
podcasts

chunky shoes



puffer jackets




We Are Motivated to Find Love

Building off the motivation theory, love coincides with the need for more



It's Just a Big Triangle


Developed by psychologist Robert Sternberg, the triangular theory of love proposes that the components of love are intimacy, passion, and commitment. Intimacy encompasses being close, connected, and bonded with another human. Passion refers to the drives that lead to physical attraction and romance. This is accompanied by physiological responses. Commitment is the decision to love someone and commit to love them for a long term. In the short term, it is simply the decision to remain with one another. The various combinations of these three factors, according to Sternberg, explain all forms of human love. For example, romantic love has high levels of intimacy and passion, but low levels of commitment. This also applies to experiencing only one factor of love. If you only experience intimacy, you feel a liking towards the other person, but if you only experience passion, it's only infatuation; and if you only experience commitment, then it's an empty love. According to Sternberg, the experiences of all three factors in equal proportions would be called consummate love.



In All, It's Complicated

Love is complicated because human beings are complicated. There is no definite definition of love, as it comes in so many different forms. There is still much to learn about the most intimate of emotions and studies continue to search for such answers. Maybe we will never know why our heart flutters when we see that one person.

The Gymnastics that PlayStation is Using to Play with My Emotion

For those of you who know me, you know that I *love* Spider-Man and Marvel in general, so here's my long-awaited article about it. I'm sure many of you have heard of the 2018 PS4 Game eloquently titled *Spider-Man*, that in my opinion, was a game changer for the video games of our favorite webslinger.

And it's not just the dumplings, you can also make Aunt May's wheat cakes next time you're craving some *Marvel* nostalgia. If you're wondering about how to make these delicious dishes, go to YouTube and search "Binging with Babish: Backpack Recipes from Marvel's Spider-Man." While it's definitely the main plot and graphics that made this game stand out from the rest, it's probably all the cool side missions and cameos that are most memorable.

Moving on to the next game in the series, *Spider-Man: Miles Morales* was released with the PS5, and while many players believed that it was only playable on the PS5, they also created a PS4 version, for which I was very thankful. AN INTERVIEW with///s. Lynch

L: Where are you from?

I'm from Rochester! I grew up in Chile and went to Gates high school. I have two brother, both are younger than me, and my mom and dad still live in the house we grew up in!

L: What did you do before this?

I kind of have a varied past. I went to SUNY Geneseo for education: I first thought – when I was in high school – that I wanted to go into sports medicine because I like to do a lot of activities. So then I thought, maybe I wanna be a gym teacher? But then I thought "No, I don't want to" because if kids don't participate in gym, it'll just make me really frustrated. So, then it was sports medicine. As a part of PIG class I shadowed someone and I was like "oooh this is not what I thought it was," and I was not thrilled with it. I was actually already helping out in one of our special education classrooms. I helped out students with multiple disabilities with learning daily living skills and doing activities with them, so then I decided that I wanted to go into education from there. So, I went to Geneseo and I have a special elementary education degree, education degree, math degree, computer science degree...

L: What is your favorite thing about Mendon so far?

So far everyone has been super friendly! Like if I say hello to someone in the hall, they say hi back to me. I just feel very welcome here, and feel like kids and teachers seem happy to be here and overall, just a positive place to be!

L: Is there anything that has been surprising about Mendon?

I don't think so yet – it's day 8 for me, so I haven't been here a ton. Actually, the thing that surprises me the most is that for as big of a school as Mendon is, it still feels like a community. You know when places feel super big, and you feel lost? But here you feel like you are still part of a community even though it's a big school.



We were also investigating how astronauts grow plants in space on the international space station. So we would skype with the space station, and they sent us this growing module. So, we grew plants that we could then send up to the space station and have them evaluate how well the plants could grow up in space. So just cool stuff like that!

A & L: That's really cool!!

Yeah, so my husband was always like "What did you do today, did you raise trout today?" There was always something interesting that someone thought would bring their curriculum to life and I was like "Yeah we can make that work!"

L: Is there something students might not know about admin?

A & L: Oh wow!

Mrs. Lynch: So yeah, all sorts of things! From there I did a year at BOSES in Gates and then a year in Spencerport, but then my husband was relocated 10 miles up from Manhattan for 11 years. So I worked there, and when our second child was born, we moved up here again. So I was teaching in Churchville for 9 years before I came here!

L: What did you teach?

I was an instructional coach, which is a teacher who works with teachers to think about shifts in education. Thinking about new standards that came out for science, thinking about new ways to work in your classroom, and shifting over to one-to-one devices. So, any professional development for teachers and stuff like that is mostly what I did.

A: Yeah, I feel like Mendon is a perfect size: not too big, not too small.

Well, my kids go to Allen Creek, which is very small! There are some positives and negatives to that. The school I just came from was grades 5-12 in one building so you can imagine how big that is. So here even though it's big, it feels like a community, while at my last school it was just, like, sprawling.

L: Have you had any bizarre or interesting things that has happened to you in your career?

My husband likes to say that my life is bizarre. In my last position, I was the person that people came to when they came up with something they wanted to do in their classroom, and I would be like "yeah we are going to figure out how to make that happen!" So, one person was like "I wanna raise trout and release them in the spring" and I said, "Great, let's do it!" So I found a person from the department of environmental conservation, they came in and got us this huge tank and trout eggs. So the students got to raise them and watch them grow ,and in the spring we went on this huge field trip and released them in Irondequoit Creek!

When you're little, you think that your teachers never leave school. They sleep at school, you know? But when you go back to your elementary school you go "woah this is so small!" It put perspective back on things. And so I think you have to remember that I was a kid once too. And sometimes I've gone through the same thing that you guys are, even though it might've been years ago. You learn from your mistakes, right, like everyone makes mistakes and you learn from your mistakes. But I think we are people outside of here too, you know. Like I have a family, I'm an avid runner, I love to read, you know. My happy place is on the beach, with a book.

A: Yeah, that sounds really nice, especially in the winter right now.

I know. So, I go out, actually, I saw Mr. Domroes yesterday, we happen to run the same trails and we had no idea that we run the same trails and I was out running, and he was out running and it was just...yup.

L: That's so funny.

We ran into each other, like, I had no idea. Yes, so I really enjoy running. It's kinda like my escape when I have the time to do it.

L: What's your most used app on your phone?

You know what it used to be? It used to be the Wegmans self-checkout app, so you didn't have to wait in a line and you could walk around and scan your items and bag them and then leave.

L: What's your guilty pleasure?

Honestly, it's running.

A: [grimacing] Interesting. I can't, I'm not a runner.

I mean, it's a healthy guilty pleasure.

L: No, I agree, that's a great guilty pleasure. It's better than mine.

A: Mine's, like, binge eating chocolate See, I don't like chocolate. I really do love candy – you know, like Twizzlers, Sour Patch Kids. Chocolate's not really my thing. And in our house, it's very bizarre but I'm not sure when the last time our television was on.

Glossier:

My Obsession with Millennial Packaging and Overpriced Vaseline

If anyone is obsessed with Glossier right now, it's certainly me. Don't tell anyone, but I recently spent a borderline obscene amount of money (don't worry I used my gift card too)!!! There's just something so fascinating about their marketing; they have something that keeps customers coming back!!! If there's one thing I can say about millennials; they've truly found the best way to market things in beautiful packaging. Glossier's staple "G" is featured on every product with a simple yet quirky font... And, if you've been keeping up with Glossier news like me, you've heard about the Glossier product reformulations and repackaging....

Oh yeah, I totally forgot to tell you what Glossier was!! I just got so excited!! If you didn't know...Glossier, a makeup and skincare brand known for their "no makeup-makeup look" was created in 2014 by CEO Emily Weiss. Known particularly for their Balm Dotcom (lip salves), Generation G lipsticks, and a variety of other products, it is popular with all age ranges. Even my mom loves Glossier!! However, in recent years—Glossier has become more infantilizing for Gen-Z and Millennials alike!! While its products are great and well worth the cost, their packaging is really what draws customers in. It's minimalistic and with their relatable advertising, their products sell out quickly.

The infamous Balm Dotcom has been out for over 9 years and has featured a wide array of products, simply leaving customers coming back for more. With decadent flavors such as berry, lavender, wild fig, mango, and coconut---Glossier is truly a cult classic. While the lip balms are essentially just INCREDIBLY overpriced Vaseline, how could I resist?!! They just look so pretty, and they work so well, so what can I say!!! Over the last 2 years I have collected 6 balms, none of them I have finished to this day, and probably never will. Among the famous "You" solid perfume, and some miscellaneous skincare products, I just bought the lavender, mango, berry, and cherry flavors and let me tell you, I am beyond obsessed.



In the summer of 2022 Glossier announced their soon to be partnership with makeup and beauty retailer Sephora. Earlier Glossier announced that they would be going through with this change in early February 2023. Around the Holiday Season, Glossier announced that there would be some major changes with their product formulations, packaging, and products being offered. The Balm Dotcoms along with their other products that contain ingredients such as petroleum jelly, lanolin, and beeswax. Lanolin, a hydrating and moisturizing agent is a component of many lip balms, but is animal based and derived from wool. Furthermore, beeswax and petroleum jelly are not considerably sustainable when it comes to cruelty free/environmentally friendly ingredients. In replacement of the removed ingredients, castor oil now substitutes in for petroleum jelly, and beeswax has been replaced with castor jelly/oil.



This really furthers Glossier's idea of marketability, as Sephora has certain standards when it comes to their products being "Clean or Not". Specifically, Sephora writes that "when you see our clean seal, you can be assured that the product is formulated without specific ingredients that are known or suspected to be potentially harmful to human health and/or the environment". It's obvious that Glossier is changing their packaging for the sole purpose of being seen as a more sustainable brand than they have been in the past. While I believe that they are doing this for the sake of just appearing more environmentally friendly, their limited use of animal products does benefit the environment. However, from a consumer standpoint, some may turn away from the famous Balm Dot-com due to these formulations. While castor oil and the swap for synthetic beeswax won't alter the texture tremendously, the exclusion of lanolin certainly will. As I previously mentioned, lanolin is what really keeps your lips moisturized. Therefore, some may find the Balm Dotcom to be more drying and simply not as hydrating as before.

As a Glossier customer, I can confidently say that the most upsetting part about this change is the discontinuation of the Cherry Balm Dotcom. One of the oldest flavors, cherry has that medicinal cherry scent—but not in an overwhelmingly and overpowering way at all. It comes out of the tube bright red, when applied on the lips. Sadly, when all the formulaic changes are rolled out, the Cherry balm will be discontinued. Many have spoken out in frustration but as Glossier shifts towards more "clean ingredients" consumers feel their cries are being ignored. Many Glossier customers have become bitter and feel that Glossier is not prioritizing what their customers want over marketability and profit. However, it is really challenging to create a red lip balm that is vegan and cruelty free. For many products, natural dyes and synthetic dyes contain so many things that we don't realize. Often, these dyes are tested on animals and are not without cruelty themselves. However, when it comes to formulating a vegan product, creating bright reds can be super challenging. So, it makes complete sense why Glossier may want to discontinue a product ahead of time knowing that it may not potentially sell as well as their other



From an aesthetic standpoint, Glossier's move towards in-person shopping will not only include formulaic changes but also packaging changes as well. Balms have always come in a paint tube style with no direct applicator. While this can make application a little bit messier, I feel like it truly helps Glossier stand out as a brand. Similarly, while its main application is a chapstick, Glossier encourages its customers to apply their balms wherever they please, even advertising it as a makeup alternative of sorts. Starting early February 2023, the cap of the Balm Dot Com itself will become larger and the applicator will be a rounded one—that of a Carmex chapstick per se. Personally, I love the applicator how it is, and I think that Glossier should listen to their customers and keep it just how it is. However, I understand how it makes direct application far more efficient and provides more intentional packaging.



While I couldn't be more excited for Glossier to

become an in-person item that I can shop at my disposal, I think that this massive change—not only affecting Glossier but other makeup companies as well, makes me curious. While I am happy to see many companies shift to cleaner, more environmentally friendly products it's not without s-

-uspicion. Furthermore, clean products do not equal good/better for you whatsoever. I see so many brands that are shifting towards more natural ingredients with just as harmful substitutes, where their products simply work poorly after product changes at the expense of seeming more relatable to customers. Just like how aluminum free all-natural deodorants claim to be the best on the market, you'll be smelling horrendous before you step into school, trust me. So, thanks but I'll be sticking to my aluminum free, BUT alcohol and chemical filled deodorant (thanks Old Spice) ---even if it's marketed to lumberjacks and not high school students. So, be on the lookout for Sephora's Glossier drop, you can't miss it!!!

Some kids in my class can be really disruptive, it makes getting work done almost impossible as the classroom gets very loud! How can I stay productive in this situation?


