### AFFILIATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN YORK COLLEGE OF PENNSYLVANIA and LAMPETER-STRASBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT

THIS AGREEMENT is made this \_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_\_, by and between YORK COLLEGE OF PENNSYLVANIA (hereinafter referred to as "College"), and LAMPETER-STRASBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT (hereinafter referred to as "LAMPETER-STRASBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT"). The parties intend to be bound to the following terms:

### I. DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE COLLEGE

- a. Engaged Online Tuition Discount. The College agrees to award a 15% tuition discount to graduate students whom can provide evidence of current employment with LAMPETER-STRASBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT. The engaged online tuition discount applies to graduate candidates formally admitted and enrolled in Graduate Degree and credit-bearing Certificate programs in the School of Behavioral Sciences and Education, the Graham School of Business (Excluding the Master of Data Analytics and any accompanying certificates), and the School of the Arts, Communication, and Global Studies.
- b. Asynchronous Online Tuition Discount. The College agrees to award a 'Partner Rate' discount to graduate students whom can provide evidence of current employment with LAMPETER-STRASBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT. This applies to graduate candidates formally admitted and enrolled in Graduate Degree and credit-bearing Certificate programs in the Stabler School of Nursing and Health Professions, the Master of Data Analytics and any accompanying certificates.
- c. Single Discount. Only one discount will be applied to any students' tuition. Discounts prices will be publicly available at <a href="https://www.ycp.edu/about-us/offices-and-departments/business-office/tuition-and-fees/graduate-tuition-and-fees/grad

### II. <u>DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES OF LAMPETER-STRASBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT</u>

a. LAMPETER-STRASBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT will communicate the tuition discount opportunities to LAMPETER-STRASBURG SCHOOL DISTRICT employees via hyperlink-embedded emails twice per calendar year.

### III. MUTUAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

a. Agreement Duration and Termination. This agreement will be in effect indefinitely once both parties sign the agreement. Either party may immediately terminate this

Agreement by informing the other party of their desire to do so via signed letter to either signee or their successor.

- b. Revisions. The original intent of this agreement is stated above, but could be expanded with a mutual agreement of both parties. Should this occur either party can submit request for revisions to the other. Should both parties agree, the revisions would be made as addendum to this agreement.
- c. Discount Participation. The discount will not extend to any individuals enrolled prior to the approval of this Agreement nor will it extend beyond the dissolution of this Agreement.
- d. Nondiscrimination. The parties agree to continue their respective policies of nondiscrimination based on Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 in regard to sex, age, race, color, creed, and national origin, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 and other applicable laws, as well as the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- e. Relationship of Parties. The relationship between the parties to this Agreement to each other is that of independent contractors. The relationship of the parties to each other shall not be construed to constitute a partnership, joint venture or any other relationship, other than that of independent contractors.
- f. Liability. Neither of the parties shall assume any liabilities to each other, except as specifically stated in this Agreement. As to liability for damage, injuries or death to persons, or damages to property, the parties do not waive any defense as a result of entering into this Agreement unless such a waiver is expressly and clearly written into a part of this Agreement.
- g. Entire Agreement. This Agreement represents the entire understanding between the parties. No other prior or contemporaneous oral or written understanding or promises exist in regards to this relationship.

Title Homebound Instruction

Code 117

Status Active

Adopted February 4, 2019

### **Authority**

The Board authorizes the district to provide homebound instruction to students confined to home or hospital for physical disability, illness, injury, urgent reasons, or when such confinement is recommended for psychological or psychiatric reasons. The period of homebound instruction for an individual shall not exceed three (3) months. [1][2]

### **Delegation of Responsibility**

Application for homebound instruction shall certify the nature of the illness or disability, state the probable duration of the confinement, and be recommended by the Superintendent.[1][2]

The Superintendent or designee may request approval from the Department of Education to extend the period of homebound instruction for an individual, which shall be re-evaluated every three (3) months.[2]

#### **Guidelines**

The district shall provide homebound instruction only for those confinements expected to last at least ten (10) school days. Exceptions may be recommended by the Superintendent.

The program of homebound instruction provided to each student shall be in accordance with the standards established by the state.

The Superintendent or designee shall have the discretion to withhold homebound instruction when any one (1) of the following occurs:

- 1. The instructor's presence in the place of a student's confinement presents a hazard to the health of the teacher.
- 2. A parent/guardian or other adult in authority is not present with the student during the hours of instruction.
- 3. The condition of the student precludes any benefit from such instruction.

#### 117-AR-0. HOMEBOUND INSTRUCTION

Homebound instruction is provided for students who cannot attend school temporarily because of physical or psychological limitations. Homebound instruction will be provided for students who will be absent for ten (10) school days or longer, upon proper application and documentation.

The parents/guardians of the student must submit to the building principal a request for homebound instruction, along with the district form completed by a licensed physician. The physician must submit the following information:

- 1. Diagnosis.
- 2. Description of disability.
- 3. Prognosis.
- 4. Anticipated duration of absence.
- 5. Tutoring requirement and number of hours.

Students will receive a maximum of five (5) hours per week of homebound instruction.

The building principal is responsible to secure homebound instruction for students in his/her building. The tutor will be compensated at the rate approved by the Board.

The principal will contact the student's teachers to determine their availability to provide homebound instruction. If they are not interested, the principal will secure a certified teacher to deliver the instruction.

The principal will inform the Superintendent about all students and staff involved in cases of homebound instruction.

### Academic Regulations

The instruction schedule will be established by joint agreement of the physician, parent/guardian and homebound instructor, such as day, evening, weekend, and length of each session.

### 117-AR-0. HOMEBOUND INSTRUCTION - Pg. 2

The instructor must be a certified teacher and must be approved for employment by the Board, such as a regular staff member or an approved substitute list teacher.

The classroom teacher will forward assignments, textbooks and materials to the student as soon as possible after notification of the student's confinement. The teacher will confer with the homebound instructor during tutoring to assess the needs and progress of the student.

The homebound instructor will consult with the classroom teacher to gain an understanding of the material to be covered, and make recommendations for grades.

The question of credit being given for the work done in a homebound situation rests with the appropriate administrator. This determination will be made after input from the guidance counselor, classroom teacher, and homebound teacher.

### Nonpublic School Students

Requests for homebound instruction for district students attending nonpublic schools must be submitted to the Superintendent.

Parents/Guardians must follow the established procedure for requests and documentation.

Title Independent Study

Code 118

Status Active

Adopted February 4, 2019

#### **Purpose**

The Superintendent or designee shall consider approval of a course of independent study for a properly qualified student, as recommended by the principal, on the condition that the student shall demonstrate achievement of established educational goals and academic standards as a result of participation in the independent study.

### <u>Authority</u>

The Board may approve each course of independent study and may designate the number of credits toward graduation to be awarded upon successful completion of each course, except that the Board reserves the right to assign no credit for an approved course.[1][2]

Courses of independent study may not be limited to participation by a single student but may involve a group of students, subject to Board approval.

Each course of independent study must meet the requirements of applicable laws and regulations.

### **Delegation of Responsibility**

The Superintendent or designee shall develop administrative regulations to implement independent study programs.

The Superintendent shall prepare recommendations for Board approval of courses of independent study, based on the recommendation of the building principal.

Title Current Events

Code 119

Status Active

Adopted February 4, 2019

#### **Purpose**

The Board believes that consideration of current events has a legitimate place in the educational program of the schools. Properly introduced and conducted, discussion of such events can help students learn to identify important issues, explore fully and fairly all sides of an issue, weigh carefully the values and factors involved, and develop skills for formulating and evaluating positions and opinions.

### **Definition**

A **current event** is defined as a topic on which opposing points of view have been promulgated by responsible opinion and is not expressly enumerated in the course guide as content of the course of study.

### **Authority**

The Board shall permit the introduction and proper educational use of current events, provided that their use in the instructional program:[1]

- 1. Is related to the course's educational goals and the students' level of maturity.
- 2. Does not tend to indoctrinate or persuade students to a particular point of view.
- 3. Encourages balanced presentations and open-mindedness.
- 4. Is conducted in a spirit of scholarly inquiry.

### **Delegation of Responsibility**

The Superintendent or designee shall develop administrative regulations for the management of current events that do not stifle the spirit of free and scholarly inquiry.
