





Sophomore Taylor Burton and her boyfriend sophomore Jake Williamson have been dating about a year.


"My boyfriend is my best friend, we've known each other since the sixth grade," Burton said.





Luckily, Greer said she was invited to sit with someone on her first day, and she was extremely appreciative.


So far, her transition to Oxford has been one she has enjoyed.







Hussey loves to spend time with one of her favorite groups of students, her SMART team. Throughout the years she has become close to these students and has come to know them.


Thinking back on old memories Hussey remembers another group of students she became close to called "the lunch bunch." This was a group

Since she started working here, Hussey has kept up with students.



"It's hard to act like McMikittrick," Wollaston said. "Her spirit is like the wind—it







"It's too late to turn back now," Simmons said he thought as he walked onto the football field. Simmons said he felt confident something great was about to happen.


The moment before the Oueen was announced, Simmons knew he was escorting the Queen.

In mid-April junior Karis Buchanan began feeling a sharp pain in her side. The pain steadily increased, and in September her parents took her to the doctor for a check-up.











Even though Henry only missed three and a half games, he said he did worry about the season.


"I couldn't play two games, and I had to sit out for one and a half games. On top of that, it affected my practice time," Henry said

















Williams was in the 8th grade when she began to play softball.
























"Chorus is a place where I can show my talents," Davis said. "I love to sing."

Both Davis and Armstrong have been in madrigals, concert choir, and show choir. They have qualified to travel to both district and state adjudication this school year.







"I didn't know what other elective I wanted to take," Crawford said, "so I thought, 'What would I be good at? Mu-


Crawford joined the OHS strings class during 7th period and began playing the

"Close to my entire family has been involved in the military, and I've wanted to join since I was five. My brother and I have always been absolutely obsessed," Rinker said.



"Most people would say death is their biggest fear about the military. It's a sure thing you're going to die anyway," Rinker said, "so why not do something great with your life."







"There was no question on who my Star-Teacher would be," Roberts said. Her choice: History teacher Mary Stone.


Roberts said she learned much during her time in Stone's Pre-AP World History class where they did many hands-on projects.

Stone was happy as well. "It is always an honor (to be chosen for star teacher) especially when chosen by one of your own students, because they don't have to pick you," Stone said.



"Chris is a bright kid, I enjoy having him in my class," Reidy said. "He has a good sense of humor."


Chemistry is not only one of Bryant's favorite classes, but he's considering a major in Chemistry or Pre-Med when he enters college.

Bryant plans to go to the University of North Carolina in the fall, where he will pursue what he thinks is "the most interesting field" to study.


"I want to go to a college that challenges me and has a name for education," Bryant said. "I also want be around people like me."






Stones leave OHS
