SOLON HIGH SCHOOL RECEIVING DIVERSITY CENTER'S HUMANITARIAN AWARD

Solon High School this week is receiving the Diversity Center of Northeast Ohio's student group Humanitarian Award. SHS is receiving the award for the ongoing work the school is doing in the area of inclusion and diversity acceptance through the Freshman Mentoring Program. The goal is to create school culture of true unity and acceptance and helping all students understand and embrace the importance of complete inclusion at Solon High School.

SHS began working on this initiative with the Diversity Center two years ago through a grant awarded to the school when a student won the local Stop the Hate essay contest.

The Freshmen Mentoring Program is an important connection to our newest students at the high school. Through FMP, upperclassmen are selected to serve as year-long mentors to ninth grade students. The goal is to help students acclimate to the high school environment. Within the context of carefully constructed sessions, the mentors share their own experience at Solon High School and provide tips and advice to help freshman students achieve success academically, socially and emotionally.

The FMP program provides the ideal framework for this training as student leaders in the school work and build relationships with the incoming freshmen classes. In this way, the culture change can be underscored with new students every year as they integrate into the SHS community. Similar outreach and coaching with our staff on inclusion, unconscious bias and related issues is an important complement to the student engagement.

Solon – and Solon High School by extension – is a diverse community. But it is important to remember that diversity alone doesn't guarantee unity. Full inclusion does not happen by chance; it requires acknowledgement, awareness, respect and ongoing effort.
