Here are just a few noteworthy accomplishments of the Class of 2024:

The class of 2024 consists of approximately 425 graduating seniors

- Congratulations to Joshua Maxwell Toughill and Eric Mullenmeister on being named Co-Valedictorians. They each had a weighted GPA of 4.9.
- There were 760 Advanced Placement courses taken and 108 Dual Enrollment classes taken over the past two years by the Class of 2024.
- There were 78 graduates who were in the International Baccalaureate Program. Fourteen graduates are on track for the full IB diploma, and 64 graduates will earn an IB Certificate for one area of study.

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- There were two graduates who were in the Early College Program.
- There were 65 seniors who attended EVIT.
- As of this article, we have 25 student athletes who have signed to continue playing at the collegiate level.
- A total of 44 seniors participated in the Superintendent's Challenge and these students contributed over 8818.35 hours of community services in our local community over their years at Cactus Shadows. Noah Edgin accumulated 1012 volunteer service hours to lead the class of 2024.

Again, congratulations to the Class of 2024! Always remember the lessons you've learned, the friendships you've made, and the experiences that have shaped you into the incredible individuals you are today. Your future is bright, we are proud of you, and we can't wait to witness the extraordinary things you will accomplish - WE ARE FALCONS!

We look forward to seeing you in our schools.



#### **Arizona's Tax Credit Program**



Arizona's tax law (ARS 43-1089.01) allows families a tax credit of up to \$400 if they contribute to extracurricular activities in public schools. Individuals can give up to \$200. Contributions that are made on or before the fifteenth day of the fourth month (April 15), following the close of the taxable year, may be applied to either the current or preceding taxable year and is considered to have been made the last day of that taxable year.

# Extracurricular activities are school-sponsored activities that may require enrolled students to pay a fee, including fees for:

- Extracurricular activities.
- Character education programs.
- Standardized testing fees for college credit or readiness offered by a widely recognized and accepted educational testing organization.
- Preparation courses and materials for standardized testing.
- The career and technical education industry certification assessment.
- Cardiopulmonary resuscitation training pursuant to A.R.S. 15-718.01.

#### From and after June 30, 2019 through June 30, 2024, these items are also Tax Credit eligible:

- Capital items (example: furniture, furnishings, athletic equipment, computer software, pupil & nonpupil transportation vehicles & equipment, textbooks, instructional aids, library books)
- Student consumable health care supplies (example: tissues, hand wipes, bandages)
- Playground equipment, shade structures for playground equipment

A single individual or a head of household can use the tax credit for \$200. A married couple filing a joint return can use the tax credit for \$400. Tax credit donations made on or before April 15th may be applied to either the current or preceding tax year.

# Arizona Voter Registration Eligibility

YOU MUST BE REGISTERED 29 DAYS PRIOR TO AN ELECTION TO BE ELIGIBLE TO VOTE IN THAT ELECTION. STATE LAW REQUIRES ARIZONA RESIDENTS MEET THE FOLLOWING CRITERIA TO REGISTER:

- A citizen of the United States of America. This includes any U.S. citizen who has never resided in the United States but whose parent is a United States citizen registered to vote in Arizona (A.R.S. § 16-103).
- Ø 18-years old on or before the date of the next general election.
- Not convicted of a felony or treason, unless civil rights have been restored.
- Able to write his or her name or make his or her mark, unless physically disabled.
- ❷ Not adjudicated an incapacitated person (A.R.S. § 14-5101).

You suffer an immobilizing injuring on the trail, now what happens? Now what do you do? Arizona's first responders are called upon to rescue hundreds of residents and visitors who have suffered debilitating injuries while exploring our beautiful mountain trails. "After the Fall; My Helicopter Rescue Off the Mountain" chronicles the dramatic real-life experience that Rick Kamel faced with his call for a chopper to rescue him as he lay helpless on the harsh desert mountain trail. 
