SCIENCE RESEARCH LEADS TWO SENIORS TO NATIONAL STEM FESTIVAL

Two Brentwood High School innovation. seniors in the Science Research Program recently took a trip to Washington, D.C., to showcase their outstanding scientific contributions to an esteemed group of attendees as winners of the 2024 National STEM Challenge.


Alisha Ahsan and Stephanie Pizano were two of the 150 winners of the 2024 National STEM Challenge, out of more than 10,000 applicants. The multistep competition accepted submissions across six thematic areas: environmental stewardship, future foods, health and medicine, powering the planet, tech for good, and space

The festival in Washington, D.C., allowed winners of the competition to showcase their scientific research and inventions to political representatives and federal agencies as well as network with industry-leading professionals in STEM careers.

Both Brentwood winners chose to pursue the topic of environmental stewardship and ways to mitigate the harm associated with nitrogen pollution.

Alisha Ahsan's project focused on studying how nitrogen pollution negatively affects eelgrass and proposed a method to help restore the





declining sea grass by gluing seeds onto live shellfish.

"The festival was great," Ahsan said. "Research comes with a lot of failure, and it was nice to be recognized for all of the hard work and dedication that went into this project."

Stephanie Pizano's submission to the competition was a filter she invented that reduces nitrogen pollution from fertilizer runoff and septic waste. She printed a small-scale replica 3D toilet with pipes to demonstrate how the filter functions.

"It was a surreal experience being able to attend the festival," Pizano said. "We went through a lot as a class, and it was amazing

to have such a successful year for our program."

The participation in the program was an incredible experience for the Brentwood science researchers that not only celebrated their projects and presented opportunities for furthering their research, but also added to the storied legacy of the Brentwood Science Research Program that has guided countless other research students.


"We were a group that was able to preserve the long-lasting legacy of our research program," Pizano said. "I am definitely proud of that."

Tradition runs strong in Brentwood Schools, and that was evident on Saturday, April 6, as Brentwood students, staff, community members and alumni laced up their running shoes for the 29th Annual Gary Mintz Memorial 5K Scholarship Run.

In its 29th year, the memorial run is a fixture in the Brentwood community, and one that people anticipate each year. Promoting a healthy lifestyle and some friendly competition among friends and colleagues are of course components of the run, but the much-echoed sentiment is the importance of raising scholarship funds for graduating Brentwood High School seniors and remembering past Brentwood High School Principal Gary Mintz. Mr. Mintz came up with the idea for the annual run and it was renamed in his honor after his tragic passing in



1995.

The slight chill that filled the air the morning of the event did not deter participants as it saw its greatest participation in several years with more than 360 runners showing up for the event. Students across grade levels stood shoulder to shoulder with staff and community members on the starting line as the race began, and runners followed the designated route which departed Brentwood High School and continued through the streets of the community.

For the 3.1 miles of the race, participants' fitness and mental fortitude were tested, but something that was never in doubt was the boisterous support from the crowd that encouraged the runners stride by stride

Spectators were especially enthusiastic for a certain participant to complete the race. Cheers rang out in exuberant fashion as Jose Mendez crossed the finish line. At 85 years of age, Mendez has participated in every Gary Mintz 5K Scholarship Run in the district's history.

"I am a little crazy," Mendez said after completing the race. "It's great to finish and it makes you feel good to be part of an event like this. It's a tradition here in Brentwood."
