#### <u>Steve Hanson</u> – College Advisor

Helps students with college planning, applications, financial aid, scholarships, and anything else related to college, SAT/ACT, both four year and community colleges.



## Post High School Options

### 3 main California College Systems

- University of California (UC) 10 locations
- California State University (CSU) 23 locations
- California Community College (CCC)-Largest in Nation over 112 locations

#### **Alternate Options**

- Armed Forces
- Apprenticeship Training
- Occupational Training- Cosmetology, Fire Science
- Certificate Programs -Enter work force as soon as 6 months after High School



## UC Schools – Important Info

- Apply at : www.universityofcalifornia.edu/apply
- Filing Period: November 1 30
- SAT with essay, or ACT with essay
- \$70 fee per campus
- 4 personal insight questions, 350 words per response
- Need a 3.0+ GPA
- Student must meet A-G requirements with at least a C in an A-G course



#### Not Required at Application Time

Letters of Recommendation (UC campuses are allowed to ask for letters after the fact, but it is a minimal amount of students they can ask.)

## CSU Schools – Important Info

- Apply at : <u>https://www2.calstate.edu/apply</u>
- Filing period: October 1-November 30
- SAT or ACT
- \$70 per application
- Student must meet A-G requirements with at least a C in an A-G course

#### Not Required:

- Letters of Recommendation (EOP program will require additional letters)
- Extracurricular Activities
- No essay required



## Community College-Important Info

#### **Entrance Requirements:**

- 18 years of age or High School Graduate
- No SAT/ACT required
- Students must take placement tests or be exempted
- Study Abroad options
- Occupational/Certificate Programs

#### **Students Should Plan to Attend:**

- Spring semester presentation and application workshop
- Sign up for Priority Enrollment Program (PEP)



# Out of State & Private/Independent Schools

### Early Action (EA)

Students apply early and receive a decision well in advance of the institution's regular response date.

#### Early Decision (ED)

Students make a commitment to a first-choice institution where, if admitted, they are <u>expected</u> to enroll. The application deadline and decision deadline occur early-decision is <u>BINDING</u>

#### Regular Decision

Students submit an application by a specified date and receive a decision in a clearly stated period of time-typically found directly on the college website

#### Rolling Admissions

Institutions review applications as they are submitted and render admission decisions throughout the admission cycle.

### WUE – Western Undergraduate Exchange

- Provides an opportunity to attend certain colleges in fellow western states and territories at a fraction of the out of state costs
- Certain GPA and test score requirements may exist to be WUE eligible
- Full list of participating schools available in the Career Center

# Letter of Recommendation Packet

- ALL students applying to Independent/Private/Out of State institutions will be required to attend a Common App Naviance matching workshop or meet with Mr. Hanson if they are not free during a workshop
- After the workshop or meeting students will complete the Senior Survey and schedule a one on one meeting with Ms. Booth for a counselor letter of rec.
- Deadlines for requesting a letter of rec.
  - Sep. 25<sup>th</sup> for students applying with a deadline before Nov. 27th
  - Nov. 13<sup>th</sup> for applications due Nov. 27th or later

# How Will SMHS Help Seniors?

- College Applications (Some workshops and Career Center help as needed)
- Naviance guidance to craft a college list
- Arranging college visits to SMHS to connect students to admissions officers



## Standardized Testing



- Prepare for the SAT or ACT
  - Both tests are fundamentally different than school tests
  - Very coachable exams
- Evaluate your need for SAT Subject Tests
  - 1 hour multiple-choice tests on specific subject areas
  - Like final exams
  - Not required by many schools, though a good score can help with highly selective schools
  - No longer needed for UCs, though some campuses will require it for a specific major
  - Math Level 2 ONLY accepted
  - Can take 3 tests at one sitting
  - If taking AP Test consider taking Subject test in the same discipline

## Free & Low Cost Ways to Prepare

- Khan Academy (SAT)
- GATE Program will offer SAT/ACT Prep workshops throughout the year (scholarships available)



- Free prep books Career Center and Local Library
- Larger source of materials at low cost via Amazon, Barnes
   Noble, and others
  - Make sure that you're buying a book for the right SAT or ACT. A \$2 prep book is not a good deal if it's the old test



## What is Financial Aid?

FREE Application for Student Aid

FAFSA – Federally funded to help U.S. citizens, green card holders, and some visa holders

CA Dream Act – State funded to help undocumented students.

If you're not sure which application is right for you, we can help you figure it out. No matter your circumstances, there is money for you to go to college!



## Scholarships at SMHS



- Scholarships become more available to students in the late fall; after application deadlines!
- Scholarship lists are updated in the Career Center on most Fridays.
- Students may pick up the most current scholarship list in the Career Center, along with paper applications when available.
- Remember the more students work on the more they can earn! Start working on scholarships early and remember that not all scholarships are need based. There are many for merit and volunteerism.
- Beware of scams. Never pay or provide information on your personal accounts to apply for a scholarship.

## Summer Programs

Find a summer program that allows you to enrich yourself in something that you genuinely enjoy and/or are curious about. Summer volunteer opportunities are also valuable and can add to a college application.

## Final Thoughts

- Senior year does count- Avoid <u>"Senoritis"</u>,
- Maintain communication- check email regularly (including Canvas, Naviance, and personal), listen to announcements,
- All acceptances <u>provisional</u> dependent upon final semester grades and discipline. Colleges can rescind acceptance letters once final transcripts are sent out!



- In addition to e-mail, login to the college website portals after applying as some schools will communicate with you through their system.
  - Course Preview Day Jan. 31st
    - Students are able to "shop" for next year's classes
- Programming Week of Feb. 10th
  - Counselors visit classrooms
  - Don't neglect your mental health and well being
