

#### **Background Information**

**Overview:** Before movements for social change can grow, there needs to be a shared vision of an alternative. This applies to organizing around limited reform goals to visions of alternative social foundations and structures.

Too often, though, we are trapped by the belief that the world that we experience is fixed. This activity is designed to help us generate and reflect upon expansive, unlimited visioning of a world in which we want to live.



**Justice:** Justice is the broad concepts of 'fairness' and 'what's right', and underpins societies' definitions of 'rights', 'freedom' and 'liberty'. It is not limited to political or legal systems, but can encompass economic structures, social relations and practices. This activity centers the concept of justice by asking students to complete the sentence: "In a Just Society ...".
