The Pittsford Central School District Board of Education has appointed Heather Clayton as Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, with a start date of July 1, 2024. The appointment follows a thorough search and interview process. "Heather has that rare mix of knowledge and experience and serves with a truly collaborative style. I'm confident that she is the right person to take Pittsford Schools to the next level in our continuous pursuit of improvement," said Superintendent Michael Pero.

Clayton is currently serving as principal at Pittsford's Mendon Center Elementary School and expressed, "It has been an honor and a privilege to serve the Mendon Center

community as principal for the past 13 years. As Assistant Superintendent for Instruction, I look forward to continuing the work of collaborating with incredible educators to create dynamic learning opportunities for our students across the District."

Clayton is replacing retiring ASI Melanie Ward who will return to serve the District as Deputy Superintendent through November to assist with the transition and provide support to non-tenured and newly hired elementary principals, among others.



Student Athletic Events Score Big Wins for Golisano Children's Hospital and Breast Cancer Coalition of Rochester

Seats were full and spirits were high during this year's highly anticipated Rainbow Classic Basketball Games and Pink the Rink Hockey Games that raised a combined \$39,000 for local organizations.

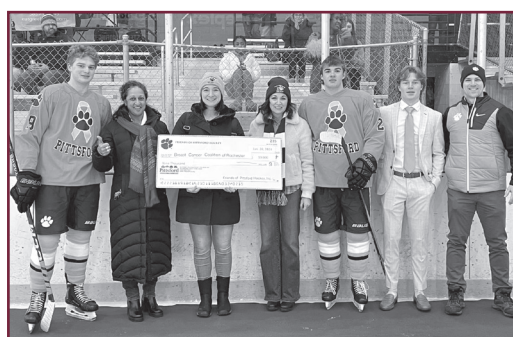
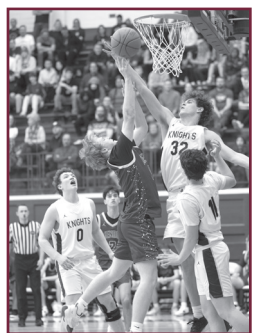
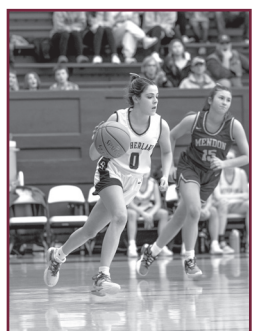
The 23rd annual Rainbow Classic basketball games on December 22 saw the Pittsford community come together once again to support a great cause, selling out tickets and raising \$30,000 to support Golisano Children's Hospital.

The University of Rochester Palestra was packed with fans as Sutherland girls varsity basketball narrowly defeated Mendon with a score of 56-50 in the first game of the night, and the Sutherland boys varsity team beat out the Mendon Vikings with a final score of 58-40.

Since the Rainbow Classic began, PCSD has raised approximately \$600,000 for Golisano Children's Hospital in support of various projects at the hospital, including Pediatric Intensive Care Unit patient rooms, the Child and Adolescent Eating Disorder Program, the Teen Lounge, the Pediatric Palliative Care Program and more. Proceeds from this year's Rainbow Classic will support the Golisano Pediatric Behavioral Health and Wellness Center.

The 14th annual Pink the Rink hockey games on January 20 raised \$9,000 to support the Breast Cancer Coalition of Rochester. Donning their iconic pink jerseys, the Panthers defeated Victor Blue Devils in an exciting and fast paced game that ended with a score of 7-5 and marking the 250th win for Coach Steve Thering.

The event has raised a total of \$100,000 towards education, support, and advocacy of breast cancer research since the start of the tradition in 2010.



Leadership Retirements Announced

The Pittsford Central School District Board of Education accepted retirement letters from Assistant Superintendent for Instruction Melanie Ward, Allen Creek Elementary School Principal Michael Biondi, and Teacher Center Director Julie Barker at its December 12, 2023, meeting.

Assistant Superintendent for Instruction **Melanie Ward** will retire from her position as of June 30, and then will be appointed as Deputy Superintendent to assist with these leadership transitions. She will stay on in this new role through November 2024. "Mrs. Ward has served in the District as principal of Mendon Center Elementary School and Assistant Superintendent," said Superintendent Michael Pero. "Her gift for leading a multitude of committees and developing first class curriculum will be missed."



Michael Biondi, Allen Creek Elementary School Principal, will assist with the transition of a new principal at the school with a final retirement date of October 2024. He will also be working on special projects and assisting with the mentorship of newer elementary school administrators. Prior to his long-standing role as principal of Allen Creek Elementary School, Biondi served as a teacher in the District and assistant principal at Mendon Center Elementary School. "Mr. Biondi is a beloved principal with a talent for leading with his heart," said Superintendent Michael Pero. "We will miss his leadership style, enthusiasm for continuous improvement, and sense of humor."



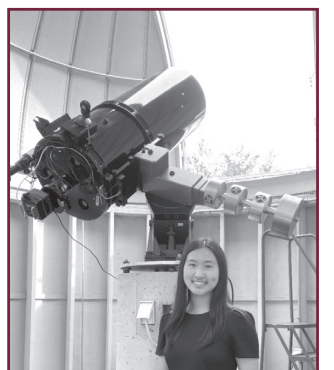
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SHS Senior Maureen Zhang Named a Top 300 Science Scholar

Congratulations to Sutherland High School student Maureen Zhang for being named a Top 300 Scholar in the 83rd Regeneron Science Talent Search, the nation's oldest and most prestigious science and mathematics competition for high school seniors. She was among 2,162 applicants from 712 high schools across 46 states, Guam, Puerto Rico and ten other countries. Zhang's research project centered on improving the accuracy of identifying exoplanets.

As a Top 300 Regeneron Scholar, Zhang will be awarded \$2,000, and Sutherland High School will receive another \$2,000 to use toward STEM-related activities.

"I'm really grateful to be a student in PCSD. All the support I've received from teachers, administrators, and other mentors over the years has been essential to inspiring my interest in science and helping me realize my dream of pursuing science research," said Zhang, adding that she is also grateful for the additional funding SHS will be awarded to support STEM programs and potential future Regeneron Scholars.



Financial Literacy Education Paves the Way for Future Success

To equip students with essential life skills, Pittsford Schools offers courses in financial literacy that align with New York State standards. In addition, the Career and Technical Education program has financial literacy elements integrated into more than 15 classes. These courses incorporate real-world applications through case studies, simulations, projects, discussions of current events, internships, and insights from industry professionals.

The Financial Management unit of the Business Dynamics II course covers topics like checking and savings accounts, retirement accounts, using credit cards wisely, and how to read a credit report score. Students learn skills to help them on the job by understanding paycheck calculations, payroll taxes, and tax returns. A large focus is on budgeting skills. Students create a budget with a set salary in which they must locate, rent, and furnish an apartment, purchase a car, and explore fixed versus variable expenses.

The Financial Planning class is a semester-long course designed to expand upon the skills necessary to be financially competent in financial planning, saving options, paying for higher education, and investing money. The course includes a virtual stock market

simulation to prepare students for managing their money in challenging economic environments. Students who take this class also receive three SUNY Community College credits and may qualify for a Financial Literacy Certification through the National Wise Financial Literacy Program.

To address current trends in digital payment and investment platforms, cryptocurrencies, and other technological influences, students also learn about managing money safely online and how to be aware of financial scams and fraud.



NY-ALERT System
for Sex Offender
Notifications

Residents of New York can register to receive alerts when moderate or high risk sex offenders move into or out of their area. The NY-ALERT System will send alerts through email or as a text message, fax or telephone recording.

Subscribers can register for up to three areas for notification. Areas are defined by county, zip code or a specific address. If a specific address is selected, the subscriber designates a radius from a quarter-mile to 25 miles around that address.

Registration can be completed at criminaljustice.ny.gov/nsor/. Subscribers will receive sex offender relocation notices when a Level 2 (moderate risk) or Level 3 (high risk) sex offender listed on the public subdirectory moves into or out of a community of interest. By law, the state can only provide information about Level 1 (low risk) offenders or those with a pending risk level through a toll-free number (1-800-262-3257).

This service is possible through a partnering of the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services (DCJS) and the New York State Emergency Management Office (SEMO) which manages the NY-ALERT system.

Private & Parochial
Transportation
Requests Due April 1

Residents whose children plan to use Pittsford Central School District’s transportation next year for private or parochial school attendance are required by the State Education Department to file a Private & Parochial Transportation Request Form with the District before April 1, 2024, in order to receive transportation services. Dual Location/Daycare forms are also due by April 1.

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Leadership Retirements Announced

Teacher Center Director **Julie Barker** will be retiring effective July 1, 2023. Prior to becoming the Director of the Pittsford Teacher Center in 2007, she served as the Standards Leader for Elementary and Secondary Social Studies and taught Economics at Mendon and Sutherland High Schools from 2000-2007. Barker joined the District in 1995 as a social studies teacher at Pittsford Middle School. “Mrs. Barker’s talent for developing and leading professional development courses has been paramount in helping teachers and staff practice continuous improvement and excellence in their fields,” said Superintendent Pero.



Succession Plans

Pittsford Central School District has seen multiple retirements over the past few years causing a flourish of open administrative positions, particularly at the elementary level. To put this in perspective, Pittsford Schools’ most senior elementary principal has two years PCSD experience, two principals have less than one year experience in this role with PCSD, and the District will begin the search process for new principals at Mendon Center Elementary School and Allen Creek Elementary School, respectively. This is a total average experience of .8 years for elementary principals in the District. “For this reason, we have developed a succession plan around key positions,” said Superintendent Pero. “Our retiring administrators will take a wealth of experience and expertise with them, so we want to create a solid transition that will put their replacements on good footing from the start,” he said.

Assistant Superintendent for Instruction (ASI) Melanie Ward will retire from her position as of June 30, 2024. Heather Clayton, current principal at Mendon Center Elementary, is replacing her. Ward will return to serve the District temporarily as Deputy Superintendent through November 2024. The focus of her responsibilities will be to assist with the transition of the new ASI and support the five recently hired elementary principals. With the June 30 retirement of Teacher Center Director Julie Barker, Ward will also oversee all summer professional development, the staff mentoring program for new staff, and staff orientations. Post November 2024, the Deputy Superintendent Position will be abolished.

Michael Biondi, Allen Creek Elementary School Principal, will assist with the transition of a new principal at Allen Creek Elementary School and work on special projects, with a final retirement date of October 2024.

“I am grateful that we will benefit during this transition period from the skills and talents of these leaders for mentorship, consultation and special projects and thank them for their willingness to stay for a few additional months,” said Superintendent Pero.

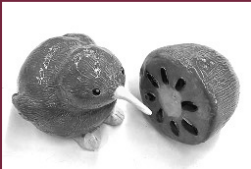


Students Win Awards in START HERE Art Competition

Food Facts: Understanding Pittsford Schools Lunch Options

At the start of this school year, Pittsford Central School District welcomed Elena Montgomery as the new Director of Food Services. With her extensive food service background, Montgomery brings a fresh perspective while maintaining the District’s longstanding commitment to providing well-balanced and nutritious lunches.



“As I settle into this role, I am committed to making changes that benefit our students and program. I look forward to working with parents and getting students involved,” said Montgomery. “By working together and sharing ideas and information, we can continue to make improvements.”

Exciting Changes in Our School Menus

The menus, which are updated monthly, offer a variety of choices. Quality assurance has also been a focus to ensure consistent experiences throughout the District. This year, Pittsford Schools has started offering food samples to students who want to test new menu options. From popular items like pizza and taco Tuesdays to new additions such as a turkey caprese sandwich, oven-roasted chicken wings with dipping sauces, Philly cheesesteak sandwich, or homestyle chicken noodle soup, the dedicated Food Service team actively works on menu enhancements to include delicious and diverse options.

“My hope is to encourage the students to eat fruits and vegetables. We just started new items like Asian-style carrots and tomato and cucumber salad as vegetable options, as well as different preparation methods to encourage students to take them,” explained Montgomery, “We have a long way to go, but you will continue to see an increase in fresh fruit and vegetable options in our cafeterias.”

Navigating Healthy Choices: Empowering Parents and Students

The food services department is actively working on expanding menus to include more nutritious choices with a balanced and wholesome dining experience. Popular snack items are taken into consideration too. Ninety-five percent of baked goods are made with at least 51% whole grain flour, only baked chips are available, ice cream is low fat or fat-free, and with some exceptions at secondary schools, juice beverages are mostly 100% fruit juice.

Parents/guardians can easily manage and monitor their child’s meal account by accessing MySchoolBucks.com to view meal purchases and current account balances, providing a convenient way to stay informed. Parents/guardians may also request that certain ala carte items be restricted at any time on their student’s account by contacting Director of Food Services Elena Montgomery or a cafeteria manager at pittsfordschools.org/FoodStaff.

Flexibility in Menu Choices: Beyond Guidelines

The decision to exit the National School Lunch Program in 2013 was driven by valuable input collected from surveys and meetings with students, faculty, and parents, enabling Pittsford Schools to better align with the desires of the community.

Opting out of the National School Lunch Program has provided the opportunity for more flexibility and the ability to offer a diverse range of options beyond the program while still adhering to USDA Dietary Guidelines. Where other districts are required to use government commodity food such as certain meat, cheese, and canned goods, Pittsford Schools can incorporate vendors and items that are not on bid or used by other districts.

PCSD focuses on local produce and dairy whenever possible. The District purchases meat from Palmer Foods, serves only fat-free white or chocolate milk from Upstate Farms, produce from American Fruit & Vegetable Company, and whole grain products from Midstate Bakery. The five components required by the USDA of whole grains, fruits, vegetables, a meat or meat alternative protein, and milk is offered with each meal.

Funding School Meals

Without the state or federal subsidies provided by the National School Lunch Program, the PCSD food services program operates as a self-supporting business relying solely on funds generated through lunch and ala carte sales to cover all operating and personnel expenses. Although prices may be slightly higher due to the lack of taxes to offset costs compared to neighboring schools, PCSD is thoughtful in controlling expenses to keep lunch prices reasonable without compromising the overall dining experience.

Pittsford Schools is dedicated to providing students with a positive and nutritious dining experience and welcomes feedback and suggestions regarding the school lunch program. Emergency Reunification Training

The safety and security of our students is the number one priority for Pittsford Schools. As part of our efforts, we have partnered with the "I Love U Guys" foundation (iloveuguy.org) to lead administration and staff through training and tabletop exercises around the reunification of parents/guardians with their children in the event of a crisis situation. These trainings and exercises can better equip Pittsford Schools to respond to emergencies such as fires, floods, blizzards, power outages, or acts of violence, while maintaining a safe chain of custody for every student. Reviewing and practicing our standard response protocol and reunification method will help keep our students safe during an emergency and our staff prepared to put the plan into action.



WIN Days Personalize Learning to Give Students What They Need

Flexible learning days called What I Need (WIN) days at Mendon and Sutherland High Schools provide each student with extra time during a 30-minute period once a week to engage in learning based on their individual needs. Students may choose to work on homework or group projects, access special services, visit a guidance counselor, seek academic support from a teacher, or whatever the student may need on that given day.

Families can register children in one of two ways:

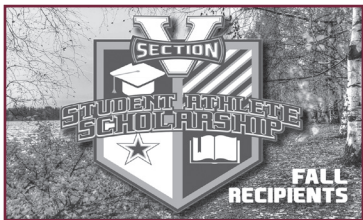

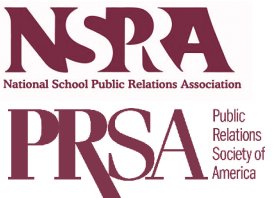
