wit & Wisdom lessons. The ways in which the kids have learned to discuss and make connections to the books they are reading is incredible. In writing, students have continued to work on writing informative paragraphs that help readers understand how people respond to injustice. They learned how to include introductions, topic statements, three pieces of evidence, and even a conclusion sentence. They have also learned to include evidence from multiple sources (books, videos, photographs and songs). We also continue to focus on spelling patterns and trick words. Thank you for the support from home to keep kids reading and practicing these critical skills.

We just wrapped up our math unit on measuring, length, and line plots. Our next unit will focus on shapes and arrays. We will be identifying, drawing, and partitioning shapes into equal halves, thirds, and fourths. While exploring arrays, the children are preparing for multiplication, which is formally introduced in third grade!

We will be moving into our final science unit on Form and Function which will have us learning about plants and seed dispersal. We will also be going on a field trip at the end of May to learn about the history of our town and other great things! We are looking forward to a great month! Wow! We can't believe that our third grade year is almost over! As the third graders get ready to transition to a new school we are working hard to continue to follow expectations, be respectful and responsible. In addition, we are still working hard to fit in all our new learning. Students will have two weeks of testing this month in reading and math on the SBAC. Please make sure your students are here and on time each day as we will start testing in the mornings. A good night's sleep and healthy breakfast are also helpful. During Wit and Wisdom, students are continuing to learn about immigration through fiction and nonfiction stories and texts. The volume of reading and writing has increased throughout the year and students have adjusted well. In math, we will be working on telling time to the minute and elapsed time, as well as classifying shapes and quadrilaterals. We will be finishing our work in variation of traits then moving into our next science unit on life cycles and environmental changes. We look forward to the many fun end of year activities with our third graders! Keep an eye out for important dates and happenings!





Math News

Estimation is an important skill and students at Burr are getting better each week. Estimation leads to the ability to assess the reasonableness of an answer, a very important skill.



Students have been busy estimating how many objects are in a container. Each grade level has a container and every student gets to make an educated guess. The containers now contain hints and students have really improved their estimating skills. We have even had some exact estimations. One student per grade level (unless there is a tie) receives a certificate and a prize. There are only a few weeks left with our estimation jars so - Happy estimating!

Hello from Music!

April has been busy in the music room! We are taking ownership of our music, and starting to create our own!

- Kindergarteners have taken their prior rhythmic knowledge (two sounds on a beat [apple] versus one sound on a beat [tree]) and converted it to musical syllables (du versus du-de)!
- First grade students are learning about silence in music! We're prepping for a quarter rest, and soon we'll put a name to the concept!
- Second graders are exploring composition! Given certain instruments, students created their own performances of one of our song games!
- Third grade students are working to memorize the notes of the treble staff! They've begun to transfer the notes as a visual skill onto xylophones to practice their kinesthetic skills.


IMPORTANT NOTE:



Academic Readiness Group 6 hours a week

- This group is intended for children between **5** and **6** years of age. Our two hour block of time will be split into multiple sections to not only be cognizant of shorter attention spans (due to their age) but to allow us to work on the various skills that these students will encounter in school. This class will focus on 4 main areas: Reading, Writing, Math, and Social Skill Development through fun and interactive lessons and activities.
- Foundational phonics instruction will be given to support current and future reading skills. Additionally, students will work with other key reading elements to further support comprehension of various texts.
- Handwriting, letter production, and writing prompts will be introduced. Students will be given the opportunity to attempt and practice opinion and informative/explanatory styles of writing through the strong guidance of a certified teacher.
- Mathematics Instruction will work on the following skills: counting numbers, comparing numbers, addition/subtraction concepts, early place value skills, and attributes of shapes.
- Social Skill instruction will be provided through the use of structured play. At this time students will work on concepts including, but not limited to, team building, turn taking, winning and losing, and conversation skill building.
