Was the outcome/goal of this Collegial Circle met? Explain.

Yes. We had great discussions of the four works of literature. Various teachers have considered adopting them for class, using some for literature circles, and enhancing their teaching by referring to these novels. If our intent as English teachers is to get students as excited about literature as we are, we have modeled this process well in our reading circle.

How did the Collegial Circle assess whether the outcome was met?

Our four discussions of the novels were highly successful, and we all agreed after the fact and in our questionnaires that we found the sessions useful. While we did not discover our long-sought after 9th-grade summer reading book, we did read books that will allow us to make suggestions to students about what they might read to satisfy summer reading requirements.

These books continue to find their way into our curriculum. I taught a common core non-fiction essay unit that included an excerpt from *The Glass Castle*, for example.
