
Eat More Chicken CHICK-FIL-A: BIG HIT WITH ITS MANY OHS STUDENT EMPLOYEES







"She had to step in at a very late date and try to pull together an event that meant so much to so many students," Lowe said. "She handled it with grace, energy, and enthusiasm."


Husbands was taken by surprise when she was "dragged" onto the field by two cheerleaders.








"Every student having a piece of technology issued to them is a big step for our school," explained Anatomy and Physiology teacher Nicole Roberson.



THE CHEMISTRY OF FLAVORS





Junior Tiara Burt feels similarly.





Although FEA is a small group this year, Wright says she is grateful that her members collaborate with one another, and that each one of them are responsible and do not just join and go to meetings.



The band stayed in Disney for three full days, visiting the Magic Kingdom, Animal Kingdom, and MGM Studios.










Any time Oxford plays Lafayette, the rivalry is extreme and intense. Volleyball is no exception.



















Teamwork paid off to take the girls basketball team to the championship.





Counting this season, Walker has played under Tyler for four years.







This was not Grayzel-Ward's first year on the green, however. Her father introduced her to the sport when she was eight; she later stopped at age ten.


Grayzel-Ward picked golf up again when she came to highschool this year. Coach Hill said she got better every day and was a "joy to coach."

"She's proved herself to be a great player," Watt said.








