Harassment and Bullying

The Dignity Act defines harassment as the creation of a hostile environment by conduct or by verbal threats, intimidation or abuse that has or would have the effect of unreasonably and substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities or benefits, or mental, emotional or physical well-being; or conduct, verbal threats, intimidation or abuse that reasonably causes or would reasonably be expected to cause a student to fear for his or her physical safety.

Bullying, which is a form of harassment, is defined as "a variety of negative acts carried out repeatedly over time." It is unwanted, aggressive behavior that involves a real or perceived power imbalance.

Three forms of bullying:

- 1. Physical (including, but not limited to, hitting, kicking, spitting, pushing, taking personal belongings)
- Verbal (including, but not limited to, taunting, malicious teasing, name calling, making threats)
- **3.** Psychological (including, but not limited to, non-verbal actions, i.e. giving dirty looks or aggressive stares; spreading rumors, manipulating social relationships; or engaging in social exclusion, extortion or intimidation)

Normal Peer Conflict vs. Bullying

Normal Peer Conflict	Bullying
Equal power or friends	Imbalance of power; not friends
Happens occasionally	Repeated negative actions
Accidental	Purposeful
Generally not serious	Serious with threats of emotional or physical harm
Equal emotional reaction	Strong emotional reaction from victim and little or no emotional reaction from the bully
Not seeking power or attention	Seeking control, material things or power
Generally not trying to obtain something	Attempting to gain material things or power
Remorse – will take responsibility	No remorse – may blame victim

Cyberbullying

Cyberbullying includes, but is not limited to, the following misuses of technology: harassing, teasing, intimidating, threatening, or terrorizing another student or staff member by way of any technological tool, such as sending or posting inappropriate or derogatory email messages, instant messages, text or pager messages, digital pictures or images or website postings (including chat rooms or blogs).

Cyberbullying has the effect of

- a) Placing a student in reasonable fear of physical, emotional or mental harm
- b) Placing a student in reasonable fear of damage to or loss of personal property
- c) Creating an intimidating or hostile environment that substantially interferes with a student's educational opportunities
