Congratulations to Peninsula High School and Gig Harbor High School for being named the Special Olympics Unified Champion Schools of the Month for February and March, respectively. Unified Sports joins students with and without intellectual disabilities on the same team and is a path to friendship and understanding.

Unified Sports have seen tremendous growth at PHS this year, with many students getting involved in this program. PHS offers Unified Basketball, Soccer, and Cheer, and they recently added Unified Esports, where they play Mario Kart and Rocket League. Next year, PHS will add Unified Track in the spring, and students will be given the opportunity to run relays at the state track meet.

GHHS students celebrated their first Unified Basketball season with more than 30 students coming together to play and build community, and many more partners showing up to support students on and off the court. Because of how popular the first season was, GHHS will add Unified Soccer at their school next year.

At Evergreen Elementary and Voyager Elementary, Transitional Kindergarten (TK) classes spend at least an hour outdoors each day, rain or shine. Being outdoors provides a great opportunity for imaginative and creative play. Students can look for patterns and shapes in nature, and use leaves, rocks, flowers and more to learn about sorting.

Evergreen TK students recently filled garden beds with soil donated from Purdy Topsoil and Gravel and spread wildflower seeds donated by Heron Landscape and Design, who also provided supplies to make the beds. Students use leftover scraps from the school kitchen to feed the compost bins. The compost will then be used in the garden beds, to help grow pumpkins and wildflowers.

Voyager TK students recently gave two visitors from Bodø, Norway a tour of their outdoor spaces and open air classroom. TK classes at both schools are learning virtually with students across the world in Bodø, teaming up with a Barnehage to learn how pollinators contribute to the beauty and biodiversity of our world. Thank you to our community and Norway partners for helping students get outside and learn about our environment!

PROJECT BASED LEARNING ABOUT PHYSICS AND ENERGY AT PIONEER

PSD ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS HONORED WITH GREEN RIBBON AWARDS

The Peninsula School District is proud to announce Artondale Elementary and Evergreen Elementary have been nominated by the Washington Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) to be recognized as U.S. Department of Education Green Ribbon Honorees for 2024.

In 2023, Pioneer Elementary was recognized as a Green Ribbon School Honoree by the U.S. Department of Education. Swift Water Elementary, Voyager Elementary, and Evergreen Elementary were also named 2023 Washington State Green Leader Schools.

"It's a tremendous source of pride for our district to have our schools honored for their environmental stewardship and sustainability efforts," Superintendent Krestin Bahr stated. "This recognition highlights the collaborative efforts to equip our students with the knowledge and values crucial for our planet's future."









CYBERPATRIOT COMPETITION HELPS PHS STUDENTS FOCUS ON CAREER PATHS



Two students from Peninsula High School competed for the first time in CyberPatriot's National Youth Cyber Defense Competition. The competition challenges teams of high school and middle school students to find and fix cybersecurity vulnerabilities in virtual operating systems.

The two students, freshman Amelia B. and senior Zachary G., are both in the district's Navy Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (NJROTC), but Cyber-Patriot is open to all students. The pair competed remotely and made it to the first round of state competition, despite some technical issues. CyberPatriot was key for both students as they considered future career paths.

Zachary is graduating from PHS and just enlisted into the United States Navy's Cyber Warfare Community. He will go to school in Florida and then be assigned to a cyber warfare command. He credits his Advanced Placement classes and CyberPatriot for helping him figure out his postsecondary plan. NJROTC Command Master Chief Robert Stockton said cyber warfare is a difficult career path to enter, but the skills Zachary used during the CyberPatriot competition identified him as a potential fit for cyber warfare.

"I heard about CyberPatriot from CMC Stockton and thought the idea of exploring cybersecurity was very interesting," Zachary said. "On my first day in the program, I learned about its value in organizations and how it influences millions of people's lives. From that day on, I started looking into the cyberwork field."

Amelia is active in both the district's NJROTC program and the McChord Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol, and she hopes to continue with cybersecurity as a future career path, or cryptography which is hiding or coding information like messages.

"I have been interested in cybersecurity, so I joined CyberPatriot at my school to get better for the future," Ameila said.

Coach Anne Bunker is hoping to grow the program next year with multiple teams from across our district's middle and high schools. Each team can be up to five students, and Bunker is hoping to recruit three technical mentors from the community to help students compete.


SAFETY AND SECURITY UPDATES AROUND THE DISTRICT

Thank you voters for approving the Safety, Security and Technology Levy in 2023. Levy funding began in April 2024, so the district has already started updates and upgrades to make schools more secure and increase access to technology.

Upgrades to come during the rest of this school year include increased security cameras, two-way radio communication upgrades, Promethean boards at Purdy Elementary and Minter Creek Elementary, and emergency notification system upgrades at Harbor Heights Elementary and Discovery Elementary. Additional chain link fencing is also being installed at Gig Harbor High School and Peninsula High School to improve safety at both campuses.

In the 2024-25 school year, Vaughn Elementary, Harbor Heights Elementary and Goodman Middle School will all receive Promethean boards. Watch for more updates in the fall!

SCHOOL WRITING CONTESTS


Schools have inspired students to share their voice.


The Peninsula School District is currently undertaking a significant initiative: adopting a new English Language Arts (ELA) curriculum across all grade levels, from kindergarten to 12th grade. This process is being rolled out with varying timelines by grade, but the objective remains consistent: to equip students with a rigorous ELA curriculum that aligns with standards and utilizes evidence-based methodologies.

Our primary aim is to select a curriculum that aligns with Washington State ELA standards within an evidence-based framework, ensuring equitable access to high-quality learning for all students. The selected curriculum must include robust support for teachers. Alignment with the district's Literacy Task Force's Guiding Principles and compatibility with the current elementary educator Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling (LETRS) professional learning are crucial.

The Teaching and Learning Department is collaborating with classroom teachers, principals, special education staff, and our multilingual team to meticulously review and assess potential curricula. This evaluation is based on a comprehensive rubric designed to measure each curriculum against district, state, and national educational standards and goals. As part of this inclusive process, we will also provide opportunities for family and community input, to consider a wide range of perspectives.
