Because she came clean about her lies, she will not receive jail time. Rather, Russel will serve a year of probation, 100 hours of community service, and a fine of \$18,000 in restitution.

Baltimore Bridge Collapse



Moscow Terror Attack Leaves 145 Dead, ISIS Claims Responsibility

It came as a shock to many and left the media in a fog of confusion. A recent shooting in a Moscow city hall left hundreds dead and millions seeking revenge. Who were the suspects? What were their motives? Was Ukraine behind it?

Nearly a month after the devastating attack, many questions were left unanswered as investigation releases are still pending. Despite this, some questions can be answered by what is readily available and released.

Russia has an extensive history of Islamic extremism. Throughout the 1990s and 2010s, Russia was locked in a prolonged war, later insurgency, in the Caucasus region. These attacks were often done to scare the Russian public and force policy changes. Since 2017, attacks from abroad have become more prevalent within Russia. Such attacks have often been tied to the Islamic State of Iraq and Syria, formerly known as ISIS.

Prior to the March 22nd attack, the United States Embassy in Moscow sent out a general safety advisory. The Embassy claimed that they had received alarming reports of suspected terrorist activities within the city and urged all U.S. citizens in Moscow to avoid large public gatherings.

According to Embassy officials, U.S. intelligence agencies informed Kremlin authorities of the incoming attack. However, the tip-off seems to have been ignored. Shockingly, Putin would later be seen on a televised conference with internal security officials claiming that the Embassy warning was nothing more than "provocation."

Around 8 P.M. that day, four tactically dressed gunmen entered the Crocus City Hall in Moscow and began firing at civilians. Amaq News, an ISIS-affiliated propaganda agency, reported on the attack live and showed the ensuing massacre.

In videos published both by civilians and official news outlets, petrol bombs were used to maximize casualties. The attack lasted approximately 13 minutes. Fires engulfed the Crocus City Hall through the next morning.

Later on the 23rd, all four suspects were arrested after a brief bid for escape. The individuals arrested included Dalerdzhon Mirzoyev, Shamsidin Fariduni, Murodali Rachabalizoda, and Muhammadsobir Fayzov. All four suspects came from Tajikistan, with discrete ties to the Islamic State Khorasan Province (I.S-K). Dozens more in Tajikistan were arrested in the coming days.

The four terrorists later appeared at a televised court hearing on the 25th. They all showed clear signs of bruising and swelling. Additional footage was later released by Russian security forces. These videos showed authorities torturing the four suspects, with one notably having his ear severed by one of his captors.

Cholera Crisis: Millions at Risk Due to Water, Sanitation, and

The International Coordinating Group (ICG) revealed that the world is facing a sudden surge in cholera cases. With over 700,000 reported cases in 2023, immediate action has been taken.

According to the ICG, "Actions include investing in access to safe water, sanitation and hygiene, testing and detecting outbreaks quickly and improving quality of and access to healthcare, and fast-tracking additional production of affordable oral cholera vaccine (OCV) doses to better prevent cases".

Cholera thrives in locations lacking access to safe water and sanitation. Climate-related factors, economic insecurity, conflict, and population displacement play a significant role in the spread of the disease. The severely impacted countries include the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ethiopia, Haiti, Somalia, Sudan, Syria, Zambia, and Zimbabwe.

Although cholera vaccinations have been produced, the production capacity is insufficient to meet the needs of millions directly affected by cholera. With only one manufacturer producing the vaccine, efforts to fast-track manufacturers are imperative. According to the ICG, "Between 2021 and 2023, more doses were requested for outbreak response than the entire previous decade."

As we witnessed with COVID-19, urgent action and innovation can save lives. Together, the control of cholera may safeguard the health of communities worldwide.

Empowering Health: Global Health Achievements of 2023

The World Health Organization (WHO) has reached a new milestone. On April 7th, 2023, WHO celebrated its 75th anniversary. According to WHO, "This milestone anniversary served as a powerful reminder of how working together in global solidarity has enabled us to rise to complex challenges in the past, and will continue to do so in the future."

Ranging from natural disasters to disease outbreaks, WHO's protection of global health was evident. The World Health Organization commended its ability to respond to emergencies.

WHO responded to a staggering 65 emergencies in 2023. These emergencies were situated in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ethiopia, Haiti, Myanmar, Sudan, and Ukraine. WHO sent resources to detect and respond to infectious disease outbreaks.

The organization's efforts extended beyond disease control. Ranging from Afghanistan and Turkey to Syria and Libya, WHO also responded to earthquakes and floods. WHO deployed emergency medical teams and provided aid to assist these countries.

In the past year, WHO also faced the resurgence of infectious diseases. These diseases include anthrax, cholera, dengue, and Ebola. WHO facilitated laboratory testing, contact tracing, and established field hospitals to contain outbreaks. Amidst these efforts, healthcare itself came under attack. Over 1200 documented assaults on healthcare facilities occurred in field hospitals.

Despite such challenges, there were moments of positive progress. In May, WHO declared that COVID-19 and Monkeypox were no longer a public health emergency.

In a world where global health is emphasized, WHO's commitment to global health serves as a beacon of hope for a healthier future.

Scientists Question the Extinction of the Javan Tiger

For decades, scientists have seen neither hide nor hair of the Javan tiger. In 2008, after more than a century of unrelenting hunting and habitat loss, the Javan tiger was declared extinct.

On August 18th, a resident by the name of Ripi Yanur Fajar claimed to have spotted a tiger outside a village in West Java. After reporting the sighting to researcher Kalih Raksasewu and government employee Bambang Adryanto, the two traveled to visit the site.

The two spotted footprints and claw marks that they believed could belong to a tiger. Sitting on a fence that separates the village road from a plantation was one strand of hair.

In March of 2022, the hair was submitted for genetic analysis to Indonesia's Biology Research Centre for National Research and Innovation (BRIN).

The results were compared to that of Sumatran Tigers, as well as a 1930 museum specimen of a Javan tiger.

The mysterious strand matched the genetics of the Sumatran tiger with 97 percent similarity. The genetic distance between it and the museum Javan tiger was 0.3 percent.

Centuries ago, the Javan tiger was widespread in forests and thickets. The island of Java is the most populous major island in the world, housing more than half of Indonesia's population. To sustain the island's population, much of the tiger's habitat has been destroyed.

The Ultimate Croissant Race

Well, there was a 12-mile Olympic run held on March 24, 2024 around Paris. Here, contestants were required to run with a plate of coffee and a croissant.

This tradition has been in practice for over a century. The race is approximately 1.25 miles long (2km) to celebrate the agile waiters who help "make France's restaurants."

Each year, about 200 waiters participate in the event. The competition is scored based on how much coffee is spilled, how steady the tray is, and the time in which the race is completed.
