

4th Grade Summer Project

Fiction: Read **at least 2** chapter books of your choice (parent approved of course) each containing at least 100 pages. Be sure to take your reading level into account when selecting your books. You'll have the opportunity to take your first two AR quizzes for the 4th grade year when you return to the classroom. We will be discussing our summer reading in class, so you are welcome to take some notes on your favorite parts and bring them to class. * If you choose a graphic novel, we request you read 2 graphic novels and one novel.



Nonfiction/Informational: Choose 2 sources to read. This can be an article in a newspaper about a sport, a magazine article, or a source from a place you visit this summer, such as a brochure. Notice the text features used and try to determine the main idea of the section.
