Special Education

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Learning Disabilities Teacher Consultant (LDTC) 9-12:

A Learning Disabilities Teacher Consultant is considered a "master teacher" with specialized training in identifying learning disabilities, as well as instructional strategies to support learning. The addition of an LDTC *creates a more favorable caseload*, as well as:

- More individualized student attention
- Teacher support
- Learning loss post-COVID

Paraprofessional Job Coach:

Will provide guidance to students in a workplace setting which may involve *modeling*, providing *immediate feedback* to the student, as well as the collection of observational data; Critical information for *reteaching* of workplace readiness skills

Multi-Tiered Systems of Supports

Our children were forced to try and cope with significant disruption, loss, and trauma. We must project its impact as we transition back to school. According to Betheny Gross, the associate director at the Center on Reinventing Public Education at the University of Washington, "Recovery from Katrina wasn't a one-year recovery. We didn't just bring the kids back and everything fell into place. And this will be the same". "I don't think we can just start school next fall and say, 'Everything's going to be OK.' KRSD counselors subscribe to this belief and see early indications that a greater number of children will need the direct services offered through the school counseling office when Kingsway transitions back to a traditional setting.

The addition of a grade 7-12 counselor will allow the department to <u>create</u> new services and <u>expand</u> as well as <u>expedite</u> the delivery of existing services (<u>red</u>). A re-organization would take place. The school counseling department will create a wellness division comprised of two Wellness Counselors who will deliver tier 2 & 3 services. Wellness Counselors will consist of our existing SAC & one new counselor. The new counselor can hold a social worker, school counselor, or school psychologist NJ license.





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
Literacy Coach 7-12:


