Science/Social Studies

We will be wrapping up the school year in May with fun, hands-on learning in Science, Critical Thinking and Social Studies.

Science:

Kindergarten – Plants: How do plants and trees grow? Life cycle of a butterfly.

First– Plants: Why don't trees blow down in the wind? Parts of a plant, Jack and the Beanstalk, How do flowers bloom in the spring?

Second– Forces of Nature/Plants: Could a plant survive without light? Should you water a cactus? Parts of a plant, Why are butterflies so colorful?

Third – Magnets/Plants :How can you unlock a door using a magnet? Patterns of Motion and Friction, Why do plants grow flowers? Why do plants give us fruit? Why are there so many different kinds of flowers?

Fourth– Energy & Matter/Waves: Conductors and Insulators, Series and Parallel Circuits, Wave properties.

Fifth– Matter/Energy: Properties and Conservation of Matter, Chemical vs. Physical Changes, What do fireworks, rubber, and silly putty have in common? Could you transform something worthless into gold, Exploring with microscopes.

Critical Thinking/Social Studies:

Kindergarten & First:

They will use deductive reasoning skills to solve critical thinking and logic puzzles.

They are viewing short videos allowing them to use their critical thinking skills. They talk about how the characters are feeling, problem-solving, and how they would deal with different situations that arise.

Second, Third, Fourth and Fifth:

·Learning how to connect the dots between ideas or concepts

·Solving problems

·Thinking creatively

·Applying knowledge in new ways

Students will view a photograph [Social Studies or Science related] and think about and answer the following questions:

·What is going on in this picture?

·What do you see that makes you say that?

·What more can you find?

Based on personal reflection and understanding, these skills assist students in determining how to understand the world around them.

The students are also having fun with critical thinking puzzles and games as well as logic puzzles. They will be working on "Cracking the Case" where they will use inferences,

problem solving skills, and deductive reasoning.



As we approach the end of the school year and some fun in the sun, don't forget to keep putting books in your hands. Do you have a library card at the Salina Public Library? Check out their website for some great summer reading opportunities.

Art

As we come to the end of the school year, we will be busy wrapping up art projects we have already started. Fifth graders have completed the papier mâché part of their 3-dimensional mask project. Nurse News

As the school year is winding down, it's time to start looking forward to the summer break! Whether your plans include a family vacation, fun in the sun, or at the pool, it's important to always keep safety in mind. Here are a few summer safety tips from the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Sun safety:

- The first, and best, line of defense against harmful ultraviolet radiation (UVR) exposure is covering up. Stay in the shade whenever possible, and limit sun exposure during the peak intensity hours between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m.
- On both sunny and cloudy days use a sunscreen with an SPF 15 or greater that protects against UVA and UVB rays.
- Be sure to apply enough sunscreen -- about one ounce per sitting for a young adult.
- Reapply sunscreen every two hours, or after swimming or sweating.
- Use extra caution near water and sand (and even snow!) as they reflect UV rays and may result in sunburn more quickly.

Water Safety:

- Never leave children alone in or near the pool or spa, even for a moment; close supervision by a responsible adult is the best way to prevent drowning in children.
- Avoid inflatable swimming aids such as "floaties." They are not a substitute for approved life jackets and can give children and parents a false sense of security.
- Children over age 1 may be at a lower risk of drowning if they have had some formal swimming instruction. If a child is missing, look for him or her in the pool or spa first.
- Share safety instructions with family, friends and neighbors.

Bug Safety-insects, like mosquitoes, can transmit harmful diseases:

- When outside in the evenings or other times when there are a lot of mosquitoes present, cover up with long sleeved shirts, pants and socks to prevent bites
- Use insect repellents containing DEET when needed to prevent insect-related diseases. Ticks can transmit Lyme Disease, and mosquitoes can transmit West Nile, Zika virus, Chikungunya virus and other viruses.
- The current AAP and CDC recommendation for children older than 2 months of age is to use 10% to 30% DEET. DEET should not be used on children younger than 2 months of age.
