How Will SMHS Help Seniors?

- Financial Aid help (classroom presentations and application assistance in the Career Center)
- College Applications (application workshops and Career Center help as needed)

- Inform students of key deadlines

Who Does What?

Steve Hanson – College Advisor

Helps students with college planning, applications, financial aid, scholarships, and anything else related to college, both four year and community colleges.

Sandra Roman/ Daniela Galvan – Senior/ ELD School Counselor

Helps seniors with issues related to academic courses, counseling services, and reaching graduation requirements. Provides students with ELL assistance, AB 540, and DACA guidance.

Nancy Kane – Career Coordinator

Issues work permits, helps students find jobs, volunteering opportunities, and career/training planning for students not going to college.









Post High School Options

3 main California College Systems

- University of California (UC) 10 locations
- California State University (CSU) 23 locations
- California Community College (CCC)-Largest system in nation with over 114 locations

Alternate Options

- Armed Forces
- Apprenticeship Training Programs
- Occupational Training- Cosmetology, Fire Science
- Certificate Programs -Enter work force as soon as 6 months after High School

UC Schools – Important Info

• Apply at :

www.universityofcalifornia.edu/apply

- Filing Period: November 1 30
- SAT with essay, or ACT with essay
- \$70 fee per campus
- 4 personal insight questions
- Minimum 3.0+ GPA

Not Required at Application Time

 Letters of Recommendation (UC campuses are allowed to ask for letters after the fact, but it is a minimal amount of students they can ask.)



CSU Schools – Important Info

- Apply at : <u>https://www2.calstate.edu/apply</u>
- Filing period: October 1-November 30
- SAT or ACT
- \$70 per application
- Minimum 2.0+ GPA

Not Required

- Letters of Recommendation (EOP program will require additional letters)
- Extracurricular Activities
- No essay required



Community College

Entrance Requirements:

- 18 years of age or High School Graduate
- No SAT/ACT required
- Attend Welcome Orientation
- Complete English & Math Assessment Form
- Occupational/Certificate Programs may have additional requirements

Students Should Plan to Attend:

- Spring semester presentation and application workshop
- Sign up for Priority Enrollment Program (PEP)

Community College

CSM Promise Scholars Program

- Full tuition and fees waived for two years
- Textbook assistance
- Gas card or food credit
- Monthly meeting with counselor

How To Apply:

- Complete FAFSA or DREAM ACT
- Apply for the Promise Scholars Program on WebSMART
- Enroll in a minimum of 12 units

Deadlines

- CSU: October 1st November 30th
- UC: November 1st November 30th
- Private & Out of state: Check each University website
- Community College: Open enrollment

Out of State & Private/Independent Application Types

Early Action (EA)

Students apply early and receive a decision well in advance of the institution's regular response date.

Early Decision (ED)

Students make a commitment to a first-choice institution where, if admitted, they are <u>expected</u> to enroll. The application deadline and decision deadline occur early. Decision is <u>BINDING</u>

Regular Decision

Students submit an application by a specified date and receive a decision in a clearly stated period of time-typically found directly on the college website

Rolling Admissions

Institutions review applications as they are submitted and render admission decisions throughout the admission cycle.

School Counselor Letter of Recommendation Deadlines

Friday, October 11th

Last day to request a letter of recommendation if your first college requiring a counselor letter of rec. has a deadline *BEFORE* Dec. 1st

Friday, November 15th

Last day to request a letter of recommendation for all other deadlines

Coalition Application

The Coalition Application is a few years old and only a few schools mandate it. It doesn't always communicate as nicely with our systems, so we ask students to try and avoid it when possible.

WUE – Western Undergraduate Exchange

- Provides an opportunity to attend certain colleges in fellow western states and territories at a fraction of the out of state costs
- Certain GPA and test score requirements may exist to be WUE eligible

- Photo upload procedure
- Use legal name
- Last time to test for Early Decision and Early Action is typically November, though some schools may require tests be taken by October, so be sure to check the dates at all the institutions you are planning to apply to

SAT Subject Test

- 1 hour multiple choice tests on specific subject areas
- Similar to final exams as far as content
- Rarely required for college admissions, though some programs at schools may require or recommend that students take them (e.g. UC Irvine doesn't require it for their university, but does recommend SAT Math Level 2 for their School of Physical Sciences)
- Can take (3) tests in one sitting
- Cannot take SAT Reasoning and Subject Tests during same test date

Requesting Transcripts

- Make sure to pick up Transcript Request Form in the College and Career Center
- If transcript needs to be mailed, a small transcript fee applies.

What is Financial Aid?

FREE Application for Student Aid

FAFSA – Federally funded to help U.S. citizens, green card holders, and some visa holders

CA Dream Act – State funded to help undocumented students.

If you're not sure which application is right for you, we can help you figure it out. No matter your circumstances, there is money for you to go to college!



Deadlines

File FAFSA or CA Dream Act starting on Oct. 1st


• Do this early, some grants are offered on a first come, first serve basis

Cal Grant Deadline is March 2nd

- Our high school files the Cal Grants electronically for students
- Individual college financial aid deadlines are crucial.
 Financial aid deadlines begin as early as November 1st. In that case you must have all documentation turned into your college by that deadline. Don't Miss Out!
- CSS Profile on <u>www.collegeboard.com</u> is required by many private and independent universities to help distribute institutional aid

Financial Aid Timeline

On October 1st, 2018 you can start filling out financial aid for the 2019-20 freshman year of college using tax forms from 2017.

Scholarships at SMHS

- Scholarships become more available to students in the late fall; after application deadlines!
- Scholarship lists are updated in the Career Center every 1 – 2 weeks.
- Students may pick up the most current scholarship list in the Career Center, along with paper applications when available.
- Remember the more students work on the more they can earn! Start working on scholarships early and remember that not all scholarships are need based. There are many for merit and volunteerism.
- Beware of scams. Never pay or provide information on your personal accounts to apply for a scholarship.

Final Thoughts

- Senior year does count- Avoid <u>Senioritis</u>
- Maintain communication- check email regularly (including Canvas, Naviance and personal), listen to announcements, Remind text service

- Change in schedule-must notify colleges
- Colleges can rescind acceptance letters once final transcripts are sent out!
- In addition to e-mail, login to the college website portals after applying as some schools will communicate with you through their system


Parents in the Process
