Character Education

The theme of the month for April is Problem Solving, one of the qualities of a learner we strive to instill in our students. Problem Solving skills are needed beyond the classroom and impact our ability to have successful relationships and work well with others. KINDNESS WEEK

Our Annual Kindness Week took place this month. The purpose of this Week is to practice intentional kindness but also to develop qualities we want students to embody throughout their lives such as respect, empathy, collaboration and openmindedness. Activities throughout the Week helped to spread kindness and encouraged class bonding. Since the theme of the month for April is Problem Solving, one classroom activity centered around kind and respectful ways to solve problems. Students were given kindness dilemmas and had to use a Wheel of Choice, Which presented various solutions to solving conflicts. Students Were encouraged to find ways to solve realistic dilemmas they often deal with in social settings. Other class activities included, but were not limited to, compliment circles, reading stories about kindness and empathy and writing kindness/gratitude letters to someone special. Building Wide activities that took place during Kindness Week included a "Spread Kindness Around Like Confetti" board, where kids wrote acts of kindness they have shown recently, a Kindness Challenge, Which gave students a kind task to do every day when they entered school and Kindness Tear-offs with inspirational messages that students could give to each other or keep for themselves.


