Whether in the realm of science like Isaac Newton, the silver screen like George Lucas, or the cockpit of an airplane like Amelia Earhart, success at the highest level of a field requires scholarly study and research. Gifted and Talented students at Lewis & Clark Elementary School learned about the "Habits of a Scholar" as they researched the behaviors and traits of influential individuals to portray at the Living Wax Museum.

In preparation for the Living Wax Museum, the students investigated characteristic behaviors common in scholars including curiosity, perseverance, goal setting, intellectual risk-taking, academic humility, and excellence. They then chose notable individuals and explored the way they demonstrated these characteristics in their life.

During the Gifted & Talented Living Wax Museum, each student will dress up and play the role of their chosen individual to show off everything they have learned about them and their scholarly habits over the course of this school year. The students have prepared display boards and a presentation about the life of the individual. Some chosen individuals include Thomas Edison, Steve Jobs, George Washington, Tom Brady, Davy Crocket, Amelia Earhart, and Rosa Parks.

Other students from the school as well as parents and guests will be able to visit the museum in the school library and receive a lesson on these scholars in 20-minute shifts from 12:40-1 p.m., 1:10-1:30 p.m., and 1:40-2 p.m.
